

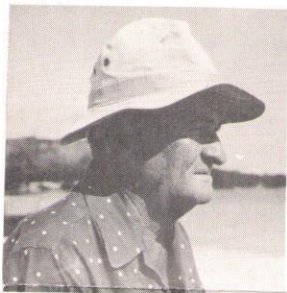

## IN MEMORIAM

George David Center  
1886-1962

There are few people in Hawaii who will be more sorely missed than our own "Dad" Center.

Born on Christmas Day in 1886 at Kipahulu, Maui, "Dad" passed away on September 12th, after an illness that kept

him more or less confined for approximately six months.

Although Christened "George David," to all of us at the Outrigger Club and to thousands of others in Hawaii and about the World, he was affectionately known only as "Dad," and how difficult it would be to imagine a more fitting name for this kindly friend!

He was one of the earliest members of the Club when it was organized in 1908, when the sport of riding the surf on boards and in canoes had all but disappeared. "Dad" and a handful of other young skilled surfing enthusiasts contributed greatly to the revival of the sport, and today "Surfing," "Waikiki Beach" and the "Outrigger Club" are known to thousands throughout the World.

"Dad" was ever glad to lend a helping and encouraging hand to youngsters of all ages, both boys and girls. He became known as one of the World's outstanding swimming teachers (always without financial compensation) and in 1920 at the Olympic Games in Antwerp he was one of the coaches of the American Swimming team, on which were ten contestants from Hawaii. In 1926 he coached an American swimming team that visited Japan.

Although surfing and swimming were "Dad's" chief loves, he enjoyed other sports as well. A six-footer and of powerful, well proportioned build, he was an outstanding oarsman for the old Myrtle Boat Club in the days when rowing was one of our major sports, and rivalry between the Myrtle "Red" and the Healani "Blue" was intense. He organized the Outrigger Club's track team in 1919, and was its coach until the Club abandoned the sport. He also worked with Bill Inman and "Doc" Withington in organizing the Outrigger Football team, which played against the first Mainland College football team to ever visit the Islands. (University of Nevada, New Year's Day, 1920).

Apart from "Dad's" tremendous contribution to sports in Hawaii, he will always be remembered for being just the type of man he was, and the almost irreplaceable contribution he made through the years to Hawaii's youth. To meet him was to respect him; to know him was to love him. He was never afraid to voice his opinion when he believed he was right, and those who differed lost none of their respect and "Aloha" for him.

Yes, "Dad" Center will be sorely missed. To those of his family who survive him, we extend our sincere sympathy. Their loss is shared by thousands who had the good fortune to know him.

## NEW CLUB DEVELOPMENT

At the August 16th meeting of the Board of Directors the Planning Committee and architects again reported on their progress by displaying the latest plans and an up-dated model.

The whole club facility, particularly the dining, bar, and terrace areas, present an atmosphere of openness, informality and charm not unlike that of the Halekulani. The dining, bar and terrace are adjacent to the waterfront and have slight differences in elevation. An open sand area for sunning and parking of canoes adjoins the Colony Surf and allows the dining room and terrace an unobstructed view of Waikiki and the Waianae. The locker building adjoins the sand area and also contains the snack bar, canoe storage, exercise room, and steam room. On the roof of the locker building are two large and one small sand volleyball courts. Surfboard storage will be in the open strip adjoining the Colony Surf.

The reception desk, accounting office, and manager's office are arranged in such a way as to assure maximum efficiency. Also, inasmuch as the offices are practically contiguous with the kitchen and storeroom, better control should be effectuated.

The parking structure contains three levels, one below and two above ground. Two hundred cars can be comfortably self parked; however, at large functions this number can be exceeded by use of the roof for density parking.

Preliminary plans are expected to be completed on September 30 as first announced in the June '62 Forecast.

### Beach Development

As reported in the July '62 Forecast, the initial waterfront improvement, the dredging of a canoe channel and swimming basin and utilization of excavated material for a coral base for future beach, has been completed. During the last two months the action of the sea has compacted the coral fill and caused an accretion of sand on the Diamond Head end. However, some quantities of loose uncompacted material have been transported ewa to adjacent beaches. This situation will soon be remedied.

The second phase of beach development, construction of a groin, as recommended by the U. S. Engineers, and additional construction and compaction of coral fill, is expected to be under way shortly. This phase must be completed before the final phase, which will be the application of sand to be obtained from the excavation of the new club. It is expected that we will experience the same condition as at the Colony Surf, where substantially all excavated material was white beach sand.

## MANAGER'S COLUMN

It has become apparent to we Outrigger employees that recently there has been a definite increase of regular club members utilizing club facilities.

Increased attendance of members is one indication of appreciation of service given by Outrigger personnel who, for the most part, are dedicated people. For many of these employees their special work here at the club is a way of life, as important to them as any outside activities, and they are extremely grateful for recognition of their efforts.

Meanwhile, your Sunday Nite Family Buffet continues to be the most popular, and best attended single function of the Club.
