

Outrigger Second in Healani, Kamehameha Day Regattas

Outrigger won 10 events in the opening Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association regatta, the Healani Regatta, at Keehi Lagoon on June 5, but finished second in the AA standings with 80 points, to Kailua's 86.

In the Kamehameha Day Regatta at Kailua Beach on June 12, Outrigger won nine of the events, finishing second again to Kailua, 82-73.

Paddlers will compete in the Macfarlane Regatta on the 4th of July at Waikiki Beach, the Kaupiko Regatta on July 17 at Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station and the Oahu Championships on July 24 at Keehi Lagoon.



Macfarlane Regatta is 4th of July Tradition

The 46th annual Walter J. Macfarlane Regatta, scheduled for the 4th of July at Waikiki Beach, has come a long way since the inaugural event in 1943.

From the original 13 events, the day's activities have grown to 31 races with nearly 1,000 paddlers from 15 canoe clubs, ranging in age from 10 year olds to 70 year olds.

The Macfarlane Regatta is the only wave race in the Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing schedule. It is also the only race in which clubs have the option of using fiberglass canoes instead of their prized koa canoes because of the danger posed by surfing the waves.

The Macfarlane Regatta commemorates the memory of Walter James Macfarlane, president of Outrigger Canoe Club, at the time of his death in 1943.

At the time of his death, the Club was planning the regular 4th of July outrigger canoe races, the big event in canoeing each year, and the suggestion was made by Henry DeGorog, then manager of OCC, that these races be dedicated to the memory of Walter "Mac" and be known in the future as the Walter J. Macfarlane Memorial Canoe Races. The idea was adopted and races have been held on the 4th of July each year since.

In commemoration of the life and activities of Walter, the Hawaiian Hotels division of Matson Navigation Company donated a magnificent trophy, a great silver bowl as perpetual trophy to be competed for by the Senior Men's Six Paddle crew.

The Macfarlane family continues to actively support this regatta. In 1972, Walter Mac's sister, Muriel Flanders, donated the beautiful koa wave trophy that is presented to the club that wins the regatta.

In 1980, Walter Mac's grandnephew, Walter Guild, dedicated a handcrafted koa canoe trophy to his grandmother Muriel Flanders. This trophy is presented each year to the winning Boys 18 crew.

In 1984, Mrs. Flanders donated a

sterling silver bowl for the Senior Women and milo bowls for the Junior and Senior Masters Women winners.

The premiere event of the regatta has always been the Senior Men's race. In the early years of the race, the course was 4 1/2 miles and OCC dominated at this distance.

The first winning crew was Thad

Ekstrand, John Beaumont, Tom Arnott, Jim Fernie and Bob Bush and was steered by the legendary Duke Kahanamoku.

Over the years, the course has been shortened, most recently in 1969, to its present 2 1/2 miles. Outrigger has continued to dominate, with 10 wins, including last year, followed by Hui Nalu, with 5 and Waikiki Surf Club and Kailua, 2 each.

OCC holds the record for the distance at 15:08.9 set in 1981.

Bob Fischer, always popular with the ladies, steered Outrigger to victory in the 1943 girl's six race. Members of that crew were Greta Ross, Nita Hayes, Marcia Bowers, Anna Morris and Roselle Robinson.

The Macfarlane race allows open steering, where a club can elect to have an experienced wave steersman replace the crew's regular flatwater steersman.

Big waves can always be counted on to add to the thrill of the Macfarlane Regatta for spectators and participants alike. And a wave can often decide who wins and who doesn't.

There have also been a lot of "interesting" things happen in the races.

In 1950, two Outrigger crews raced each other when Hui Nalu and Waikiki Surf Club withdrew just prior to the starting of the event.

In 1954, there was high summer

surf and in the senior girls race, the winning canoe paddled by Waikiki Surf Club finished stern first. It had swamped about 100 yards off the finish line, and instead of giving up and bailing, the girls kept paddling with only the ama above water until they crossed the finish line.

In 1956, the races were postponed because of really high surf and held four days later when the ocean calmed down.

In 1969, the 4th of July was also First Break and at times the entire Waikiki Beach closed out. At least 30 canoes swamped during the day's races. For those that got out through the surf, caught a wave and stayed dry, there were some spectacular rides to shore. However, few did. The junior men caught the biggest wave of the day, an 8-footer, which wiped them out. "We were in the tube with no place to go," paddler Henry Ayau was quoted as saying.

In 1977, 12 canoes swamped or capsized, or both, in the heavy surf and two of the koa boats suffered structural damage as well. Bailing buckets replaced paddlers in several events.

In 1979, Waikiki Surf Club's 46year-old koa canoe, Malia, lost its bow in a collision with another canoe. Miraculously, with temporary repairs, she finished the regatta. She was repaired and is still being used today.

In 1980, OHCRA decided to allow clubs the option of using koa or fiberglass canoes in the Macfarlane race. The newly repaired Malia was the only koa canoe in the regatta.

In 1981, the Malia was damaged again when another canoe rammed into her causing four 30-foot and three 20-foot cracks in her side.

In 1985, Fred Hemmings was steering the Boys 18 crew when he yelled at them to jump out of the boat just before they hit a big wave. The canoe, suddenly some 1,000 pounds lighter without its crew, eased over the wave. The boys scrambled back in and won the race.



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OCC Team Challenges Mauna Kea in 200 Mile Enduro Race

After two days of rain, this year's 200-mile, two-day, timekeeping, enduro got off the blocks to a scrambling start for the OCC team. Jimbo Beaumont had one very unwilling motorcycle and Team Captain Walter Guild had a flat tire on the starting line.

The first day took its toll on 20 riders of the 75 that started the race. Father and son team Beaumont were among the day's casualties. A broken radiator and fuel problems in the toughest section caused John and Jimbo to exceed the one hour grace period allowed per section.

Our other team riders, Brant Ackerman, Mike Sheehan and Walter were working their way through bowling ball size rocks, mini-lakes and more rain in tree planners section.

Thanks to our traveling MASH unit and pit crew chief Tiare Ma-Moto Finney, Walter was cleaned up, bandaged up and after lunch took off on a fast trip around Mauna Kea.

Second day started at Pohakuloa

Military Reservation and after a morning of lava roads, went into miles of water crossings. The number one killer lake was appropriately named, "The Koi Pond" by our host, the Rock Island Riders.

This is where the OCC pit crew really got to see our team in action and watch a bunch of other riders turn their motorcycles into very unwilling submarines.

At the end of the second day and

the finish of the race, both riders and bikes looked as if they had been dragged across the 200 mile course.

The overall winner was City Councilman John DeSoto, his sixth 200 win. Second was Steve Zoll of the Big Island and third went to David Amorin, Kauai's hot rider.

A very special award was presented to John Beaumont as the most seasoned rider in this year's race.

Also picking up some wood was Walter who placed third in the open class. Brant finished sixth in the 250 cc class, Mike was sixth in the 200 cc class and the OCC team came in fourth overall.


Junior Tennis

In the world of junior volleyball, the opportunity to compete in the annual USVBA Junior Olympics is the goal of hundreds of youth teams throughout the country.

Last year, our boys finished fifth out of a competitive field of 32 teams entered in the 18 and under division and narrowly missed the chance of playing in the championship game before an audience of 200 teams.

On the return flight home, the boys vowed to return this year and make a stronger showing against great competition. This year's tournament will be held in Fort Collins, Colorado, July 4-9.

Since February, the boys have been living up to their vows by working out three times a week, including scrimmages with the Outrigger Open, Masters and Golden Masters teams, plus great showings in the weekend A tournaments and a trip to the Haili Tournament in Hilo.

On May 21, the hard work and team intensity paid off with their convincing wins over three other boy's teams for the Aloha Regional Championship, thereby assuring themselves of a high seed in the opening rounds of the Junior Olympics.

Daily workouts began in June, along with daily work projects to earn \$4,000 to cover trip expenses in excess of the Club sponsorship. Jobs to date include house moves, major yard cleanups, warehouse restocking, staffing for the Pro Beach Volleyball Tournament, etc.

If you have a work project this summer, if only for a few hours, and would like to make a donation for the team services, please leave word at the Front Desk or contact one of the boys. Work can be performed in July and August after they return from the tournament.

The core of the team are the Punahou varsity boys who live on the sand courts at the Club and include the State Player of the Year. To this team have been added Brad Stewart, runnerup Player of the Year from state second place team, University High School, and Dave Williams, Maui Player of the Year.

As a tribute to the Club's volleyball

environment, it should be noted that three of the Punahou seniors on the team have been recruited by colleges in the national final four. Stevie Li will be entering UC Santa Barbara and David Stackhouse and Jeff Stevens will be teammates at George Mason University.

Other members of the team are John Cheever, who will be an architectural student at Cornell, Ryan Gilbert, Rickey Humphreys, Deke Kilpatrick, Lee LeGrande, Kanoa Ostrem and Wayne Seligson.

The coaches are Chris McLachlin, Peter Balding Jr. and Bob Riley for weight training. Dr. Bill Stevens will be a dorm chaperone and Robbie Ostrem is investing in a new VCR camera to record all the action.

Last year, the boys were recognized as the best dressed team and gained respect and popularity from the spectators for their sportsmanship which was an example to younger teams at the tournament.

This year, Club member Bill Thompson has emerged as the major donor by arranging for Asics Tiger to provide the team with a complete uniform, including the latest model of volleyball shoes. Asics Tiger is associated with the top collegiate volleyball teams, including the UH Rainbows, and the Outrigger boys are the only boy's team they are sponsoring nationally which is a credit to the Club program.

Other clothing sponsors are Jon Andersen, Riggers Hawaii; Dale Hope, Hawaiian Style; Vik Watumull, Happy Shirts plus a work project; and the Cheevers of The Bikeway with water bottles.

Following the Junior Olympics, Stevie Li will be reporting to the USVA Elite Junior Training Camp to be held at the University of Colorado at Boulder. He was one of 36 boys and 36 girls who are high school seniors selected nationally, and the only Hawaii representative.

To add fun and a sharp edge to playing skills, players from last year's team who went on to play in college have formed a scrimmage team. They include Leon Devaney, a member of the USC national championship team; Tony McInerny and David Porteus, San Diego State; Hoku Swartman, Loyola-Marymount, and Russell Nitta, Menlo.

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



Fitness or optimal health can be achieved in a painless, pleasant, non-stressful way. There are many aspects of optimal health, such as exercise, diet, weight control, stress reduction, good sleep, etc.

Agony, pain and grimacing do not describe a good fitness exercise program.

The OCC Board of Directors has chosen to address the exercise portion of fitness for its non-competitive members, those who are not on one of the Club's athletic teams.

This broad category probably includes most adults who do not have known heart disease and are not exercising regularly.

If an adult wishes to embark on a "logical" fitness exercise program,

Outrigger to Have a Golf Team?

Should Outrigger have a golf team? Well, why not? The Club sponsors tennis, softball and even motorcycle racing. Why not golf?

With nearly 300 players a year, the Club golf tournaments have one of the highest levels of participation by Club members of any sport.

Golf Chairman Jim Hammons is exploring the possibility of the OCC and our golfers joining the Hawaii State Golf Association. As members of the HSGA, the Outrigger and its players could take advantage of the U.S. Golf Association's Handicap and Information Network (GHIN).

The GHIN maintains computerized handicap information on all its members. With established, centrally maintained handicaps, Hammons thinks it might be possible to arrange for competitive golf matches for the Club team.

A show of hands at the Olomana Tournament indicated that a considerable number of our golfers are interested in pursuing this plan further.

If you'd like to add your two-cents, contact Hammons or any member of the Golf Committee.

there are some very basic steps one needs to follow:

- Insofar as possible, be SAFE! This
 can be accomplished using simple
 medical tools--resting
 electrocardiogram, exercise
 electrocardiogram (treadmill stress
 test), limited physical exam,
 coronary artery disease history, and
 some simple blood tests
 (hemoglobin, cholesterol,
 triglyceride, fasting blood sugar).
- Have an individualized exercise prescription, based on conditioning, age, medications, etc.
- Undergo a graded program of exercising with instruction and monitoring.
- Learn how to monitor yourself to evaluate effectiveness, as well as to know signs of danger.
- This program encompassing the above principals has been approved by the OCC Board of Directors for the membership.

A medically supervised group program, to be done at the OCC, is being offered. It is targeted to begin in September/October, 1988. The coed group size will be limited to 25 participants.

The proposed program has two main phases--testing and monitored exercise instruction.

Phase I will include the resting ECG, the TST, blood tests, cardiac/fitness history and limited physician exam. This will take roughly three hours per person and will all be done at the OCC.

Phase II will consist of 10 one-hour sessions over a two-week period. The primary teaching device is walking, but much emphasis is spent on using this system to transition to other more exciting activities.

It is guaranteed that at the end of the 10 sessions each participant will be up to 30 minutes of sustained exercise to the prescribed heart rate and will have gotten there painlessly.

Each person will be knowledgeable and safe to pursue their own ongoing exercise regimen. That could take many forms such as weight lifting, canoe paddling, kayaking, jogging, etc. For a fitness goal, it should be understood that 30 minutes of daily exercise at the prescribed heart rate, done five out of seven days a week, will suffice nicely. It is also a realistic goal for non-competitors.

(Competitive fitness is quite a different matter and can be discussed at a later time.)

The after effects of proper exercise should be a comfortably tired feeling for approximately 30 minutes and then a feeling of invigoration. If one is dragged out and exhausted, then there is something wrong with the program.

Costs for the itemized ingredients would exceed \$600. The Board has negotiated a \$300 all inclusive price and this amount can be charged on one's OCC bill.

Members and their guests are invited to attend festivities at the Club on the 4th of July. The evening party is not open to nonmembers or unaccompanied guests.


This year for the first time, members will be required to purchase tickets for themselves and their guests to gain admission to the Club on the evening of the 4th.
