FRED HEMMINGS

Living Legend of the Outrigger

Outrigger's own Fred Hemmings, already the recipient of numerous national and international surfing awards, has been inducted into the newly established Outrigger Duke Kahanamoku Foundation Hawaii Waterman Hall of Fame. The Foundation's goal is to bring special recognition to Hawaii's exceptional kane and wahine o ke kai.

Along with his mentor and hero, Duke Kahanamoku, and seven other outstanding athletes who have excelled in ocean sports, the inductees were honored at a gala affair at the Club on August 24.

Fred's credentials in the world of athletics are simply mind-boggling. From the small kid struggling to catch a wave at Canoes in the 1950s, to his recent induction into the Hawaii Waterman Hall of Fame, his accomplishments in the world of sports are unsurpassed.

Fred grew up in Kaimuki. His New York born father and local mother were Outrigger members at the "old" club where Fred and his five siblings spent a good part of their childhood, learning to swim, surf, and paddle at an early age.


When the waves at Waikiki seemed too tame, the gutsy youngster bummed rides with other surfers to Makaha where the challenges were greater. In 1958, at the age of 12, Hemmings placed third in the junior division at the Makaha International Surfing Championships; he won that division in 1961 and 1963.

He made the national scene in 1964 when he won the Senior Men's Division at Makaha and was written up in *Sports Illustrated* and featured on nationally televised ABC's *Wild World of Sports*. He took the title again in 1966 and came in first in the Haleiwa Sea Spree in 1969.

Local laurels were not enough for this outstanding surfer. After his first 1964 victory at Makaha, Fred travelled to Lima, Peru, where he came in first in the Peruvian International Championships.

But the ultimate jewel in the crown of his surfing career was a spectacular victory at the World Surfing Championships at Rincon Bay in Puerto Rico in 1968. Competing against outstanding surfers from around the globe, not only did Fred capture the title, but was the first American ever to do so.

Hemmings involvement in water sports was not confined to surfing; he was an outstanding paddler and steersman, and a member of Outrigger's winning crew in




Fred has steered the most winning crews in the Macfarlane Regatta.

the challenging Molokai to Oahu long distance race in 1967 and 1968.

In 1975, up against a formidable team from Tahiti, Fred and his team-mates came from behind, not only winning a spectacular race, but setting a record as well. His crew broke the record again in 1984, when Fred steered his Masters crew to victory, coming in third overall.

As a steersman, Fred holds the record for the most recorded wins in a Macfarlane regatta, over the years steering 61 crews to victory. Paddlers who have crewed for Fred are unanimous in expressing their devotion and respect for him; they laud both his physical strength and strength of character, and attribute his positive attitude to many of their victories. Possessing an intuitive feeling for the ocean, Fred reacts spontaneously to unexpected challenges, which more often than not, turn likely defeats into unexpected triumphs.

Hemmings also served in the demanding role of Club

Captain in 1975. As part of a plan to augment the Club's water sports program, he was instrumental in reviving the Castle Swim, which had been discontinued in 1958. The swim, with a new route and new rules, is a popular Club event to this day.

After reaching the pinnacle of success, Fred retired from surfing competition in 1969, turning his sights to developing surfing into a professional sport. Over the next 20 years, he produced the Smirnoff World Pro-Am before founding the Pipeline Masters, the World Cup of Surfing, World Team Surfing, International Professional Surfing, and the Triple Crown of Surfing.

Hemmings, with Randy Rarich, founded the first world pro tour and was a pioneer in promoting women's surfing competition on the North Shore. The Honolulu Advertiser dubbed Hemmings "The Father of Professional Surfing." For many of the events he founded and produced, he served as co-anchor on national TV.

Throughout the 1970s and early 1980s, Fred was a national television commentator for surfing and canoe racing events for ABC Wide World of Sports, CBS Sports Spectacular, and NBC Sports World, and eventually hosted his own local radio show.

When former Outrigger member and promoter Kimo McVay, who at the time was Duke Kahanamoku's manager, formed Duke's Surf Team in 1965, Fred was one of four outstanding surfers who toured parts of the mainland with Duke, and served as Duke's personal assistant during the latter years of his life.

Along the way, Hemmings continued to amass additional honors and awards; in 1969 he was inducted into Outrigger's prestigious Winged "O" and received the Duke Kahanamoku Sportsman Award. The Association of Surfing Professionals honored him for Service to the Sport of Surfing in 1989. Perhaps the most prestigious award of all was his induction into the International Surfing Hall of

Fame in 1991. He and Duke are the only Hawaii surfers to be so honored.

During the 1970s and 1980s, Fred served as a director on several Boards, including the Outrigger Canoe Club, Hui Nalu, Association of Surfing Professionals, and United States Surfing Federation. In 1984 he was appointed to the Board of the Denver Broncos, a post he continues to hold.

After such dazzling accomplishments, one would expect Fred to settle back and rest on his laurels. But wait—there's more. In 1984, the surfer turned solon was elected to the State House of Representatives. Fred likes to say he was cured of politics in the nineties, but in 2000 he moved up to the State Senate, where he served as Senate Republican Leader until 2006. For ten years, Small Business Hawaii ranked Fred as the state's Legislator of the Year. He retired from the Senate last month.

As a parting gift to the watermen of Hawaii, Hemmings introduced the Surfing Reserve Bill in the legislature which would recognize the note-worthiness of Waikiki and the North Shore as surfing areas. When the legislature failed to pass the bill on final vote, Governor Linda Lingle stepped in and made it happen, adding to the legacy Fred leaves behind him on the political scene.

Somewhere along the way, Fred found time to write. His first book, *Surfing, Hawaii's Gift to the World*, was published in 1977. *The Soul of Surfing is Hawaiian*, acclaimed 1999's Non-Fiction Best Seller in Hawaii, was published 20 years later. Hemmings has also been a contributing political editor for *Honolulu Magazine* and co-authored *Illustrated Surfing Encyclopedia* published in Japan in 1979.

First and foremost, Hemmings is a waterman, but his athletic endeavors were not confined to water sports. At Punahou, which he attended on scholarship, Fred excelled in football, playing both center and linebacker positions.

In 1961, with Fred as co-captain, Punahou won the Junior Varsity Interscholastic League of Honolulu championship; in the same capacity in 1964, he helped lead Punahou to the Varsity championship, earning a spot on the Star Bulletin's 1964 all-star team and was named Athlete of the Year by the Quarterback Club. Among many awards he received throughout his high school years, perhaps the most cherished of all were awards for Most Inspirational Player which he received in 1961 and 1964.

Running is also a sport Fred has participated in, finishing the Honolulu Marathon eight times, the Volcano Marathon twice, and the Edmonton Marathon in Canada. In the Hilo Marathon in 1983, he achieved his fastest time, completing the 26.2 miles in 3 hours, 13 minutes and 23 seconds. Until 1998, Hemmings was a regular participant on the Outrigger running team in the Hana Relays and other local events.

Not only has Fred made a name for himself in the sports world, excelling in all he has set out to do, but he has given back to athletics and the community, promoting both sports and individuals as well.

What's next for the surfer, paddler, steersman, runner, politician, and entrepreneur? Fred plans to spend more time with his family and also has registered with a speaker's bureau; he will be available to talk on his favorite subjects—Hawaiian history and water sports.



Backward Glances

3 YEARS AGO, 2007

In the December *Outrigger* a report was published on the special membership meeting held at the end of October. Attendance was huge as members came to hear an update on the negotiations with the Elks Club regarding the ground lease for the property on the site of the OCC.

Decisions by the Board concerning long-range planning for the Club's dues structure were also discussed. President Watumull explained the reason that the meeting wasn't held earlier was that negotiations were confidential and the Board wanted to wait until after the 90-day appeal period before sharing information.

Past-President Alan Lau reviewed the history of the lease which began on November 16, 1956 and runs for 99 years. For the first 50 years up to November 15, 2006, the annual lease rent for the Club was \$2,500 per month. During the past 30 years, the Board has tried several times to open dialogue with the Elks for possible purchase in fee. There was no success. Lau emphasized to the membership that "under terms of the lease, the Elks have no obligation to sell to us".

Attempts begun in 2006 to negotiate the remaining

49 years of the lease were unsuccessful. That impasse led to arbitration to determine the rent amount as spelled out in the lease.

OCC and Elks each selected an arbitrator and the two selected a third. Arbitration was held between May 21 and 24, 2007, including a site inspection and testimony, mostly from appraisers, on the value of the property.

In unanimous decision announced by the arbitrators on July 25, 2007, the annual rent for the remaining 49 years of the lease was set at \$830,000. Based on the formula set forth in the lease, this equals a value for the land based on its use as a club site as \$16.6 million.

President Watumull concluded: "We hope that the Board of Directors will continue to seek acquisition of this site in the future, as well as study acquisition of alternate sites should this site not be available in 2055. In the meantime we will continue to be good neighbors with the Elks."

He reminded everyone that the mission of the OCC is: "A place where man may commune with sun and sand and sea, where good fellowship and aloha prevail, and where the sports of old Hawaii shall always have a home."

According to minutes of the Board's October meeting, the Club membership count as of September 30, 2007 is 4,857.

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



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Another Molokai Challenge

It was a wonderful way to do my first Molokai Hoe. It was an amazing experience that words can't describe. Oh, I almost forgot, in the Molokai I did my nine changes of 30 minutes each and didn't miss a change; no one did.

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BOARD BRIEFS

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting of October 28, 2010. There was no Executive Committee meeting scheduled.

Membership Count: The Membership Count was 4,813 as of September 30, 2010.

Life Membership Nominee: The Board approved the Historical Committee's recommendation that a member be nominated as a candidate for Life membership to be approved by the membership at the 2011 Annual Meeting.

Offsite Storage Room Upgrade: The committee is requesting approximately \$1,000 to install both shelves and electrical lines/outlets to operate digital archiving equipment. An additional \$30/month will also be needed for electrical use. It was moved, seconded and approved.

Investment Change: The Board approved the recommendation from the Finance Committee to invest one-third of the Dodge & Cox Funds in the Nuveen Tradewinds Value Opportunities Fund instead of the FPA Crescent Fund (previously approved), as the FPA Crescent Fund is not open to new investors.

Fiduciary Liability/401K: Beginning in 2011, new regulations regarding 401K fee disclosures will go into effect. The Board would like the Finance Committee to request RFPs from Wealth Management, Cambridge & Associates and a third party to be determined by the Finance Committee, to analyze and evaluate the Club's compliance and fiduciary responsibilities in regards to the 401K plan and the frozen defined benefit plan.

Canoe Racing: The Board approved the Canoe Racing Committee's request for two line item transfers of \$3,050 from the Molokai Practice Run and \$450 from the Molokai Training Table to make \$3,500 available for reimbursement of costs associated with the breakdown of Whaler #1 prior to the Molokai Hoe.

Volleyball: The Board approved the Volleyball Committee's request for a line item transfer of \$2,350 from Adult National Airfare to cover equipment and awards needs associated with the growth in OCC's youth volleyball teams.

Nominating Committee: The Board approved the following members to serve on the Nominating Committee: Brad Wagenaar (Chair), Alan Lau, Tom McTigue and Cindi White Yanaga. In addition, the Board asked that an additional member who is not a Past President be added to the committee.

Youth VB Teams: The focus has been to build OCC's youth volleyball teams. Discussion focused on the membership policies for children of members and children of non-members as it relates to the admissions process (posting) and practicing and competing on an OCC athletic team. Per Board Policy 2.3.8.2 "Applicants for membership whose names have been posted may train with the Club's athletic teams. Applicants for Associate Spouse and Junior Parent Member membership whose names have been posted may also compete on the Club's athletic teams." The Board stressed that the volleyball teams must comply with these existing policies.

Financial Statement: In September, there was Net Loss from Clubhouse Operations of \$69,688 which is \$5,412 better than budget, and year to date, net income of \$73,801, which is \$113,901 better than budget.

Food and Beverage Summary: There was a combined Food & Beverage net loss (with the mini-charge) of \$49,409, which is \$7,609 worse than budget.

Projects in Progress: The plumbing project in back of the house locations (employee locker rooms, coolers, store rooms, etc.) is finished. Work has moved to canoe alley. Canoe alley will have limited access and short term closures. After Thanksgiving weekend, Snack Shop will be closed for construction until mid-December.

Boston Whaler: It was moved, seconded and approved to authorize the purchase of a new 2008 22-foot Boston Whaler hull that is currently on Oahu at Windward Boats.

Buildings & Grounds: The 2011 Capital budget includes monies for an ADA consultant. In addition, the committee will investigate the process and consequences of OCC being designated a State of Hawaii historic building.
