

Macfarlane Regatta Highlights 4th of July Celebration




The 4th of July began with a breakfast buffet at the Club.

From sunrise until the wee hours of the morning, Outrigger Canoe Club paddlers, their families and friends celebrated the 4th of July and the 42nd annual Walter J. Macfarlane Regatta.

The day began with a buffet breakfast on the Terrace. Paddlers filled up on eggs, sausage and bacon, hash brown potatoes, Danish pastries, juices and coffee and then gathered for a pep rally and blessing.

Around 8 a.m. the group marched en masse from the Club down to Waikiki Beach toting paddles, coolers, beach chairs and families, setting up camp in front of the Outrigger Hotel.

Outrigger has sponsored the Macfarlane Regatta since 1943. It is the oldest continuous canoe race in Hawaii.

The surf was up all week prior to the race, and the waves provided thrill after thrill for the crews who surfed the waves to victory. Experienced steersmen replaced regular steersmen for the day for safety. Outrigger raced crews in 28 events, winning the Regatta with 104 points.

The Club was packed on the evening of the 4th with Outrigger members and guests, and paddlers from many other canoe clubs who were invited for the traditional steak fry, dancing and fireworks that followed.

All of those who participated wished fervently that the 5th of July could have been designated a holiday rather than a back-to-work day.





Paddlers Have Successful Start

All the hard work, sweat, sore muscles and sunburns, paid off as Outrigger paddlers won the first four regattas of the Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association 1985 season, going over the century mark in all four.

Club crews opened the season in the Kamehameha Regatta at Kailua Beach Park by scoring 102 points. The following week at the Leeward Regatta at Nanakuli Beach Park, OCC teams tallied 106 points. In week three, Outrigger won the Waimanalo Regatta with 108 points and on June 30 scored a season-high 116 points to win the Healani Regatta at Keehi Lagoon.


Ten of the Club's crews were undefeated in the first four races—the Boy's 14, 16 and 18's; Girl's 13, 14 and 18's; the Men's Novice B, Sophomore and Senior crews; and the Women's

Junior's.

Many more crews finished first or second in every race including the Women's Freshmen, Senior, Senior Masters, Novice A and B, and Open Four. For the men, first or second places were earned by the Novice A crew.

Coaches Henry Ayau and Walter Guild are extremely proud of all of the paddlers this year, especially the novice crews and new paddlers who have worked so hard and contributed so much to the winning effort.

Results of the John D. Kaupiko Regatta on July 14 at Kaneohe MCAS, the Oahu Championships on July 21 and the State Championships on Aug. 3 will be reported in the September Outrigger.










It's the month of August and time once again for our Masters Women's fun sprint regatta at the Diamond Head end of the Ala Wai Canal.

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

An island boy, his roots trace back through three generations of Portuguese ancestry. His mother was from Kona, and his late father Al, was from Honolulu. Another ambition is the creation of a video tape orientation program for new members. This could provide a background of the Club's fascinating history and discuss information that all new members need to know when joining.


Bob, his wife Marianna, and his grown children Susu Rolles and Steve Vieira, all enjoy membership.



Volleyball Tournaments


The summer outdoor volleyball season is underway and Outrigger teams will be hosting and competing in several tournaments this month.

Architect and Structural Engineer appeared before the Board to present plans for addition to and correction of existing parking structure. This was done at the request of the Building and Grounds Committee. . . . *Treasurer's Report:* Income year-to-date was \$37,970 higher than same period last year but \$8,539 lower than budget. Members' Equity year-to-date was \$4,045,681. . . . Ten members were suspended for 15 days due to their failure to pay their account on time.

Manager's Report: Consulting fee has been paid and construction will begin on new office air conditioner. Summary of Food and Beverage Departments was presented with poor reports for May. Beverage Operations continue to perform poorly with volume generated being under that of previous period. Manager stated summer months are traditionally better for Bar and volumes should increase. Discussion

was held on slow service on the Hau Terrace.

Admissions and Membership: The membership count as of May 31 was 3,802. . . . *Building and Grounds:* Funds were approved for Banner Construction to correct two Clubhouse roof drains. The O'Brien Corp. will replace glass panes at entrance to Board room. Hawaii Interior Specialists won bid to replace Business Office and Lobby ceiling. . . .

House Report: Action regarding smoking ban in Dining Room has been deferred until the results of the Food and Beverage Survey are tabulated. Requests were made to offer rice and brown gravy and beef stew and rice at the Snack Shop. Snack Shop will open at 7 a.m. on Saturdays on a trial basis.

Athletics/Winged "O": Paddleboard Committee requested that summer 10,000 meter race be changed to a 5,000 meter race. Outrigger team won the Hana Slowpitch Tournament and letter will be sent to Carl Lindquist, General Manager of Hana Maui Hotel, thanking him for the tremendous help he gave Club members. . . .

Public Relations: Committee recommended that Manager set up an orientation "tour" each month for new members. After much discussion Board directed Admissions and Membership Committee to draft a flyer, which would be sent to new members when they are elected, informing them of pertinent information regarding Club and asking them to contact their sponsor should they have any questions. Discussions are being held with the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation with the idea of merging into the Outrigger Foundation and combining the Foundation names. Approval was given for the design of T-shirts which would be sold at the Macfarlane Regatta on July 4th with proceeds going to the Foundation.


