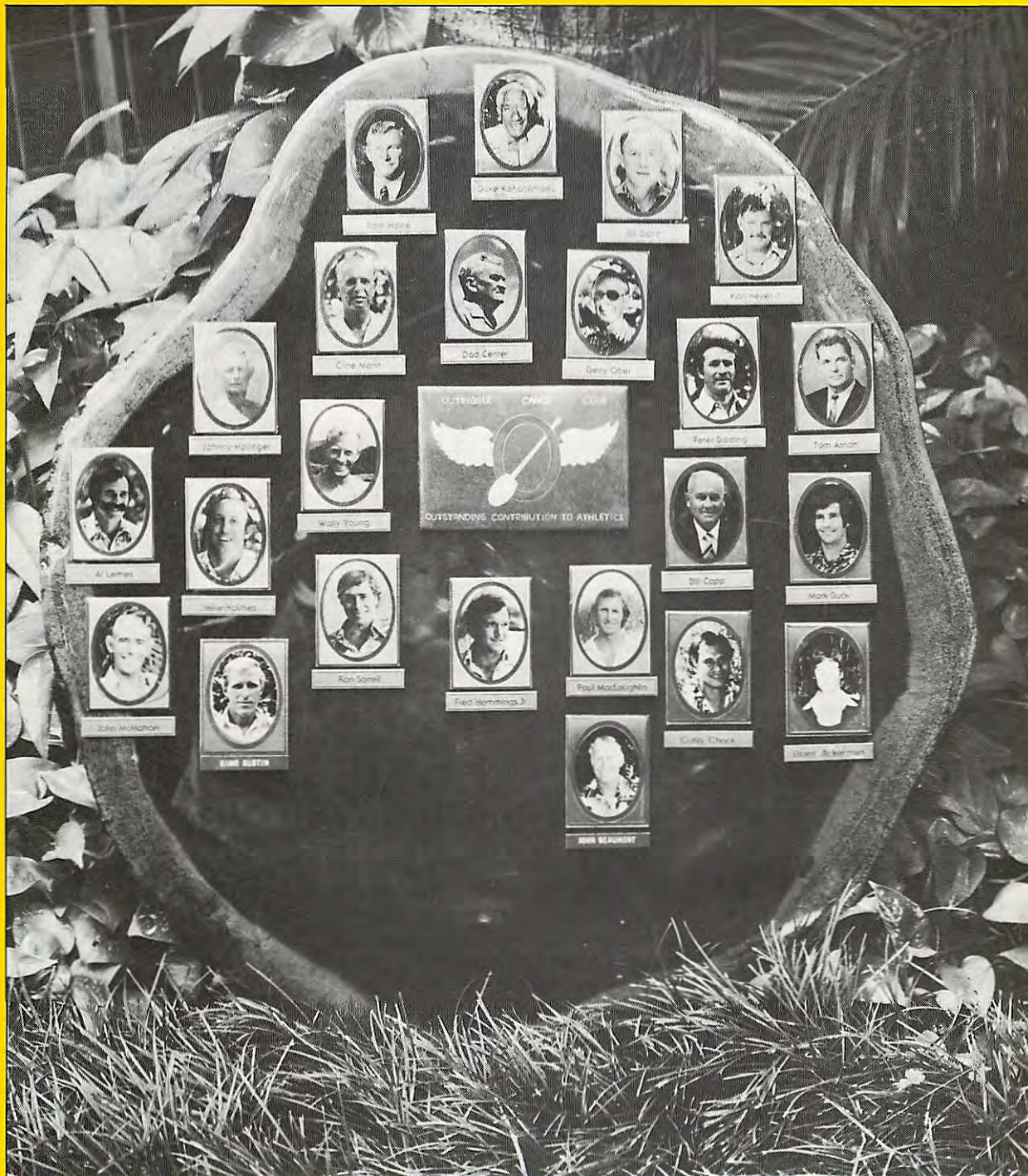

The Winged "O"

Some time during 1966 an Outrigger committee called Athletic Sponsors, chaired by Bill Brooks, developed a concept to protect the athletic program the Club had built up over the years. As stated in the minutes of one Athletic Sponsors' meeting: "A new committee by the name of Winged "O" would be submitted to the Board of Directors for approval . . . This committee will have an identity entirely separate from the Athletic Committee . . . Simply, it is a committee that will work to keep the Club's image as an athletic club."

In selecting the first group of outstanding athletic performers and contributors, it was emphasized by the Athletic Sponsors committee . . . "that the "Winged O" award is not only an award for athletic ability or performance. It is also for recognition of service and effort rendered to the teams within the Club."

The Board of Directors unanimously approved the eight names submitted by the committee to receive the first awards: Duke Kahanamoku, Tom Arnott, Ron Sorrell, Mark Buck, Tom Haine, Al Lemes, Cline Mann and Wally Young. There was no question in anyone's mind that this first group of men was the "cream-of-the-crop" at that time in our history.

The Athletic Sponsors committee went on record saying: "In addition to recognition of service performed, the purpose for this award is to provide some form of incentive for every member of the Outrigger Club, regardless of age or athletic ability, to actively contribute to our athletic program. Hopefully in this manner we will continue to have a strong program for our young people and in this way prevent the Club from ever deteriorating into exclusively a 'Luncheon and Dinner' Club."

The Athletic Sponsors committee also felt that it would be desirable each year to have previous recipients of the award nominate the current recipient(s). This would insure that the right people would be recognized, since the people doing the choosing would be current in their involvement with the athletic program. It would also insure that the selection of the recipient be

kept out of the hands of any basically non-athletic group such as the Board of Directors, which might over a period of time change and fluctuate in their support and general outlook with regard to a strong athletic program. The 1967 Board of Directors agreed 100 percent and gave the new Winged "O" group its blessings.

A little bit about the voting within the Winged "O" committee. Personalities are not considered one way or the other; achievement or contribution towards the Club's athletic program is the basis. A nominee must receive 80 percent of the attending Winged "O" vote to qualify. The nomination must be seconded, and an investigation made into the nominee's athletic history and reviewed by the previously honored Winged "O"s. Once the vote is taken, a blazer with the prized Winged "O" patch is ordered but the award is kept secret until the night of the awards banquet. Many a prospective recipient has been conned into attending the banquet without the secret being revealed. It is not mandatory for an award to be given if there is no qualified candidate who meets the test.

Many of the Winged "O" recipients are remembered for one sport in particular, but many of them were out-

standing in several. For example, we all know Duke was a great swimmer, surfer and canoe paddler. But did you know that Mark Buck, Al Lemes and Tom Arnott were not only great canoe paddlers but also great volleyball players? Tom Haine was an All-American swimmer in college, was captain of the US Olympic volleyball team in Japan and was also an outstanding canoe paddler. Ron Sorrell, beside being an All-American volleyball player, was a Diamond Head Surfboard Race record holder, the first Commissioner of professional surfing, and paddled in all the canoe categories from 15 & under to senior six. He and Peter Balding were members of the 1956 US Olympic team to Australia. Mike Holmes has achieved outstanding performance records in canoeing, surfing, volleyball and sailing. Bill Baird, an All-American volleyball player, was a member of our record-breaking Molokai canoe team and also is an outstanding mountainball player. Actually, all of the current Winged "O" group have been outstanding in more than one sport.

Who, if anyone, will be the 1982 recipient? You'll have to attend the awards banquet to find out . . . the date is Aug. 20th.

Club paddleboarders turned out in a goodly number for the OCC-sponsored Surf race late in June, and Darryl Wong's camera caught a few of them in action.


Volleyball Camp

Attention, future volleyball champs!

Dave Shoji and Dean Nowack are launching the first annual Rainbow Wahine Volleyball Camp for boys and girls 12 to 18 years of age (boys: no high school seniors). Purpose of the camp is to provide a better understanding of the fundamentals of volleyball as well as team concepts geared toward six-person competition. Skills to be covered include passing, setting, blocking, spiking, serving, individual defense, team defense and team offense.

Each camper will receive a T-shirt, certificate of achievement, fundamentals manual, technique improvement chart, and will participate in a mini-tournament at the end of camp. Camp runs from August 11 to 15 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the UH Athletic Complex gymnasiums.

The 4th annual Summer Invitational Open-Ocean Swim between Outrigger and Waikiki Swim Club was held June 26, starting at 9 a.m. at the Club. The OCC Swim Committee hosts the 1½ to 2 mile swim and a superior brunch, and WSC members turn out en masse for this fun swim.

Sixty-four registered swimmers started and 65 finished, so we had a higher completion rate than most swims, or most sports for that matter!

Last year's course time of 51:21 was shattered by WSC's John Brinkman in 46:28, which is a fast 2.150 miles. Many of the swimmers chose a shorter course of 1.68 miles and weren't even close to that time.

September Swims

Two important swim dates are coming up in September, so make a note of these events:

Saturday, Sept. 4: Maui Channel Swim

Monday, Sept. 6: Waikiki Roughwater Swim

Details of both events will be on the Swim Bulletin Board, and Club swimmers should sign up indicating their plans to swim on Sept. 6 and if they need a ride from the finish to the Club. OCC traditionally provides a van, cooler, muffins and oranges as well as a central meeting spot for our towels and cheering section.

The Roughwater Swim is 2¼ miles from OCC/Sans Souci Beach to the Hilton Hawaiian Village beach. Hundreds of swimmers (seriously, 600 participated last year) make a spectacular mass start—one that non-swimmers should come to watch.

Specific starting times will be: 9 a.m.—Adults/Masters; 9:10 a.m.—Age group/Seniors. There will be paddlers and boats patrolling the course. Swimmers are responsible for their own physical condition, and those who have not passed the halfway buoy No. 8 (2,090 yards) within 1 hour 45 minutes will be asked to default and will be transported to shore.

The name of over-all first-place in Adult and Age Group/Senior divisions will be engraved on the Alexander Hume Ford perpetual trophy. All swimmers will receive Ka Pookele certificates and personal finish results. Age Group/Senior division awards go to first three place winners in each class male and female. Adult division awards go to top finishers in each class. Gary "Bossabean" Niemeyer perpetual trophy goes to first place in Men's

35-39.

The Maui Channel Swim is an international event with six-person teams coming from Australia, Canada and many Mainland swim clubs. Although OCC does not enter a team in this 9-

mile channel relay from Lanai to Lahaina Harbor on Maui, some Club swimmers are on local teams and they appreciate your interest and support.

Watch the water. There are more than fishes out there!



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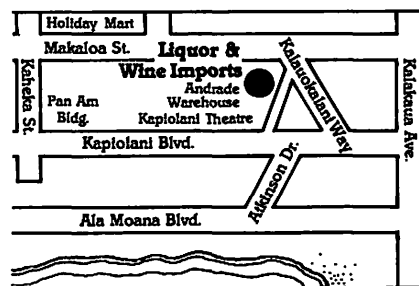
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Ladies Please!

Two members who plan to represent the Club in state and national sailing competition are committee member Hal Reilly and long-time sailing enthusiast Peter Dillingham. Peter's sailing record goes back a few years and includes many national and international honors.

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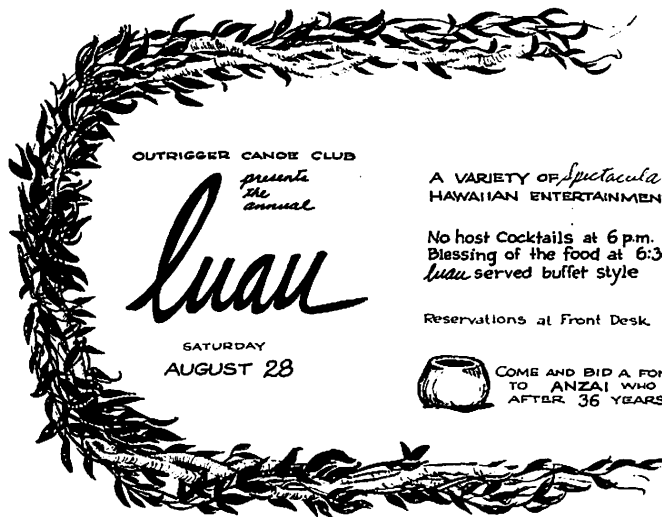
