





Outrigger Neighbors

In the past we have considered neighbors of the Outrigger which live in or near our ocean. The two subjects of *this* column almost fit that description, but their vitality is a matter of some concern. Both the land and the sea are important to these two neighbors, the Waikiki Aquarium and the War Memorial Natatorium. Both have a long history in our neighborhood. The Aquarium dates to 1904, and the War Memorial at the Natatorium to 1927. Members of the Outrigger Club have participated in competitive and recreational events at the oceanside pool of the Natatorium over the years. (Ask Frank Walton for complete details—he won a backstroke championship there a few years ago).

The future of these two neighbors is at this moment being considered by the 1982 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, and now is your opportunity to let your views be known. A variety of options for the Natatorium are being considered. Complete demolition and removal would be expensive and could present potential changes in the beach area adjacent to Sans Souci and the Outrigger Club and in the Ewa direction. A second option is the refurbishment and reconstruction of the Natatorium to its former glory. However, the expense of restoration cannot be borne by the State, say our legislators; rather, concessions in the Natatorium would be used to recoup improvement costs.

A third alternative is the demolition of the seating area and using the resulting debris to fill in the Natatorium pool. The old pool area would then be grassed over, and in place of the old Natatorium would be a rectangular "Magic Island"-like structure, increasing the size of the park. Part of the Memorial arch would be retained, and the new "mini-park" would be the War Memorial. A fourth option, which is the most dangerous one, is to do nothing and allow the Natatorium to continue as a derelict structure, inviting a law suit.

Plans for the Aquarium are less controversial (it is hoped). Although the Aquarium is owned by the University of Hawaii, there is strong support for the University to lease the facility to an

educationally oriented, non-profit corporation that would operate the Aquarium in an improved and somewhat expanded form. The acre of ground to the Diamond Head side of the Aquarium would be used for modest expansion, and the architectural style would be similar to that of the Outrigger Club. The improved and refurbished Aquarium would be funded by the non-profit corporation using a combination of bonds, State funds and privately donated monies. It would be designed as a complement to the park, equally attractive to tourists and residents.

As contiguous neighbors, the Aquarium and the Natatorium are important to one another—but their futures are not necessarily linked. For example, the Aquarium could be improved and expanded no matter what happens to the Natatorium, and vice versa. The future of these potentially important community assets may be decided during this legislative session. Outrigger neighbors with a strong interest in our neighborhood are urged to make their ideas and opinions known to the legislators and other decision-makers.

New Reciprocal

New to the list of Outrigger's reciprocal clubs is the University Club of San Francisco. Located atop world-famous Nob Hill, the club is close to everything—Union Square, Chinatown, North Beach, the financial district, theaters, restaurants, shops—all "just a cable car ride" away.

Amenities at the club include a library/lounge, four singles and one doubles squash court, exercise, steam and sauna rooms, game room for cards, backgammon or dominoes, and a dining room with a panoramic view of the city. There are two bars, one for men only, but . . . be warned ladies . . . unescorted women are not allowed in

the bar or dining room!

Another minus, at least for visitors from other clubs, is the fact that the dining room is closed on weekends; however, with the club's proximity to the many fine restaurants of San Francisco, this should not be a deterrent to staying there.

Rooms and suites are spacious, each with a view of Nob Hill and the city. No children under 18, but, yes, women alone are welcomed, though what they do for a pre-dinner cocktail isn't explained.

The University Club of San Francisco is located at 800 Powell Street.

Save a Life

Those Red Cross courses in CPR, First Aid and Advanced Lifesaving taught at the Club last month by Graydon Woolaway may all be life savers. Knowing CPR (Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation), for example, may enable you to save the life of a heart attack or drowning victim. A step beyond mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, the technique, properly administered, makes a heart resume functioning. The CPR course also teaches how to treat a victim of choking on food—an all-too-common cause of death.

Woolaway, a former director of water safety for the City and County and presently a Red Cross instructor,

conducted the courses at the Club without remuneration. "I've been a member for 33 years," he said, "and I wanted to repay the Club in some way for all it has done for me."

Attendance at the first series of courses was gratifying, Woolaway added, and the series will be repeated if members are interested. CPR and First Aid courses are each given on two consecutive nights of four hours each—from 6 to 10 p.m. The CPR course is \$16, First Aid is \$15, and both are part of the Red Cross cost-recovery program. It is recommended that both be taken in order to insure the maximum life-saving skills.

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
