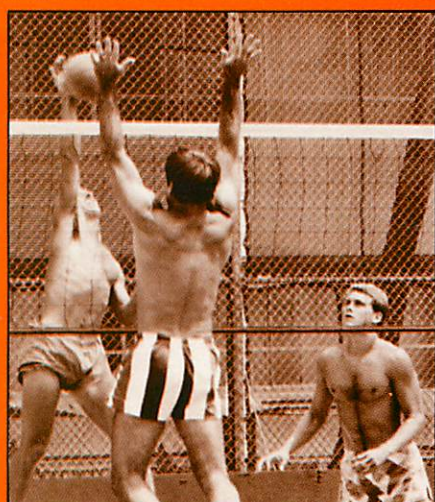
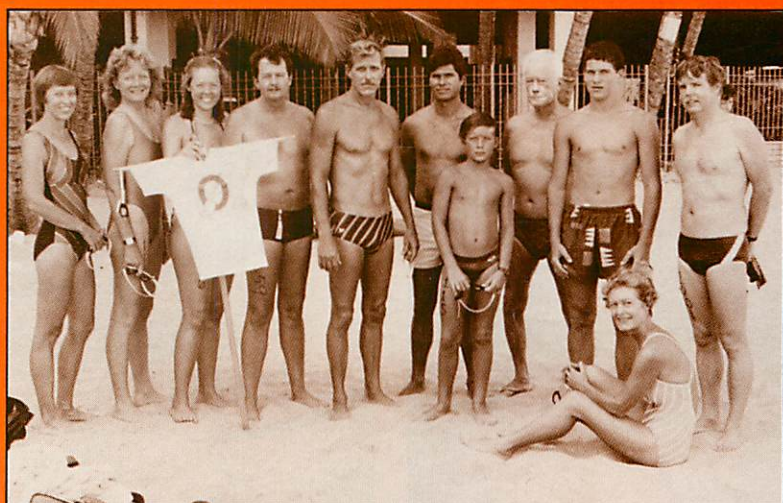
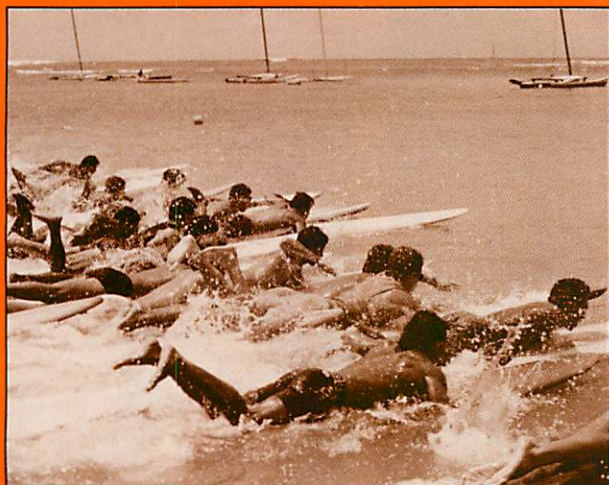

Harry Shaffer's yacht on Lake Erie near Cleveland carries the Outrigger burgee. According to **Bill Capp**, Harry was a very active Club member in

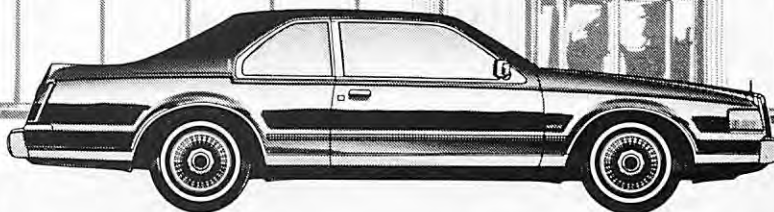
the late '40s and is now a supporter of the Club from Ohio . . .

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Long Distance Canoe Racing

The Club's upper division paddlers were very busy during the months of August and September as they turned to distance paddling.

The season began with Outrigger sending men's and women's crews to the Newport to Catalina race on August 16 and 17.

The women's crew of Mary Franco, Tiare Finney, Muffer Scully, Kaiulu Downing, Paula Carbone, Jeanne Jenkins, Sandra Haine, Donna Kahakui and Pii Schneider finished second behind Off Shore Canoe Club in the 26-mile event from Newport to Catalina.

The following day, the men's crew of Tom Conner, Walter Guild, Chris Kincaid, Bill Bright, Keone Downing, Kainoa Downing, Steve Van Lier Ribbink, Scott Rolles and Mark Rigg, paddled 28 miles from Catalina back to Newport. They finished third behind Tahiti and Imua. The top three canoes finished within five minutes of each other, all beating last year's record by 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, other Outrigger crews participated in the 19th annual Duke Kahanamoku Race on August 17. The men raced 22 miles from Magic Island to Kailua Beach finishing 4th in

3:24:35. The women raced from Kailua Beach to Bird Island and returned. They finished 10th in the open in :53:58.25 and second in the

masters in :56:11.95

Outrigger sponsored the Dad Center Race on August 23 under high surf conditions. OCC's women successfully defended their championship by finishing the estimated 22-mile course from Kailua Boat Ramp to Outrigger in 3:36:04 in a koa canoe. Outrigger's second crew finished third in fiberglass division and fourth overall in 3:50:33.

On the Labor Day weekend, OCC sent crews to the Queen Liliuokalani Race in Kailua. The women's A crew won the 11-mile race in 1:29:54. The masters women finished third.

The men raced 17 miles from Honaunau to Kailua and won in 2:09. The masters men won and were 10th overall.

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Cline Mann Summer Ocean Paddle Board Race

Fifty-four members and non-members paddled 5,000-meters (3.11 miles) in the 2nd Annual Cline Mann Summer Ocean Paddle Board Race, August 9.

The race was on surfboards and raceboards from the Outrigger Beach, on a T-shaped course around three buoys up to Tonggs, then down to the wall near the old Chris Holmes estate (Queen's Surf), then back to the first buoy and into the channel.

First to finish was Aaron Napoleon, pushed by Chris Moore and several other competitive paddlers including Outrigger's own Buzzy Kerbox, Ian Emberson and Heath Hemmings, who

finished third, fourth and fifth overall. The first 10 participants broke last year's record.

OCC's Sara Ackerman won the women's paddle board division and Kuumomi Ho won the women's surfboard division.

Hemmings won the boy's paddle board division, while OCC's Dione Wilbur won the girl's surfboard division.

Cline, in whose honor the race is named, has done a tremendous amount to keep the sport of paddle boarding alive. The ball is now beginning to be carried by others as evi-

denced by the July 4th race at Waimea Bay in which 115 racers competed.

Outrigger usually has about 10 members compete in the paddle board races because of the limited amount of equipment available. The Club has five boards which are available for members to use. In addition, several members have their own equipment. In the surfboard class, more equipment is available and this division is growing.

All participants are invited for lunch following the race, and will receive a t-shirt.

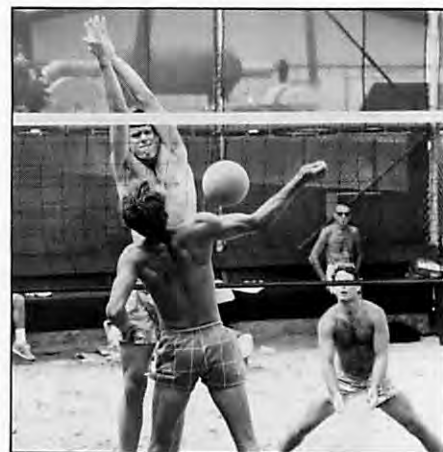



Participants may choose to enter only the Castle Swim or may continue on with the biking and running events.

Triathlon awards will be given to winners in the following categories: Juniors (19 and under), Adults (20-39), Masters (40 and over), mixed teams and family teams.

Swim participants will receive awards at a beach breakfast immediately following the Castle Swim. Triathlon participants will receive awards at the 11 a.m. traditional pre-Marathon brunch.

Entry forms are available at the Front Desk. Please complete and return by November 15.

Log Those Miles

All swimmers who log miles either at home or at the Club, get those miles posted in the Club logs by November 15.

Mileage awards will be given on November 30 after the Castle Swim.

If you are not planning on entering the Castle Swim but expect to have a mileage award, sign up on the Castle Swim signup sheet at the Front Desk and indicate you are coming for a mileage trophy and you'll also receive breakfast.

All mileage for 1986 should be totalled up.

Mileage trophies will be given in these categories: 100, 250, 500, 750, 1,000, 2,000, 2,225 (the Transpac Award), 3,000 and 4,000 miles.

Triathlon event, therefore:

Registration at the Hau Terrace is 7 a.m. At registration, numbers will be assigned. Please do not grease up before hand or the marking pen won't take.

When everyone is accounted for, course instructions will be given, and all swimmers will be transported to the startline in OCC vehicles. Escorts and boards can go along in the pick-up. Escort canoes or kayaks will then paddle to the first turning buoy.

No swimmers will be allowed to register after registration closes or at the starting line. You must register at the Hau Terrace. It is highly recommended that you sign up at the Front Desk as soon as possible:

- It speeds up registration considerably because your name and age group can be recorded expeditiously.
- If for any reason you are delayed, then your registration signifies your intent to be there.
- So that enough breakfast can be

ordered for you and your escort.

This is a fun swim. Young members, senior swimmers, all members are welcome. You must have your own membership number to participate. The course is U shaped, approximately 1 1/2 miles, with two left turns and the finish line is on the sand between the entry walls to the Club beach.

Please provide your own escort on a board, kayak or canoe. Some Club equipment is available for those who know how to use it. Your escort need not be a Club member.

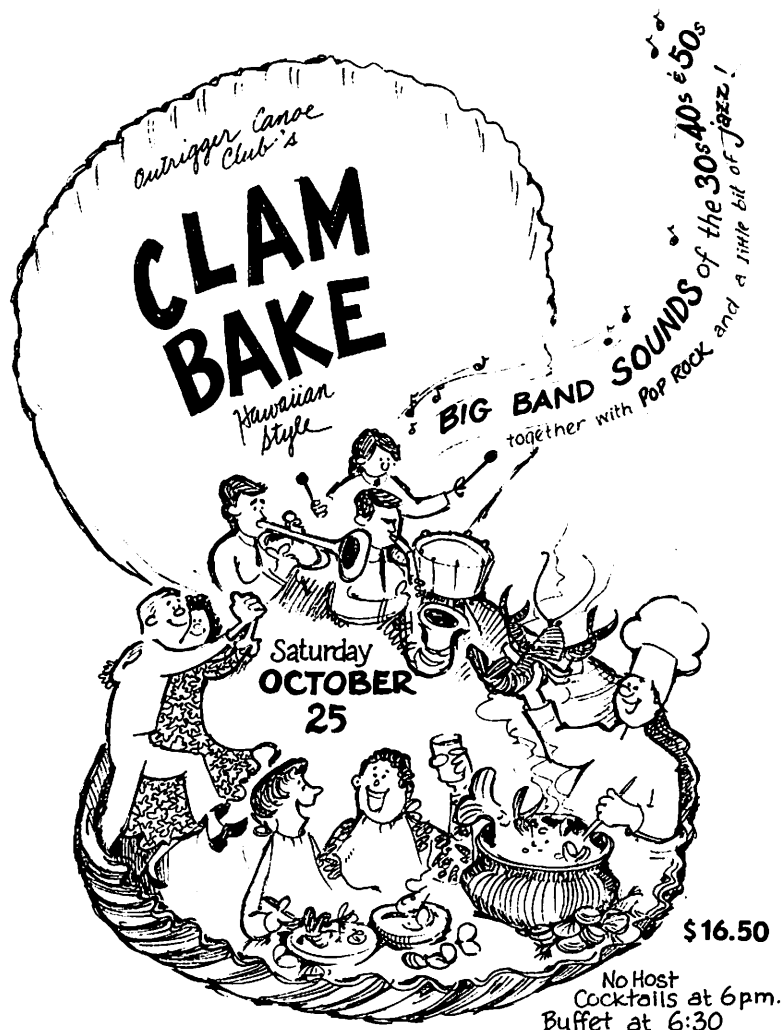
