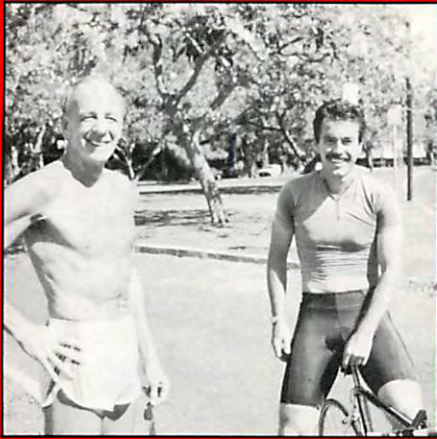

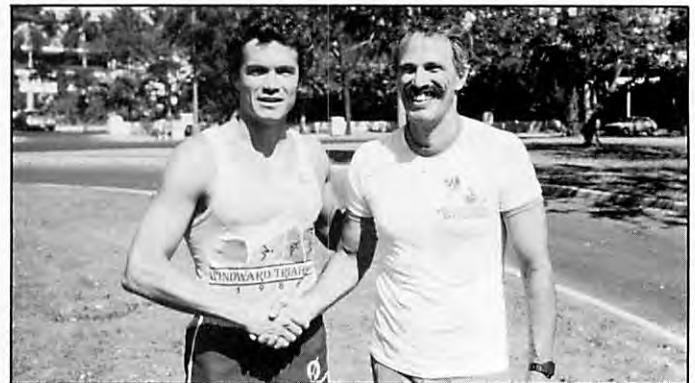
Club Day wound up with a tug-of-war and the ever-popular steak fry on the Terrace. ☺

# New Life Member – Club Architect Vladimir Ossipoff

For his longtime history of architectural services to the Club, 80-year-old Vladimir Ossipoff was awarded a Life Membership in the Outrigger Canoe Club.

The award was recommended by the Historical Committee, approved by the Board of Directors and ratified by the general membership at the Annual Meeting in February.

Ossipoff, born in Vladivostok, Russia, was a graduate of the University of California, and has been a member of the Outrigger for 38 years. He was awarded a Senior Membership in February, 1975.

A past president of the Hawaii Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, he did his first architectural work for the Club in 1949 at the old



location.

When the lease at the old location neared its termination, several alternatives were offered to the Club: remain under a new lease which contained what most members considered unacceptable provisions, (for example, limited space, loss of control of club usage, reduction of facilities) or move to a new location and build a high rise, or move to a new location and build a low rise.

When it was decided to move to the present location, about 300 members resigned, saying "nobody would ever go way out to Kapiolani Park." After the new club was occupied, a number of them returned to the fold.

For the proposed new building, Ossipoff, at the direction of the Board of Directors, submitted a plan for a high rise Club/apartment complex, which was attractive to many members.

Ward Russell, who was Club President at the time, says that the design was "one of the finest I have ever seen."

After further study, however, the Board of Directors abandoned that plan and adopted a Club-only concept.

Ossipoff then submitted to the membership his design for a low rise. He made a model, photographed it and then presented the proposal in slides.

His concept was one of openness, with the appearance of mass. His was the first use of coral rock imbedded in

coral aggregate concrete.

He points out that the three level concept--Hau Terrace, Bar level and the Dining Room--allows each level unrestricted view of the sea.

The pillars, even though they give the appearance of mass, are not load bearing, he says. They would not support a second floor. It would be a tremendous expense and destroy his low rise concept to attempt a second level, he says.

Construction was commenced just seven months after the Club-only decision was made and completed in 12 months. The move from the old club was made in January, 1964.

Val takes great pride in our building and properly so. It has won a number of awards for design and for utilization of space. Even at age 80, he is still active in the architectural field and keeps a fond and watchful eye on his prize winning creation.

We all owe a debt of gratitude to Vladimir Ossipoff for transforming a portion of an old Diamond Head landmark (the James B. Castle estate) into "a place where man may commune with sun and sand and sea, where good fellowship and aloha prevail and where the sports of Old Hawaii shall always have a home." 🍹

# '88 Regatta Season Opens June 5

The first green flag of the 1988 Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association regatta season will wave on Sunday, June 5 at Keehi Lagoon for the Healani Regatta.

All Club members are invited to come down and watch Outrigger's three-time defending state champions as they go for the gold one more time.

"We have experienced coaches and experienced paddlers," said Head Canoe Racing Coach Mike Fox. "We've worked very hard the last two months and I think we're going to have a very good season."

"We overcame our first obstacle in April, when we almost lost our practice site at the Ala Wai Canal. But thanks to Mayor Frank Fasi, Rep. Fred Hemmings, City Parks Director Hiram Kamaka and Rep. Joan Hayes, we were able to convince the City to reconsider use of our practice area as part of the reconstruction of the Ala

Wai Golf Course," Fox said.

"The Kaoloa (our newest koa canoe) is in excellent shape. Wayne Faulkner has been sprucing her up and we're looking forward to some fast races. We also have the Leilani (an older koa canoe) ready if we need her."

This year, Fox has formed a new subcommittee which he has dubbed the "Fun Club Subcommittee."

"Their function is to plan special events, create race themes and in general promote unity, enthusiasm and club spirit. This extra boost plus hard work, should help us reach our goal--an undefeated season."

This year, Outrigger will be able to field crews in just about all races, but still welcomes paddlers in all divisions. If you would like to paddle, see Mike or Canoe Racing Committee Chairperson Bonnie Judd as soon as possible to sign up.

"I'd like to thank Dome and Paul of the Club staff and our other loyal helpers for their continuing efforts in maintaining and upgrading some of our special training facilities," he added.

Fox has been paddling for OCC for 13 years and has been on state championship teams as a novice B, freshman, sophomore and last year as a junior paddler.

He paddled on Outrigger's record setting Molokai crew in 1984 and was on the 1985 crew that finished second in koa.

He coached the boy's 16 crew for two years.

"Just because we've won in the past, doesn't mean we're going to win this year," Fox said. "We have to work twice as hard as everyone else if we want to stay number one."

"I hope that everyone in our paddling program will come to regattas early and cheer on the kids in the morning and root for the upper division paddlers in the afternoon. Bring leis for your teammates and your friends, yell and scream and let everybody know that Outrigger is the best!"

Other races slated this month are June 12 at Kailua Beach Park, June 19 at Nanakuli and June 26 at Waimanalo. All start at 8:30 a.m. ☺

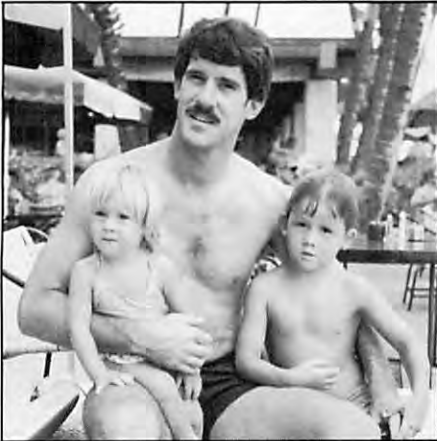
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## OCC Water Polo Practice Begins

1938--Short on cash, down to less than 300 members and faced with an expired lease, OCC accepted the offer of a sub-lease of 25 years of 46,000 beachfront square feet at \$300 a month from Hawaiian Hotels Ltd., owner of the neighboring Royal Hawaiian and Moana Hotels.

## 40 Years Ago

1948--The good canoe "Captain" was restored to sailing condition and the 11 members qualified to paddle it, included Duke P. Kahanamoku, David Kahanamoku, Sally Hale, Dad Center and Charlie Amalu.

## 30 Years Ago

1958--The business directory of OCC members listed Chuck Weaver, Morris Motors; Bill Morris, "all kinds of insurance"; Spence and Cliff Weaver, Spencecliff Restaurants; Granie Abbott, "Trader Vic's"; Jack Magoon, Hawaii Linen Supply; and Shirley Olds, real estate.

## 20 Years Ago

1968--The Kamehameha Day Regatta won three firsts for Coach Mark Buck. The 14-and-under crew was steered by Keone Downing in his first year with OCC. Boys 18 included Tommy Arnott in his first canoe race. Jody D'Enbeau also raced over the Pali to attend his UH graduation and receive his Army commission in full uniform, then back to Kailua to set the pace for the record breaking Freshmen Crew that included Tom Conner, Tony Crabb, Bill Eggers, Tom Bean and Butch Ledford.

## 10 Years Ago

1978--Distaff Notes: Judi Andersen, daughter of Joan and John Andersen, was chosen Miss USA. Jan Newhart set a new U.S. record in the 1,500 meter run for her age group and Gay Austin set an age group world record in the javelin and U.S. and Hawaiian records in the triple jump. 🏹

# BOARD BRIEFS

**Treasurer's Report:** The financial statement for the period ending March 31, 1988, net income year-to-date was \$17,637 which is \$8,182 better than budget and \$3,657 better than last year . . . Member's equity is \$5,403,219 which represents an increase of .9%.

**Secretary's Report:** Three members were suspended for 15 days for failure to pay their accounts on time.

**Manager's Report:** Lights on the top level of the parking structure addition have been installed and are in operation. Lighting and landscaping of the entry circle is completed . . . Combined food and beverage income for the month of March was \$13,212 with a gain of 5.4% over March, 1987. . . The Board reviewed and approved the Surf Ski/Kayak Stall Policies and Procedures. . . The MBA students have completed their review and have

scheduled a meeting with the Board to present their findings and recommendations.

**Admissions and Membership Report:** Membership count is 3,959 as of March 31, 1988.

**Building and Grounds Report:** Weight Room expansion plans are ongoing and additional funds were granted for carpeting and other necessary improvements. . . Installation of a fence to solve the wind problems coming from the mauka side of the volleyball court was approved. . . The Manager will relocate the Sunfish storage in order to have more sand area for Club members.

**House Report:** Board suggested that a joint House and Building and Grounds ad hoc committee be formed to develop a proposal for the use of the Duke Room. . . Food and Beverage subcommittee will evaluate the Club's food and beverage service to determine if the service now provided can be improved. . . A study will be conducted of the employee compensation and benefit programs to determine whether the Club's pay scales and employee benefit package is competitive with regard to attracting and retaining employees.

**Athletics Report:** \$1,280 was approved for eight paddlers to participate in the Molokai-to-Oahu kayak race. . . Design of paddling T-shirt and shorts with OCC logo was approved.

**Long Range Planning Report:** The following committee members were approved: Donald Biddle, Jason Oliver, Hal Henderson, Hank Reese, Mary Philpotts McGrath and Richard Sylva.

**Entertainment Committee Report:** Manager reported both the Winged "O" Party and the St. Patrick's Day Party were successful. Entertainment by 3 Scoops of Aloha was extremely good and to the member's liking. The Manager also reported the Fashion Show has increased lunches by 35% compared to last year.

**Public Relations Report:** Committee expressed concern that children have been observed in the bar area unsupervised. Manager indicated it is the

**Old Business:** Offsite warehouse space lease agreement was approved. . . Equipment for the Ladies Mini Weight Room was approved with concern shown about the presence of small children in that area. Sign to be posted and enforced ABSOLUTELY NO CHILDREN ALLOWED. . .

Funds were granted to replace old outboard engine on one of Club's 17-foot Boston Whalers. . . Ad hoc committee to be formed to review all Club's insurance policies. . . Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation granted permission to solicit general membership to purchase Christmas trees. There will be a substantial savings to members and proceeds to go into the Foundation fund.
