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


























INSIDE OCC

I was pleased to see so many of our voting members in attendance at our February 26 Annual Meeting. It just proves that our members are concerned, aware and active in the club operations and are willing to take the time and get involved in the decision making process.

For those of you who were not able to attend, I'm happy to report that all of the proposed amendments to the Club Bylaws were approved as recommended. Those sections amended were: 6, 17, 27, 38, 42, 45 and 62. Two new sections were added to the Bylaws, sections 26A and 26b. These two sections deal with the Judges of Election Committee and the Long Range Planning Committee. I think it's important to note that the approval of the amendment to section 45 brought with

it a house rule change which was approved by the board of directors at the January 26 meeting with the provision that it shall not become effective until February 26, 1990 and only if the proposed amendment of said section 45 shall have been approved on that date and provided further that should said amendment fail of passage, said rule shall forthwith be without force and effect and therefore expunged.

The new house rule is as follows:

The Club Bar Room is defined as the carpeted room of the club where are located the bar, hanging canoe and television set. Infants and other minors under 8 years of age shall not be admitted to the Club Bar Room at any time. Minors 8 years of age or older may be admitted to the Club Bar Room at appropriate times to watch sportscasts on television or said special telecasts as may be deemed permissible by the general manager, but in all cases said minors shall be in the company, and under the actual, effective and responsible supervision of an adult member. Under no circumstances shall any minor be permitted to stand or be seated at the



Keone Downing Rules Waimea Bay

The whole world it seemed, especially the surfing world, waited ... and waited ... and waited ... it happened!

After three long, trying years of postponement, January 21 erupted with the cry of "surf's up!" Waimea Bay on Oahu's famed North Shore dawned this day to greet classic 20-30-foot surf for the Quicksilver in memory of the late great Eddie Aikau.

According to meet director, George Downing, himself one of the original, pioneer big-wave greats here at Waimea and elsewhere, it was the best Waimea he had seen in many years.

By day's end, after hours of grueling dangerous competition, it was his eldest son, Keone, who was crowned king for that day with surfing's largest first place cash prize ever—\$55,000. Keone's performance was superlative, deep position-

ing, careful and precise timing, and no wipeouts—a real first class day. He bested an amazingly strong international field of hungry and talented big-wave specialists.

Brock Little had the tube ride of the day for second place and \$10,000, while Californian Richard Schmidt took home \$5,000 for third and the largest wave free-fall of the meet. The 30 other surfers in this prestigious event, commemorating one of Hawaii's all-time great watermen, got \$350.

(Editor's Note: After sitting all day on the beach and doing commentary on the surfing contest and watching everyone else catch the big ones, Joe could resist no longer. As darkness approached, he paddled out on his bodyboard—described as a sponge by some—and caught and rode what everyone agreed was a 25-30 foot wave all the way to the beach. Quite a sight, according to long time surfing observers who thought they'd seen it all!)

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Try a Riesling Wine at Sunset

The riesling is one of the oldest, white wine grapes. The Romans know the importance of the riesling, planting it extensively in the river valleys of Germany.

Charlemagne saw a hill where the snow melted first and planted the riesling which is now the famous Schloss Johannesburg Vineyards. This same grape variety is grown in the United States and is called the Johannesburg Riesling. However, only Germany can bring the riesling to perfection.

Germany's far northern climate produces high natural acidity. This is balanced by the richness achieved by South facing slopes receiving reflected warmth from the rivers. The result is a wine of

character, fruit and balance. The question in America, however, is when to drink it.

German wines are best enjoyed by themselves before dinner as an aperitif or after dinner with dessert. German wines are also excellent with light dinners such as fish, salads, veal and pork.

Next time try a bottle of the Graacher Himmelreich Spatlese on the Club's wine list. This wine is made by one of the most famous growers in Germany, Dr. Thanish. He owns a part of the famous Bernkasteler Doctor Vineyard. The Graacher Himmelreich is in the same class as the famous Bernkasteler Doctor.

Enjoy a bottle on the Hau Terrace at sunset or before dinner at your table. You will not be disappointed.

A total of 83 people entered the event. Following the race, all participants came back to the Club for refreshments and awards. The clock broke after the first six finishers were in, so there are no times for many of the participants.

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Volcano Run in the Rain

Why do they do it? Every year, those OCC diehards, trekking to the Volcano Run, without being deterred by rain, fog, smog, vog, etc.

At 8 a.m. and 8:45, still raining, the summit caldera rim run (10 miles) and the Kilauea Iki crater run (5.5 miles) began.

It's a thrill to watch the finish, even in the rain. This year no one suffered heat exhaustion, but the mud and the wet shoes took their measure in legs that were cold and feet that didn't feel. At least 10 OCC members participated and they'll probably go back next year. Why? Running through steam vents, the sound of crisp lava crunching under your shoes, the mist swirling, the tree ferns towering over you, is awesome.

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
