

OCC Wins 5th HCRA Championship

Outrigger Canoe Club paddlers proved again that they're the number one paddlers in Hawaii by winning their 5th straight Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association Championship, August 6 at Keehi Lagoon.

OCC scored 155 points to bring home the title.

Kailua was the runnerup in the AAA Division with 128, followed by Hui Nalu 96, Hanalei 93, Healani 77, Hawaiian 58 and Lokahi 42.

Outrigger won seven events, finished second in eight events, and was third in two races.

OCC Coach Mike Fox had lots of praise for Club paddlers and the winning season. "We worked hard all season with one goal in mind--to win the state championship. We can all be proud that we accomplished our goal." Outrigger's Senior Masters Women set a record by winning their fourth straight state championship with the same crew, sitting in the same seats every year. Gerri Pedesky stroked the women to victory, with Ululani Davis in two, Marilyn Haine in three, Ruby Ifversen in four, Diane Stowell in five, and Keanuenue Rochlen, steering.

Duplanty Named to U.S. Olympic Team

Chris Duplanty became the second Outrigger member to participate in the Olympics in Seoul, Korea this month, with his selection to the U.S. Olympic Water Polo Team.

Duplanty, a goalie, played water polo at Punahou and UC Irvine, and has played on the U.S. National Team in tournaments this summer in Europe and the United States.

Chris is the first player from outside California to be named to the team in more than 30 years.

The Olympic team will be in Hawaii, September 10-12 for exhibition games. Olympic water polo competition begins September 21 against world champion Yugoslavia.

Outrigger's other Olympian is kayaker Traci Phillips.

I Remember

The year was 1912. I was 14 years old and lived in Santa Monica, California. We, my friends and I, were good swimmers and spent all our time when we were not in school on the beach and in the ocean.

In those days, Southern California water was warm and tropical, our surf was perfect. Our surfboards were large and very heavy.

One day, a big wave upset me, the board flipped over, hit me in the stomach and rolled me up on the sand, out cold. A tall young man carried me onto the beach and, with my friends scared stiff, soon had me breathing again and back to normal.

The young lifeguard gave us a lecture on surfboards (ours were all wrong). He told us to pass the information on to our families. We needed different wood, different sizes and a different shape.

Our fathers took him seriously and when our boards were made, he taught us how to ride them, Hawaii style.

Every afternoon we'd meet on the beach and he would sing in Hawaiian, the songs of the islands, and play the ukulele. Most of us had ukes in those days. I still know some of those songs.

I have played my uke for my great grandchildren (I have 11) and I tell them about that nice young man who was Duke Kahanamoku on his way home from the Olympic Games in Europe where he won a gold medal. That stop in Santa Monica as a lifeguard was a job to get him home to Hawaii.

Those of us still living, remember him well and love the islands because of him. I've had a home here and have lived here every summer for many years.

That 14-year-old girl is 90 now, a bit rheumatic, but still plays the ukulele and sings the songs. About 25 years ago, we met again over here and reminisced--the Duke and I.

One day, I hope to stay here forever, with the sunsets, the rainbows and the unbelievably beautiful water.



Li Brothers Make National Teams

Last May, brothers Kainoa and Stevie Li discovered they would both have the opportunity to compete on a national level in July.

Kainoa traveled to Richmond, Virginia, as a member of the Hawaii team for the National AAU Karate Championships. Since this was only the fifth tournament he had ever entered, and had just resumed interest in the sport last January, his goal was to enjoy the experience and ceremony associated with the 100th anniversary of the AAU.

Three days later, he won gold medals as the national champion in the Colored Belt Division in Kata and Kumite (with 22 successive sparring wins), Grand Champion for the double sweep, All-American honors and automatic member of the National Team.

Upon returning to Harvard University, which he attended on a rowing scholarship for the summer, he discovered he had earned a seat in the Elite boat of the perennial Harvard na-

tional champion team.

That same week, Stevie reported to the USVBA Elite Volleyball Camp at the University of Colorado at Boulder immediately following the Junior Olympics.

Attendees were the top 36 boys and 36 girls selected by tryouts throughout the country.

After two weeks of intensive training which was from 8 in the morning to 10 at night (including a surprise scrimmage of the boy's teams which started at 3 in the morning), Stevie was among the lucky 12 boys to be selected for the Junior National Team.

A full week of training followed, conducted by the National Men's Team coach and the U.S. Olympic Volleyball staff, in preparation for a three-day tournament which was held at the University of Sasketchewan in Canada against all star teams.

Stevie was the starting setter for a tall, talented U.S. team which prevailed.

This was the first year for the Junior National Team which has been established as part of the youth development program to identify potential Olympic hopefuls.





Outrigger Wins Burger King OHCRA Championship

For the fourth straight year, Outrigger Canoe Club won the Burger King Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association Championships at Keehi Lagoon on July 24.

OCC won eight of the last 10 races to defeat Kailua Canoe Club, 82-74. Altogether, Outrigger crews won 12 of the regatta's 30 races.

The Boy's 18 crew became the only undefeated OHCRA crew for the season by setting a new course record in their one mile race. They led from the start, defeating Hui Nalu by 15 seconds, in 7:54.29.

Head Coach Mike Fox switched some crews around to get the winning combination for the victory. He put together a Masters women's crew from upper division paddlers who were 35 and older that upset previously unbeaten Kailua by nine seconds.

"Our strategy paid off," Fox said after the race. "We qualified most of our crews for the state championships."

Five Club paddlers won two golds each, after OHCRA changed the rules allowing paddlers to participate in the senior races, as well as one other. The double golds went to Mark Rigg (junior and senior), Tom Conner (junior and senior), Sandra Haine (masters and senior), Katy Bourne (senior and open 4) and Piilani Schneider (senior and open 4).

Winged "O": Dad Center

Winged "O" awarded February, 1970

No history of the Outrigger Canoe Club would be complete without inclusion of the name of George David "Dad" Center. He was one of the men who made the Club what it is today. He was a leader and a teacher. But to many of the boys and girls who later matured into Olympic champions, business leaders and Club stalwarts, he was affectionately, "Dad".

Coach, Club Captain, Director and friend of the youth of our Club, Dad encouraged physical fitness, team effort, sportsmanship and loyalty in all.

Dad Center coached Outrigger swimming teams as early as 1912 when Duke Kahanamoku went to the Olympics to return to Hawaii a world champion. Others like Sam Kahanamoku, Gay Harris, Bill Harris and Mariechen Wehselau Jackson, followed in Duke's footsteps.

Although his interest was primarily

in swimming, outrigger canoeing was his personal love, and many a day he spent taking youngsters, tourists and all who could wield a paddle out to the surf in his koa canoe, "Miss Vedol".

Dad Center was born in Kipahulu, Maui in 1886, one of the children of a sugar plantation manager, and grew up on Maui and in Honolulu. Always active in athletics, he participated in all sports, but was most active in swimming, surfing and canoeing.

Dad rowed for the old Myrtle Boat Club in the early days, but joined the Outrigger Canoe Club in 1908 and from then on served the Club unselfishly and without monetary compensation until he died in 1962.

Dad coached and ran on the Outrigger track team as early as 1919; organized (with Dr. Paul Withington) and played on our football team; coached the U.S. Olympic swimming team in

1920, was coach of the Outrigger swimming team and took a team to Japan in the early 1920's.

As Club Captain for many years, Dad was in complete charge of all athletic activities and was actually the "guiding spirit" that encouraged our young members to participate in the athletic program that has been the purpose of the Club and is perpetuated to this day.

To all who had the honor and pleasure of knowing him, Dad Center is remembered as a shining example of what the Outrigger Canoe Club stands for.

A quiet, modest man, Dad had the leadership that inspired all of his charges to do their utmost, not only for the Club and themselves, but for Dad Center; and for them the greatest reward for winning was a "well done" from him.

The Outrigger Canoe Club didn't just happen. Dedicated men of Dad Center's ilk have played important roles in the success of our Club.


The first phase of our new Weight Room has been completed thanks to the hard work and effort put out by this committee.

All marathons are the same distance, 26 miles, 385 yards or 42.195 kilometers in length. It's the atmosphere and place of the marathon event itself that makes for a varied, interesting or exciting race.

So whether this is your first, fifth or 25th marathon, there are a lot of marathons this fall for Outrigger members to choose from all across the United States.

A foursome of Outrigger Masters Men marathoners are already deep into 60-mile weekly runs preparing for the upcoming Portland, Oregon Marathon, scheduled for September 25.

The OCC running team will include Russell Allen, Emary Lucas, Steven Dunn and Allen McWayne.

All four have completed previous marathons in the 3:30 or better range and all are looking forward to individual best times on this flat, fast course.

The four are also considering running in the Chicago Marathon and the New York Marathon before the Honolulu Marathon on December 11.

Outrigger always fields 25 or more runners in the Honolulu Marathon each year and, of course, sponsors one of the most popular and enthusiastic aid stations on the course.

For those Club members who are going to be running and cannot resist the urge to "go for it", remember that the time to beat and world record in the marathon has been established by an unknown Ethiopian runner, Belayneh Dinsamo at 2:06.50 or 4 minutes and 49 seconds per mile pace. If you're not quite up to that pace for 26.2 miles come Marathon race day, then forget it and have fun.

Dr. Jack Scaff mentions in his book, "Your First Marathon" some tips: Be humble. Place yourself where you

belong in the starting lineup. Pace yourself. Stick to your game plan, even if your friends are not sticking to theirs. You will pass them in the end.

Stop and drink water at every single aid station. Do not even pass up the early aid stations. Aid stations are set up at various distances for a purpose, so take fluids early in the race to avoid any problems later in the run.

On Marathon day you will find out whether you have trained properly --especially around mile 18 to 20. Build up running mileage over the nine months prior to the race and prepare mentally to finish the run.

Enjoy the camaraderie of the race, even if you have to "jog" up the back of Diamond Head as you head toward the finish line two miles away. You will finish, and believe it or not, when it's over, you will want to do another marathon.




