

IMPORTANT ELECTION COMING UP

Rainalter, Martin Anderson, Fred Rohlfing, Vince Danford, James Pflueger, Richard Cleveland and William Cross. Duke Kahanamoku is honorary life member of the Board, which brings its official number to sixteen, making it necessary for nine members to be present for a quorum.

During the past year it has frequently been impossible to conduct certain business of the Board because a quorum was not present. Attendance has been sporadic. Some of the absenteeism was excusable, such as being away from the Islands at meeting time; but there were many instances where Directors attended only 3 or 4 meetings out of a possible 12, after having agreed to being present.

Communications between the Board of Directors and the membership are very important to the every day and future function of the club. We must all know where we're going, how we're going and why, if interest in our club as a unit is to continue.

So, as you can see, we have a lot of work ahead of us this coming year. We have to prepare to move, plan what kind of new club facilities we will have and how to pay for them, and beef up the morale of our membership to the point where all will be vitally concerned about our future.

However, after Pres. Selection, Beach Front Development, and Neotiations with the Sheraton and Avent groups. They pointed out specifically why various steps were taken and why even moretime would be necessary for consideration before a final plan is adopted for OCCs new facilities.

JOHN CHAMBERLAIN HEARD

John Chamberlain, OCC member who urgently implores the membership to accept the "Avent Plan" to remain at our present site and merge with the International Surf Club (which has yet to be chartered or formed) presented arguments for the Avent proposition. After a question and answer session the general membership agreed that questions were being advanced into areas that made it impossible to answer them with any degree of accuracy at this time; particularly those questions concerning dues, either now or in the future, ade-

quate surfing, canoeing, swimming and beach facilities, and any stabilization of year to year income or costs. At this point it was moved that the meeting should be adjourned until further and more concrete information could be presented to the membership and thence go to a vote.



BEANS PORRIDGE HOT

If you have had the good fortune to be invited to one of club member John Chamberlain's wonderful parties, you already know the merits of his cooking prowess.

You too can sing the praises of his famous barbecued spareribs, his eggplant pizza hors d'oeuvres, his enticing salads—in fact, space doesn't permit listing his many recipe achieve-

ments.

The truth is—John is just a natural artist at combining food flavors. He can give the most innocuous dish enough personality to please any sen-

sitive gourmet.

Given a free hand with the stirring spoon, the spice shelf, the wine cabinet, and a good dose of his own imagination, John evolves delicious concoctions that become family favorites forever.

Take baked beans — that normally plebian dish — but not when John wields the magic wand over the bean not

This bean recipe is subject to change, John admits, according to his whims, when he adds a little more of This than That, but it's always good. Yes, that's the prerogative of a good cook!

JOHN'S SPECIAL BAKED BEANS

(This recipe should serve about 25)

Brown 4 pounds of lean pork, cubed. Cover with 1 can frozen diluted orange juice and ½ cup sherry wine (optional). Cover and cook slowly until pork is soft (about 2½ or 3 hours.)

Add 3 cans B & M beans (these are the small variety of beans 1 lb. 12 oz. can size). The proportion of pounds of beans and pork should be about

the same..

1 pound crisp fried bacon

3 onions, medium size, chopped

- 2 or 3 oranges, quartered, peeling and all
- 1 pound cashew nuts, salted peanuts or almonds

Cook this in a heavy Dutch oven type of covered pot over low heat or in the oven very slowly for several hours. Toward the final stage of cooking, cut up 1 fresh pineapple in chunks and stir in. Add orange juice and wine if the mixture starts to dry out.

It's just like beef stew, it tastes even 'mo betta' the next day—and the next, if there's any left!







THE HARD WAY TO ANCHOR A CANOE

In the more rugged days of Hawaii fishermen usad to pound holes into lava shelves where they met or projected over the sea. It took a lot of labor and patience to force the openings in the hard-to-pierce lava, which was done with a still harder and pointed lava pick. When canoes were tied to the holes the wind would swing them to junctions of rough water and calm, for the best possible fishing. Some of these holes can still be seen along the lava coasts of Hawaii.


