The Leilani will be the race canoe while the Kalaina and Kawele'a are the training boats.

Led by paddler-coach Albert Lemes, the paddlers include Timothy Guard, Butch Hemmings, Fred Hemmings, Mark Buck, Richard Sylva, Fred Lowrey, Thomas Rietow, Terrence Ledford, Buddy McGuire, Paul MacLaughlin and Gaylord Wilcox. Nine of these men will be selected to uphold the club's colors in this grueling 38-mile race.

Many other club members are actively supporting the team: Gibby Rietow and Chico Gibson whose Mary J will be the escort boat; Thomas Arnott whose Boston whaler will be the pick-up boat; and Donald Fowler, Wallace Young and Gordon Howard who will be escorting the paddlers on their practice runs. Cline Mann again takes charge of logistics and mental gymnastics while Robert Johnson and Douglas Kilpatrick continue as race team coordinators.

Reserve *Sunday, October 17* for cheering on the team. Take Sunfish, surfboard, face mask—or sit on the terrace—but help push them on to victory when they pass in front of the club. They are training to win. Let's get behind them in truly a club effort.

The third race provided the most colorful start and exciting finish. Beginning with the now famous "Outrigger Beach Start," the boats headed out of the lagoon, around the Diamond Head Buoy, and back through the surf to the beach. Rima led all the way with Pyle moving up steadily from 6th. Pyle caught a wave and passed the lead boat at the channel flag only to blow the race by finishing on the wrong side of the finish flag. All other boats caught beautiful waves. Last place finisher caught the best wave of all which carried him at least a quarter mile all the way to the finish.

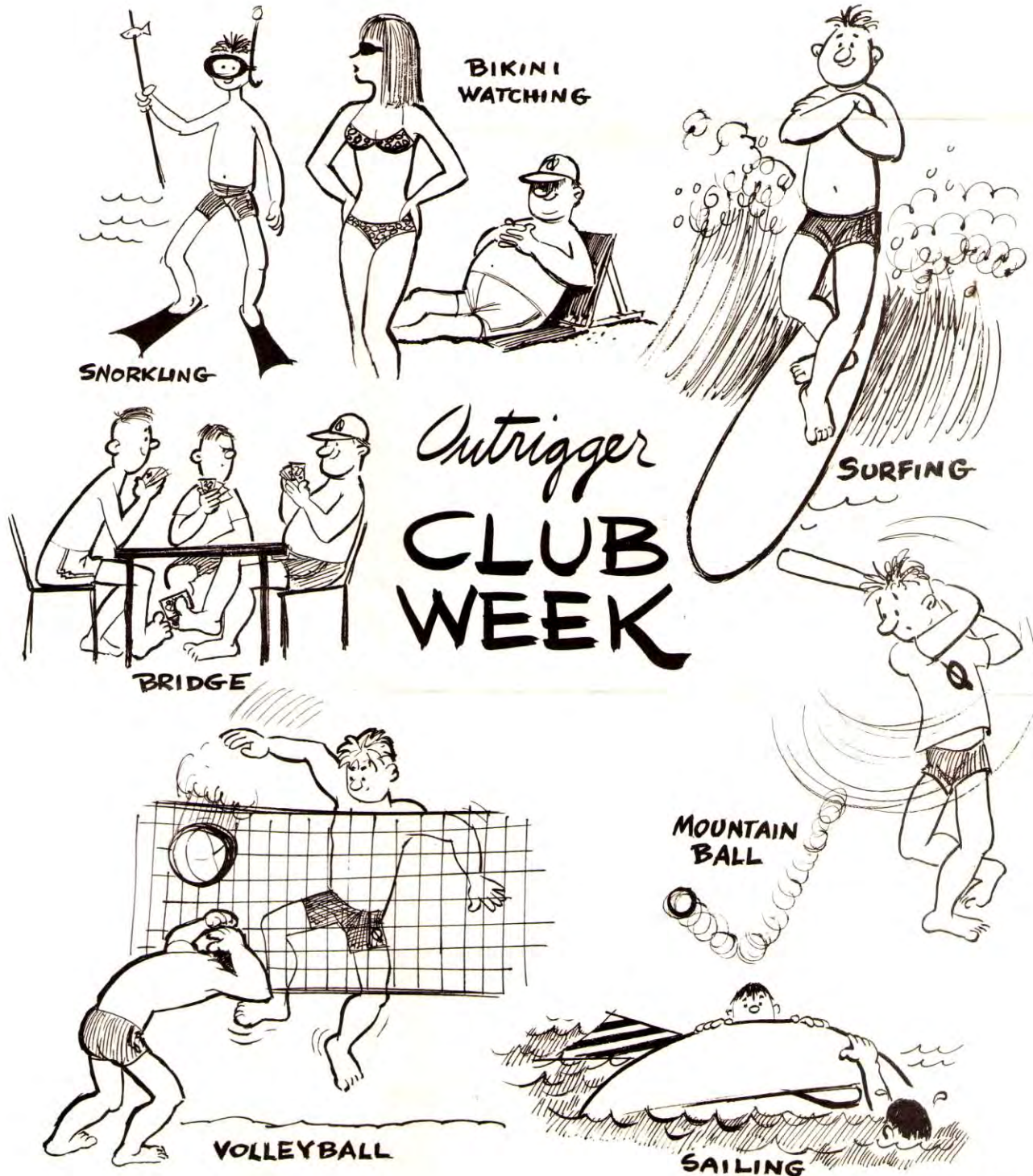
The Club Week program, to be sponsored by the Athletic Sponsors Committee, has a two-fold purpose:
