

Hauoli la hanau...Eva Mauaeikakaluaolonoikahiki Pomroy born November 27, 1904 at the family home on Monsarrat, the 17th of 18 children of the Puku'i-Pomroy family.

Dear friend, it gives us such pleasure to honor you. Your sweet smile, the twinkle in your eyes, your ability to share your aloha with all you meet. How special it is to receive a hug from you, Aunty. How much better we feel when you are with us.

Perhaps we take your presence for granted and we haven't always let you know in words or deeds just how much you mean to your Outrigger family.

So many times over the years we have come to you with our problems, large and small. You always listen and give advice when asked for it. You know how important it is to have someone to share things with. You never ask much of us, yet we come to you without hesitation.

"Aunty, can I borrow a quarter for the Waikiki Theater?" Imagine, in those days twenty-five cents to see a movie. "Aunty, I lost my bus fare!" Probably a token or five cents. "Aunty, where are the ti leaves!" We can't race without them. "Aunty, was there really barbed wire on the beach during the war?" Yes, and Eva had her pass to get home from the Club after work. "Aunty, please give our baby a Hawaiian name." How many of us thank you for that gift. "Aunty, how do you make that ono stew and pipi kaula?" Oh, a little bit of this and that...perfect! "Aunty! Aunty! Aunty!"

Through the years you have come with us to our regattas. In the wind at Kailua...the rain squalls drenching us at Nanakuli...the red dirt covering us at Ke'ehi. You say prayers for us on Moloka'i before we take on the channel crossing. You come with us to Waikiki when we honor Walter Macfarlane. You share our happiness when we win and our tears when we lose.

Our parents and grandparents have told us stories about you at the old club at Waikiki and we pass on fond memories of you to our children. They

Keeping Fit

Move over, Nautilus! Step aside, Gold's Gym! The Outrigger Canoe Club Exercise Room has come of age!

Last summer, amid jubilation and controversy, the Club opened its first coed gym. Lack of available space for new facilities made it necessary to sacrifice two valuable parking spaces, really a small price to pay for the general benefit, health and fitness of all Outrigger members. The meager 550-square-foot facility is located on the makai end of the second parking level and is packed with more exercise equipment than was thought could possibly fit.

Today, a complete and varied exercise program is available for any member 15 years old and over. There are free weights (dumbbells) from 3 to 80 pounds, Universal equipment adaptable to every imaginable exercise and a variety of machines for specialized

needs, so everyone's exercise plan can be accommodated. Due to space limitations, gym use is limited to members only; no guests, guest members or affiliates can be admitted until the facility is expanded.

Personalized instruction is available from the gym's competent staff. Programs can be set up with specific goals in mind, including sports training, weight loss, body building, muscle toning, muscle stretching, relaxation and cardiovascular fitness. In addition, to

counteract stiff and sore muscles, a masseuse certified in Swedish massage is available by appointment.

Even if physical limitations have forced avoidance of exercise, a program can be created with the guidance of your doctor that avoids accident or injury as it helps to promote greater health. If you already have a program of your own that you prefer, you may come up and use the equipment knowing the staff will be there to assist you if needed.

The gym director, Ed She', comes to the Club from Nautilus Fitness Centers, where he has been a fitness trainer for two years, both in California and Hawaii. He holds a Master of Arts degree in anthropology from the University of California. Troy Miyasato, also formerly with Nautilus, is the chief exercise trainer. He is a student of nutrition at the University of Hawaii. Welton Kalani, relief trainer, also comes to us from Nautilus. Welton is studying to be an Emergency Medical Technician at Kapiolani Community College. The newest addition to the staff is the talented massage therapist, Maria Hemmings.

The exercise room is open six days a week. Monday through Friday the hours are 7 to 11 am and 3 to 7 pm. On Saturdays and major holidays (as posted) the hours are 10 to 6 pm. Massages are available by appointment only, between 11 am and 3 pm on weekdays, by calling Maria at 988-7575. A one-hour massage is only \$12.50; half-hour, \$6.50.

Whether it is for toning, body building, relaxation or health, bring your athletic shoes, shorts and a shirt (all required) and visit the gym. You'll find the staff ready to guide you on your way to strength and health.

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Kanaka I Kai Ka Molokai-to-Oahu Kayak Race

The annual kayak-competition season culminated on September 19 with the world-famous kayak-racing marathon—30 miles across the rough and windy Molokai Channel.

A number of salty stalwarts launched off Molokai's southwest tip, called Laau Point, each hoping to be first to Oahu's Maunalua Bay—or just to finish. The Outrigger Canoe Club was well-fielded once again on the sunny Sunday. Marshall Rosa, Mark Buck, Mike Mueller, Bill Mowat and Dale Adams are the OCC oddballs who made the grueling trek with no rest or relief! (Mike did it in a canoe, bettering his previous record by more than an hour.) Ironically, 3 hours, 39 minutes and 31 seconds later it was a reciprocal member, Aussie Grant Kenny, who beat everybody for his fourth consecutive win and a world-record time. Marshall Rosa finished an exciting second after sort of disappearing from the

main pack during the race.

The seas and skies all cooperated on Labor Day, September 6, for the 13th annual Waikiki Roughwater Swim. It was sunny and calm—great conditions. OCC was well-represented with 24 (and some unofficially entered) swimmers and several members escorting. Finish time of 48:18.7 was a course record. Club members brought back four

trophies and some medals for placing in the largest age groups.

Ian Emberson and Gerry DeBenedetti, OCC Swim Committee, were in charge of Club arrangements for the swimmers.

Plan Now for Castle Swim

Make your plans now for the Castle Swim, to be held on Sunday, November 28, starting at 8 a.m. at the Club. A lengthy article concerning the swim appeared in last month's issue of *The Outrigger*. We know the "regular" swimmers know about this event, but the Swim Committee wants to get out this last reminder to swimmers and escorts to sign up now to participate. We need a count to know how many are coming to brunch. A sign-up sheet will be either on the swim bulletin board in the tunnel, or in the swim folder at the front desk.

Swimmers are encouraged to provide a friend or relative as a personal escort, either on a paddleboard or in an outrigger canoe. It is difficult to guarantee "personal" attention to all swimmers, and anyone who is interested in escorting is welcome. Escorts need not be OCC members, however only OCC members can enter the swim.

The course is 1 1/2 miles, from a starting point near the Moana and Surfrider Hotels to the finish at the Club. The Club will set out two turning flags, one near the beach at Waikiki and one off the Outrigger wind sock. Both must be on the swimmers' left hand as they turn the flags. Honor system please.

Named for Alfred Castle, the swim revives a tradition of an open-ocean swim begun as far back as 1926, when Castle sponsored a swim which today probably would be more like the Waikiki Roughwater Swim. The Club has upheld the tradition by using Castle's name and has added a few special OCC touches to the swim: going the wrong way, having it in November, etc.

The Swim Committee wishes to emphasize to all swimmers that the official start is at 8 a.m. at the Hau Terrace, where you must register, receive a finisher's number, and sign in and be counted. Even though the Club provides escort service to the water start, you are not officially entered in the swim unless you have appeared at the Hau Terrace at 8 a.m.

There have been unfortunate incidents in the past where swimmers decided to "show up" at the beach and couldn't find the group, or arrived after the swimmers had entered the water and the late arrivals swam at a disadvantage because they hadn't started on time. Therefore, no exceptions. If you want to enter, be at the Hau Terrace at 8 a.m., enjoy your swim, your brunch and the usual good camaraderie that swimmers share upon finding that they survive in good form with good time and have a nice day!

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
