

# Club Day '86 a Real Winner

Club Day 1986 was one of the best in the Club's history as nearly 100 members turned out to run, swim, bike, paddle, spike, kayak, watch the Kentucky Derby, eat, drink, dance and be merry.

May 3rd started with 22 members appearing at 7 a.m. for the first annual Run-Bike event. The names of all competitors were put in a hat and teams were drawn. It was up to the pair to decide who would run around Kapiolani Park and who would bike to the Arco station in Kahala and back.

Thirty-one minutes and forty-three seconds later, after Kimo Austin had run the lap around the park, and Steve Timpson had sprinted on his bike to the finish line at the Kalakaua Avenue fountain in front of the Elks Club, the pair was declared the winner. Andrea Lehman and Dale Hope were second, and Diane Stowell and Kent Davenport finished third.

The action then moved to the beach for the Ocean Triathlon. It consisted of a 700-yard swim out past the windsock and back, a paddleboard race along the same course and finished with a 1,400-yard kayak race (two times out and back).

Again, the teams were drawn from a hat, and had to decide who would do each event. The team of Kisi Haine (swimmer), Karl Heyer IV (paddleboard) and Mary Franco (kayak) won the event in :27:53. Right behind them were Diane Stowell, Roger Cundall and Mike Town in :27:19.

After the Kentucky Derby and some

refreshments, the afternoon activity began.

First up was the volleyball game in which eight teams participated. Winning the volleyball game was the team of Kisi Haine, Karl Heyer IV, Janice McPheeters, Michael Scott, Shandy Danford and Grant Senner.

Then it was back to the ocean for the canoe race. Frogman Brant Ackerman added a little excitement to the race when he managed to flip the finalists in the event while they were waiting for the start of the race. After bailing out the canoes, the race got underway and the winners were Peter Balding Jr., Susan Baron, CeeCee Sheehan, Randy Shibuya, Jeanne Jenkins and Roger

Since the second place finishers in the volleyball game and canoe race were the winners of the other event, a swim off was held to determine the champion. Each team member had to swim out to the windsock and then back. The final overall champion was Kisi Haine's team which won the swimoff.

If that wasn't enough, attention was then turned to the sand for the popular flag race, the final event of the day. Sand flew in all directions as competitors vied for the flag in the elimination contest. The winners were Ryan Haneberg in the Boys 10 and under event; Ian Moore in the Boys 10-16; Mike Sheehan in the Men 16-35; John Finney in the Men over 40; and Michele St. John in the women's category.

After the athletic events, the action turned to the Terrace for a Steak Fry, entertainment and dancing.

### The Tale of the Wounded Turtle

Was that a knife in Turtle's shoulder?

I peered through the slightly murky water. Yes, the left flipper was

dragging. Turtle was hurt.

On each of my three-times-a-week swims at our Outrigger beach I made it a practice to say hello to Turtle and bring greetings from my children Twain and Tracy on the mainland. Today (mid-March), Turtle didn't respond, just paddled around weakly near a coral reef.

What to do? I certainly didn't want Turtle to end up on someone's dinner table. Turtles have been around for over 75 million years, long before man, but now a person has caused this existence to be threatened.

It took half a dozen telephone calls to various local, state and federal agencies before I reached the right person, George Balaz, a zoologist and turtle expert with the National Marine Fisheries Service. Following his instructions, I watched Turtle for a

couple of weeks and reported to him the times and locations of the sightings. George determined when we might mount a rescue effort. On that day, I was ready in my bathing suit and goggles but George showed up dressed for hiking through the brush! He explained that wrestling a turtle underwater around coral reefs can lead to more than a few abrasions.

I could see his point; the last time I took a guest out to see Turtle, my guest got all cut up.

After a few miscues, I led George to Turtle's lair. George immediately recognized the problem. The 250-pound female Turtle had a large fishing lure imbedded in her shoulder and some of the leader was wrapped about the left flipper.

Directing me to stay back, George dived and then surfaced with his arms wrapped about Turtle. I could certainly see the necessity for George's protective clothing.

When we reached the beach, I had to explain to some angry beachgoers that George was not taking Turtle to the stew pot but to the hospital.

George surgically removed the hook and unwrapped the leader from Turtle's flipper, and Turtle was soon back in the sea.

George said that Turtle is from French Frigate Shoals and will return there to breed upon reaching maturity.

It was a thrill to see Turtle swimming off to freedom and the crowds on the beach told George he was a hero. George told me I was the hero. We weren't thinking of heroism, just a simple act of love for a hurting friend.

As Clint Eastwood says: it "made our day."

### Life Member—George Freitas

It was 1925.

He was 19. The Outrigger Canoe Club was 17.

He was a senior at St. Louis College (presently known as St. Louis High School) where he competed in track.

A friend, Bernard Farden, asked him to be the fourth man on the Outrigger Canoe Club team in the University of Hawaii-sponsored Rainbow Relays. "I wasn't even sure where the Outrigger was located," he confides. The rest is history.

George E. Freitas was part of the foursome which came in first in the Quarter Mile Relay.

Weekends thereafter, George swam and surfed at the Outrigger. He also entertained semi-professionally at the Ala Moana Pavilion and other entertainment spots of that era playing steel guitar, piano and ukulele.

Four years at the University of Dayton where he earned an engineering degree ensued. While at Dayton, George participated in track competitions with other colleges and universities such as Cornell and Ohio State.

Returning to his Honolulu home, George worked for his family firm, Henry Freitas, Builder, and subsequently advanced through various positions to that of general superintendent and project manager. In 1938, he founded Pacific Construction Company, Ltd. serving as president and chairman of the board. Several engineering and development companies followed.

He was the low bidder for the construction of the present Club. George Freitas again carried the OCC forward to a winning position.

He describes in detail when asked the process used in the fabrication of the almost maintenance-free sandstone and concrete walls and pillars which so many identify as unique to the Club.

Some have commented on the motif as suggestive of 'the island chain in a sea of sand,' beckoning the diner's glance seaward to view the sports at sea or 'the green flash' or to check the surf.

George smiles and with a shrug signifying it's all in a day's work, he explains the process—adding that Val Ossipoff, the architect, drew the plans. From the ninteenth floor of the Amfac Building, George still fields strategies, advises and/or serves as a consultant for the Pacific Development Company. A man who has lived life fully, he speaks of his present. "Me—retire? Never." With a sweep of his hand towards the ocean from his office, "This is my plaything."

Travel with his wife Melinda is now in leisurely style—by ship—after many years of taking the quickest mode—by air. Golf has been a later discovery and one he keenly enjoys at least twice a week

On February 26, 1986, the Outrigger Canoe Club Board of Directors designated George E. Freitas a Life Member. As a man whose lifespan—80 years on December 2, 1985—has paralleled the life of the club, more than once George's participation has made a difference.

The Outrigger Canoe Club will never stop needing George.





### **OCC Admissions Procedures**

The purpose of this article is to let the membership know how the Admissions and Membership Committee arrives at its decisions concerning the acceptance or rejection of applications for membership.

The Admissions Committee is guided by Section 28 of the By-Laws of the Outrigger Canoe Club. Generally, an applicant completes his or her application and submits it to the Business Office. The applicant must have a sponsor and a co-sponsor.

Each application is divided into membership classes as specified in Section 27 of the By-Laws. The application is placed in chronological order in its respective membership classification. Applications are considered based on chronological order.

Aside from non-resident applications, which will be discussed below, chronological order is strictly adhered to. (It does not matter who the applicant knows, who his or her



relatives are, how long he or she has lived in Hawaii, etc., chronological order is maintained.)

Within a year of the applicant being considered for membership, the applicant's name is posted on the bulletin board and included in an insert with the monthly billing. Voting members are given an opportunity to comment, pro or con, on separate questionnaire. Comments concerning applicants are held in strict confidence and procedures are set up so that only the Committee is aware of the comments. Written comments are destroyed after action is taken.

One of the applicant's sponsors then appears before the Committee to tell the Committee about the applicant and to answer any questions the Committee may have. After the sponsor is interviewed, the Committee discusses and votes whether or not to interview the applicant. If a majority of the Committee believes the applicant should be further considered, the applicant is invited to appear before the Committee, usually at the next meeting.

At the next meeting of the Committee, the applicant will appear before the Committee, with spouse if married, together with one of the sponsors, to be interviewed. After that interview, a discussion and vote is taken. All Committee decisions, based on a majority vote, are subject to final approval by the Board of Directors.

In considering whether to accept or reject applicants, the Committee's decisions by their nature are subjective. However, the Committee make-up is diverse enough so that many points of view are represented.

Among other things, we try to consider the goals of the Club, whether the applicant and spouse would be compatible with the existing membership, whether a contribution would be made to the Club by serving on athletic teams and/or Club Committees.

The impression made by the applicant and spouse at the interview is also important. The discussions and reasons for the decision by the Committee are confidential.

Once a Committee decision is made and approved by the Board of Directors, the Committee will not immediately reconsider its decision. However, the applicant may renew his or her application and be considered again following a year from the date of rejection.

Up until this year, non-resident applicants were taken on an "as available" basis. In other words, whenever a non-resident was going to be in town, subject to time constraints, the non-resident would be considered irrespective of any chronological order. As of this year, non-residents are to be considered in chronological order. This means that the person whose application has been on file the longest will be considered first.



### An Advisory to All Club Members

To protect the Club's liquor license, The Board of Directors has directed my staff and I to strictly enforce all established Club liquor rules.

As a reminder, Club rules provide that:

- Members and guests under the legal drinking age are prohibited from purchasing, being served or consuming alcoholic beverages anywhere on the Club premises.
- Legal drinking age now is 18.
   Effective October 1st it will be 21 years of age.
- Legal identification as to age or Club affiliation is required when the server

is in doubt.

- Bringing alcoholic beverages onto Club premises including the parking areas and volleyball courts is prohibited. (Beer and wine coolers, etc. are not exempted.)
- Only liquor provided by our bar services is authorized and is not to be taken from the Club; it is to be consumed only in areas and during hours authorized by the management. Taking drinks to the public beach, locker rooms or other unauthorized area is prohibited.

Please be advised, that these Club rules will be enforced and violators subjected to suspension or expulsion for cause by the Board of Directors. The assistance and cooperation of all Club members—particularly parents of affected minors—is respectfully requested.



### Club Employees to Have New Look


