

The Nationals: 1-2-3

The Outrigger Canoe Club teams won a first, a second and a third on the final day of the 53rd U.S. Volleyball Association nationals at Memphis, Tenn.

The Masters, (35 years and older) led by Jon Stanley, (most valuable player) and defending national champions, defeated Legends of San Diego; (5-15, 15-8, 15-7). The Masters All-American selections for First Team were Tom Madison, Jon Stanley (MVP) and Dave Shoji. Honorable Mention All-American: Tom Selleck.

The Outrigger men's open team won their pool. OCC defeated Ultimate Sports (13-11, 12-15, 15-5), and South Bay (11-15, 15-11, 15-8). Then it happened—Nautilus Pacifica defeated

OCC (15-11, 15-6) and Outrigger was in the losers' bracket. OCC defeated Malibu Volleyball Club (15-7, 2-15, 14-8) and Converse (15-6, 15-10).

The next day the OCC open team defeated Texas Stars (15-9, 15-8) in the final of the losers' bracket to meet the winners of the winners' bracket, Nautilus Pacifica. The Championship was won by Nautilus Pacifica (9-15, 11-11, 15-4)—OCC was second. The Rookie of the Year was men's open team member John Hanley, Men's open All-American 1st Team was Mark Rigg and Craig Buck.

OCC's Golden Masters (45 and older), the defending National Champions, won their pool but later lost one

match to place them in the losers' bracket. The final four teams were Ringwood, New Jersey; Virginia Beach, VA, OCC and Kansas City. Ringwood beat Virginia Beach for 1st place; Virginia Beach was 2nd place. OCC beat Kansas City, the team that had put OCC in the losers' bracket for 3rd place.

The games were split up between the Memphis State gym and the Naval Air Station gym. This made it hard for the players to watch the other games, as they were either playing or in a car traveling to another location.

It must be noted that all of the Outrigger teams were the favorites of the spectators.

An open letter from Tony Crabb, Coach, USA Men's Olympic Volleyball Team to Ron Sorrell, Director, USA Men's Olympic Volleyball Team

Dear Ron:

Here's an update on the USA Men's Olympic Volleyball team tour with Cuba. We left San Diego on April 1 and arrived in Ft. Lauderdale that afternoon. We had to charter a plane to Havana and found a company called the Red Charter—the plane was an old (1943) DC-3 and flew like it was 40 years old.

Anyway, Cuba reminded me of Hawaii—warm and tropical with lots of similar flora—mango trees, papaya, coconut, guava, banyan and, of course, the ever-present sugar cane.

The Cubans were very strong and deep. Their bench strength was awe-

some, and they work the ball. Of five matches, we were lucky to win one. The match scores: 1-3, 2-3, 0-3, 3-0 and 0-3. Our final match, played in Havana, was a disaster—they really crushed us.

We are all in San Diego now, back to four hours of daily practice, jump training and weightlifting. Our next tour is with Canada in one week and then nothing until we go to Finland and Poland (see enclosed schedule). The most important tournament for us this year is the Zone Championships in July in Indianapolis. We will hope to beat the Cubans there for the gold medal.



Hawaiian Hot Spots

Hotspots mean different things to different people. We have all at one time or another been *in* one, or spent a night or two *at* one. But until several years ago, few of us knew that each and every Hawaiian Island owes its existence to a hotspot of a very special kind, deep within the mantle of the earth.

This is a spot, very hot indeed, which exists directly below the Big Island. It consists of an enormous and stationary plume of slowly rising lava- from deep beneath the seafloor crust. Above the plume, the seafloor crust (lithospheric plate) is slowly moving to the northwest at a rate of about 3 inches per year.

As the Pacific plate moves over the hotspot, it thins and weakens, allowing vents to fracture upward to the seafloor. It is through these vents that successive eruptions have gradually built all of the Hawaiian volcanoes, some of which eventually became the islands as we know them today.

The largest islands required about 1 million years to form. After formation, their destiny was to drift gradually to the northwest, to move beyond the hotspot and slowly, ever so slowly, begin to sink and erode. Thus the Big Island is still over the hotspot while Oahu, which is 2.2 to 3.4 million years old (Makapuu being the youngest and Waimea the oldest) has moved westward some 200 miles to its present location.

In like manner, Kauai (3.8-5.6 million years old) has moved northwest 300 miles, French Frigate Shoals (11.8 million years old) 700 miles northwest,

and so on all the way out to Midway, which is 28 million years old and almost 1500 miles from Hawaii. Moving northwest, every major island is progressively older, more eroded and has subsided more than the preceding islands to the southeast.

Halfway up the chain at French Frigate Shoals, all that is left of a once-ma-

jestic volcano are shallow reefs and coral shoals. In fact were it not for coral growth, the Hawaiian Island chain would end at Gardner Pinnacles, the last point in the archipelago where any remnant of lava is still visible above sea level.

Beyond Gardner Pinnacles, the islands continue to sink as they gradually drift northwestward, but coral growth keeps up with sea level to the very end of the archipelago marked by Kure Atoll. There, because of low temperature and light, coral growth ceases to keep pace with erosion and sinking and the islands eventually drown. This is the reason the Hawaiian archipelago ends where it does. This point has been called the Darwin Point in honor of Charles Darwin, who originally conceived that coral islands form atop sinking volcanoes.


So now you know that at least on Oahu we are no longer sitting over a hotspot. For that you have to travel east to the Big Island. Either that, or create a hotspot of your own making. And that, for many of us, may happen sooner than we think.

Board Briefs By Gerri Pedesky

Athletic Report: The Sailing Committee requested approval to sponsor "Great Fun" from the St. Francis Yacht Club in the 1983 Trans Pac Yacht Race. The Board approved \$500 to be used to host the yacht when it arrives and to have a cocktail party for the crew . . . \$300 was appropriated to help defray Tracy Phillips' cost of going to the National Raquetball Championships held in Atlanta, Ga. in June . . . New weight room hours were approved on a onemonth trial basis and massage rates were increased from \$12.50 to \$15 per hour . . .

Powered boat regulations were reviewed: no permanent mooring of any power craft other than Club-owned boats; no transporting of jet skis and small power boats through club premises; no power boat or jet ski to come closer to the beach than the end of Colony Surf groin unless engines are fully shut down (except Club power boat) . . .

Entertainment Committee reported the Mexican Fiesta was a great success with 364 diners . . . A Hawaiian Trio will be playing Friday and Saturday afternoons on the Hau Terrace . . .

Public Relations reported the kickoff of the Weepuls Clean-up Campaign to be July 23 . . . Board has approved the cost of printing a color cover of a future Outrigger issue to feature the winning photo in the upcoming photography contest . . .

Historical informed the Board that the slide show presentation used on Club Day is the property of the Club . . . Julie Watts was approved as a new member of the Historical Committee . . . There is a possibility that the Archives will be permanently relocated in the Board Room . . . Copies of Archival material will be sold only to approved recipients who will pay for all costs relating to the making of same. All copies will be made by OCC and any publication of material from our archives will carry a "Courtesy" byline . . .

Membership reports there are 3,625 members as of May . . . 378 Nonresident "B" member accounts were opened in April; 210 from affiliate clubs, 168 member-sponsored . . .

Use of the Club from July 1 to August 31, 1983 by reciprocal clubs will be suspended . . . \$100 credit ceiling on Special Athletic members has been rescinded and primary sponsor will be responsible for any uncollected debts . . . Paul Friese has been appointed Chairman of Admissions Committee and James Pell has been added as a new committee member . . .

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Boston Marathon

"Go Hawaii!" "Go Outrigger!" "Hey, I've been there." "Who do you row' for?" "Hey, what's that spoon in the middle of that 'O?'

How can you not have the best marathon ever with a half-million spectators chanting and cheering each entrant from the first mile to the last 385 yards of Boston's 26.385-mile marathon?

Since my first marathon in 1977, the Boston marathon has always been my goal. Its history and elitism were appealing but I had no idea of its magic. Boston first began in 1897 and is held each Patriots Day, from the quiet New England village of Hopkinton to the Prudential Center in downtown Boston. It is the world's oldest continuing marathon and is considered the king of marathons. Each entrant must submit proof of qualification. For the open men, the qualifying time is 2:50, a pace of 6:29 minutes :seconds per mile. For open

women, the requirement is 3:20, which calls for a 7:38 pace. Having run a 3:20 in the Honolulu marathon in 1982 I felt I had no choice but to participate in "The Big One."

The national weather service was predicting chilly weather, partly cloudy skies, chance of scattered snow or rain and highs in the 40s. I sighed and thought, "Well, at least it'll be a good story." Wearing a wool hat, gloves, 2 shirts, my OCC singlet shorts, I started the 12 noon marathon with approximately 6,000 other entrants. What could have been a fast downhill (comparable to Monsarrat) start turned out to be a slow shuffle. Imagine 6,000 people starting on Kahala Avenue jostling for position for 3 to 4 miles.

The course was exciting! A natural rolling staircase lined with rocky pastureland, lakes, railroad tracks, small towns with 19-century houses, and not forgetting the girls of Wellesley College at 16 miles. I felt like Dorothy (not trying to sound corny) of the Wizard of Oz rambling through country roads and arriving at the crest of Cleveland Circle



at 24 miles to see the "Pru" looming off in the distance.

At the finish line, I was given a participation medal. My mother, Gertrude Berger, and sister, Tina Berg (my support crew) presented me with a haku head lei made from a bouquet of spring flowers. "No, I'm not the winner," I said to onlookers who asked me for my picture, but I sure felt like one. Who wouldn't—running with the fast company of Meyers, Rodgers, Benoit and Roe
