13 OCCers in Honolulu Marathon

The running of the 17th Honolulu Marathon on December 10 was a big day for sports in Hawaii in general, and for at least 15 OCC runners in particular. We aren't sure of the exact number of members who ran, because some prefer to remain anonymous, but all of them deserve our admiration and congratulations.

The starting time was 5:30 a.m., so the OCC van left the Club at 4:45 a.m. with about 10 runners onboard, and dropped off at Aloha Tower to join more than

10,000 other runners (including a few walkers and a lot of dreamers).

Meanwhile, members of the Running Committee including chairperson Andrea Lehman, were preparing the OCC tent near the finish line in Kapiolani Park where the first OCC runner to finish would arrive 3 hours and 19 minutes after the spectacular cannon and fireworks start.

Tanya Watumull was the first OCC member to finish in 3 hours, 21 minutes. She was running her second marathon and took 16 minutes off last year's time.

Emary Lucas, who certainly runs more marathons every year than any other OCC member, was running his 25th overall and his eighth Honolulu Marathon. He finished second for OCC in 3:28, a great time, but he says last year's was his personal best.

Possibly the most amazing personal triumph was that of Tommy Holmes who severely injured his knee in a sking accident last February. If you saw the brace he wore for many weeks thereafter, you would not have believed he could ever run a marathon again. Not only did he run, he finished third for OCC in 3:29 with a barely perceptible limp. Even his doctor is amazed and says he is going to write that one up for the medical journals.

Our durable Aussie, Russell Allen, who has run many marathons in Australia and New Zealand, was running his third Honolulu Marathon, but this time in the 60-65 age group. He still makes it look so easy.

The perennial Bruce Ames ran his 15th Marathon at age 47. What else can we say.

Dr. Kent Davenport, a veteran marathoner, ran with his recent bride, Dawn, who was running it for the first time. They finished together in a very decent time of 3:57.

One OCC member tried to remain anonymous, apparently because it was his first marathon and he didn't know how he'd do; but, we saw Gib Bintliff finish in under four hours—a decent time for any first timer.

It was a personal triumph for everyone who trained and was able to finish the grueling 26.2 miles. There was a lot of talk about how great the weather was, cool and not too humid, and it did help all our runners turn in good times; but, that's still a long, rough road and still a tri-

umph for anyone who completes it.

There were a few personal tragedies also:

Matt Kresser, who trained hard and was expected to be one of the top OCC finishers, got the flu a couple days before and was unable to compete.

Ray Suganuma, who had also trained hard, for this, his second marathon, says, "I had a terrific half marathon!" But at about 20 miles he pulled up lame and was unable to finish.

Meanwhile, back at the tent, Andrea's committee, consisting of Hilary Lambert and Steve Zak, had plenty of wet stuff for drinking, fruit, muffins and sandwiches for eating, cots for resting, chairs for sitting, towels for wiping off the triumphant sweat, and a chalk board for recording times.

This writer was also there, but had the unenviable duties of driving the van to the start, then standing near the finish line with a zoom lens trying to spot each OCC finisher as he or she came in. That wasn't easy, so my apologies to those missed.

After all OCC runners were accounted for, most adjourned to the Hau Terrace for the breakfast of champions, Korbel Brut. At that point, no one wanted to talk about next year, but, come next year, most of them will be doing it all over again.

Despite an unexplained decrease in the number of volunteers who showed up to work this year, the Outrigger Canoe Club Aid Station on Kahala Avenue managed to serve the nearly 10,000 runners in the 1989 Honolulu Marathon on December 10.

There was non-stop action during the first two hours of the Marathon when most of the runners passed the eightmile mark where our Aid Station is located on Kahala Avenue near Hunakai Street.

One of the reasons we were so busy was that other aid stations on the route out to Diamond Head were not ready when the runners reached them, so we were an oasis for hot and thirsty runners.

Members were busy passing out "Ice Cole Spunj" and we do mean ice cold. Club President Peter Balding and his crew had to take time outs to thaw out their hands after washing and icing the sponges.

"Wata" was duly distributed by eager volunteers to thirsty runners.

This year for the first time all Aid Stations offered "Erg" (an acronym for electrolyte replacment glucose), instead of the usual defizzed, diluted Coke. Not many runners knew what it was, but for those who drank it, it offered a

power boost as they tackled Diamond Head on the way to the finish line.

We had about 80 volunteers work in the Aid Station this year, about 50 less than in previous years. All volunteers received OCC Marathon T-shirts and the appreciation of the many runners who shouted, "Thanks, Outrigger" and "You're the best, Outrigger" as they ran past.

Our thanks to Cline Mann, who chairs the Aid Station Committee every year and his able helpers Brad Martin, Kawika Grant, Bill Cook, Buck Schmuck, and Mark and David Buck, who worked in the pouring down rain the day before getting everything together.

Our thanks also to all our other volunteers who arrived at the Aid Station by 5:30 a.m. to help set up and cheer the runners on.

We'd particularly like to thank that hardy band who remained to the very last (4 p.m.) to take down the station and give the entire avenue a complete sweep.

Information about each candidate will be included with your ballot. Ballots will be mailed in early February. The ballot is time dated so please don't ignore it.

When you ballot arrives, it will have

The final date to vote is Sunday, February 25 at 6 p.m. But you don't have to wait until then. Vote as soon as you get your ballot, then mail it or drop it off at the Club.

Sign the outside envelope on the ballot, include your number and write legibly. Ballots without the outside envelope are discarded. Your signature tells the election judge that you are a qualified voting member. If you are delinquent in paying your bill, your ballot is invalid.

Vote for no more than six candidates. You may vote for less than six. The six candidates with the highest number of votes will be elected to two-

year terms.

All Senior, Regular, Intermediate and Life members of the Club in good standing are eligible to vote.

The Annual Meeting of the Club will be held on Monday, February 26 at 5:30 p.m. in the Dining Room. Please plan to attend and hear the committee reports and election results.

Zinfandel, the Incredibly Versatile Wine

Zinfandel, is a wine for all seasons! The Zinfandel grape is planted primarily in California, although other world wine growing areas, such as the Margaret River area of Western Australia, have recently experimented with the Zinfandel grape.

The origin of the Zinfandel was long unknown although strong evidence now supports a relationship to the Primitivo grape grown principally in southeast Italy around the city of Bari.

Zinfandel is extremely versatile and serves many tastes. The grape can be made in a wide variety of wine styles. The wine may be as fresh as Beaujolais with prevailing lightness and fruit, or the wine can rival the rich, deep flavor, intensity and longevity of a Cabernet Sauvignon or even a fine port.

More recently, Zinfandel has been made into "blush" wines which are extremely attractive for those who enjoy a light slightly pink wine with a recognizable berry flavor.

Zinfandel, in whatever style, has been described as brambly, blackberrylike, spicy and aromatic.

Your Club features some excellent Zinfandel wines. Quivira Vineyards is a relatively new winery and is located in Sonoma County. The winery produces a well-balanced, full and flavorable red Zinfandel from the Dry Creek Valley.

A recent review of the 1987 vintage by The Wine Spectator stated that "Fruit echoes on the finish. Delicious now but should age until 1994 and beyond."

The Quivira Zinfandel complements virtually any fowl or beef entree.

Your Club also features a "blush" white Zinfandel from Belvedere Winery, another Sonoma-based vintner. This wine has a distinctive berry flavor and is a complement to soups, salads, fowl, or is pleasurable for just plain sipping.

Yes, Zinfandel is truly a wine for all seasons, and rises to the challenges of most epicurean adventures. Enjoy it and appreciate its versatility and its many faces.



INSIDE OCC

Wow! Am I glad the holidays are over! This holiday season was an extremely busy one for the Club with all the special parties, and a large number of non-resident A members home for the Christmas season. A great many Non-resident B and C members also took advantage of Hawaii's warm weather, and heavy usage of Club facilities by our resident members, all added up to a very busy December and January.

I think you'll all agree the staff did an outstanding job of seeing to it that all went smoothly and without a hitch. I can't tell you how proud I am of our Outrigger employees. They always seem to be able to get the job done no matter how trying the circumstances.

I'd like to remind you of our mail list which is done daily and posted at the Club's entrance at the sign-in register. You are reminded that when you leave packages or mail here at the Club for others, you bear the responsibility of that item having a complete return or forwarding address.

You are also reminded that there is a maximum two week holding period for mail at the Front Desk after which it will be returned to sender or placed in our dead letter file.

The Front Desk has been overwhelmed by mail that has been left unclaimed for months on end. Adding to the problem is the incompleteness of return or forwarding addresses, as well as names. Your cooperation in this matter will be greatly appreciated.

The Board has authorized the sale of the Club's two Sunfish hulls and masts. Interested members should contact me by February 28.

The House Committee has recommended, and the Board has approved, the creation of an OCC Gift Certificate. These certificates can be purchased by members and given as gifts to other members. They may be used for purchases throughout the Club.

During 1989, the Building and Grounds Committee has spent many long hours working with me and my staff in preparing and overseeing numerous projects in maintaining and upgrading the Clubhouse and its facilities.

Some of the major projects are listed below:

New Club House Roof: This project is nearly completed with the exception of new skylights and light panels. They should be installed by the time you read this.

Dining Room and Cocktail Lounge Carpeting: New carpeting was installed on January 8.

All Purpose Ramp: A new all purpose ramp has been installed on the "B" level of the parking garage. This ramp is intended for multi-use including members and guests in wheel chairs. No parking is allowed in front of the ramp.

Employees Dining Room and Lounge: This area has been renovated and upgraded to provide improved working conditions for our employees.

Cocktail Lounge Windows: New sliding glass windows and doors have been installed.

Beach Access and Erosion: A professional study has been completed with recommendations for the beach area and the possibility of building stairs to the lower beach for swimmers and the transporting of canoes and boats.

The following projects are being studied for feasibility, cost and accomplishment. They're listed in the Committee's order of priority for accomplishment:

Canopy Top of Garage Stairs: Construction of a canopy at the top of the garage stairs to provide protection to users and safety during rainy weather.

Snack Shop Upgrade: Improvements to the appearance of the service and eating areas. A test of "pavers" was installed in front of the counter to determine their suitability to the surface of the eating area. Unfortunately, the

test did not work out, however, other materials are being looked at for possible installation.

Walkways and Cement Areas: A review of suitable surface materials is being evaluated. A recommendation should be submitted soon.

Kitchen Floor: Installation of a new non-skid surface in the kitchen is needed for safety and sanitary reasons. Types of materials are being reviewed.

Telephone System: This project is being worked on with the House Committee. The new system would upgrade telephone service for members allowing them to directly call selected extensions without calling the Front Desk. This would save time and make it more convenient for members. Also, other features would include music on hold and the capability of dialing 1-800 numbers without the aid of the Front Desk.

Entrance to the Club from the Garage: Plans are being prepared to upgrade and improve the entrance to the Club from the "C" level of parking garage. This would include new lighting and painting.

Men's Locker Room: Improvements to the Men's locker and shower rooms are being prepared. This will include replacement of stall partitions with stainless steel, repairs to ceramic tile, improved lighting, carpeting and painting. Plans are also being prepared to upgrade the attendant's station.

Both the Building and Grounds Committee and I would like to hear from members on their ideas and recommendations for improvements. Please do not hesitate to let us hear from you.

Remember that our Annual Membership Meeting will be held on Monday, February 26 at 5:30 p.m. in the Club's Main Dining Room. Please plan to attend. I think you'll find it both interesting and informative. Don't forget you'll be receiving your ballots in mid-February. Don't forget to vote.

The staggered start began with 24 kayakers hitting the water for an 11.5 kilometer paddle from the Club to the Diamond Head buoy, to the Ala Wai buoy and then back to the Club.

Starting 10 minutes after the kayakers were five one-man canoes, on an 8K course.

Twenty-seven paddleboarders then got off to a fast start on the traditional 5K course, which they paddled twice for a total of 10K.

poleon passed him. Hemmings took the lead three-quarters of the way through and never relinquished it, although Napoleon finished only one second behind him, and Moore only two seconds behind.






