The Story Behind The Book "THE GOOD YEARS"

By Walter Lord

Walter Lord became fascinated with the whole turn-of-the-century period while engaged in research for A Night To Remember, a journal of the fateful sinking of the White Stationer Titanic.

It occurred to Lord that apart from the tragedy, the people of the 1900-1914 era had the best of everything. They had enjoyed the Good Years.

But, before Lord could get started on a book highlighting the events, personalities, and tone of those buoyant and exuberant days, he was asked by a national magazine to dramatize what had happened at Pearl Harbor in 1941. The resultant book was Day of Infam).

Then, in the spring of 1958, he was asked to write a magazine piece on his research technique. When he went back to check his files on the Titanic disaster, he realized he had that turn-of-the-century fever again.

To gather his material, he studied newspapers, books, letters, diaries and even Pinkerton reports by the hundreds. Especially valuable were interviews with people who figure prominently in the 1900-1914 period.

The Good Years is a vivid cornucopian book ranging in time and place from the Boxer Rebellion in China in 1900 to the Panic of 1907, from Peary's dash for the North Pole in 1909 to the struggle for woman's suffrage which reached a climax in 1912. The assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand and his wife in July of 1914 marked the end of the era; the good old days were gone, never to return.

Lord writes: "Perhaps it was just as well. There was much that was wrong with the old way of living—

its injustices, its naivete, its waste, its smug self assurance. Men would come along to fix all that. New laws, controls, regulations, forms ... would keep anybody from getting too much or too little ... swarms of concultants, researchers, special assistants and executive committee's would make sure that great men always said and did the right thing."

"There would be great gains . . . but . . . something was also lost—a touch of optimism, confidence, exhuberance and hope. The spirit of an era can't be blocked out and measured, but it is there nonetheless. And in these brief, buoyant years it was a spark that somehow gave extra promise to life. By the light of this spark, men and women saw themselves as heroes shaping the world, rather than victims struggling through it."

OUTRIGGER WINS OAHU CHAMPIONSHIP!

The Outrigger Canoe Club, considered no more than a regatta contender throughout the racing season, swept to four decisive first places and its second consecutive Oahu Canoe Racing championship at Keehi Lagoon, July 2-1.

When the final point standings were posted, the Outrigger had whipped highly favored Waikiki Surf Club, 39 to 32. Lanikai scored 19 points, Kai Oni 15, Lealani 10 and Hui Nalu 9.

The title victory was particularly delicious because:

- It smashed the "always a bridesmaid . . ." stigma that had hung over the OCC crews through the season.
- The highly regarded, arch-rival beach neighbors from Waikiki Surf were soundly beaten.

- Youthful OCC crews weren't given a chance in pre-regatta odds.
 Other crews had the jump in experience and age up to 9 years per man.
- The coveted Oahu championship was successfully defended.
- The blue ribbon event, the men's senior two-mile race, went to the Outrigger. Any coach feels a meet is successful irregardless of point standings, if his senior crew can win this event.

Five records fell at Keehi Lagoon, an indication of the mental and physical peak reached by all crews primed for the championship.

Waikiki Surf walked off with three new records:

The senior women's half-mile, the novice women's half mile, and boys 17-and-under one mile events. A victory in the boys' 14-and-under quarter mile gave WSC four first places.

DOWNING PREDICTED WIN

Canoe racing fans and even some of the Outrigger paddlers themselves were surprised over the Outrigger's "upset" victory over the Waikiki Surf Club to retain the Oahu Racing championship.

One man, however, received the final point tabulation as though he had planned it that way.

And he had.

Outrigger Canoe Coach George Downing quietly predicted two months ago that his youngsters would win the Oahu title.

Coming on the heels of a sound thrashing in an early meet, Downing's statement may have sounded, to some like a coach's 'wait 'til next time ... 'vintage sour grapes.

"... we didn't want to bring them

along too fast by putting too much effort into the early, unimportant races."

And watching Downing mold untried youngsters to championship calibre is a gradual process. The empty seats began to fill with green paddlers. More experienced paddlers returned from college, out of condition and weeks away from competition form.

But it happened, under the patient, discerning eye of the Outrigger coach.

His "don't start them too soon" policy paid off in spades, and a second consecutive Oahu title.

Downing recognizes a job well done by his youngsters, but insists the Oahu championship doesn't matter one iota in his book.

"We are pointing to just one . . . the State championships in August . . the one that counts."

And how can you go against a philosophy like Downing's?

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
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
