It's Regatta Time!

The dawn broke most beautifully; the water a still blue and the wave action, gentle. In the hearts and minds of the OCC paddlers only one thing was of importance: win the prestigious Walter Macfarlane Surfing Regatta. Firecrackers were going off in most of the OCC paddlers' stomachs as OCC had to come from behind to take this regatta, 74 points vs. 65 for Hui Nalu.

Hui Nalu has just come off a win in their regatta the previous week and it was up to Outrigger to do the same. And they did. What a victory! Saving the best for the last, OCC pulled away with wins in the upper divisions, and the Senior Men's two-mile event put Outrigger on top to stay. Head Coach Walter Guild said, "It always feels good to win the Walter Macfarlane Regatta, and this year's victory was very

rewarding since we last won this regatta in 1979."

No doubt the pressure was on all day. At day's end, however, when OCC was clearly the victor, the standings were tied, 2 to 2. Hui Nalu and Outrigger had each won two regattas. This could be a virtual battle of the titans down to the finish line, perhaps to be decided only in the Oahu or the State Championships.

Conditions were great for the Macfarlane regatta; at times waves were as high as 2-4 feet. On some waves, other clubs took a beating; for instance, the koa-canoe crash between the Hawaiian Warriors and the Waikiki Surf Club during the Sophomore Women's event. This was due to the steersmen losing control of the boat, thus causing the accident. In contrast, Outrigger's steersmen and women are of the highest caliber and are always on the lookout for those dangerous and costly errors that can happen when a boat is out of control. Accidents of any type are kept to the very minimum.

Outstanding performances were attributed to the Men's Masters 40 and over crew, the Junior Women's and the Senior Men's crews. It was the Senior Men who rose to the occasion to win this blue-ribbon two-mile event. The members of this winning crew are: Keahi Farden; Tim Kelly; Donny Mailer; Bob Rieley; John Finny and Kainoa Downing.

In winning this race, the Senior Men won the perpetual Matson Cup, the longest winning perpetual trophy in canoe racing. It can be viewed in the lobby of the Club.



Leeward Kai Regatta

The Outrigger Canoe Club really showed its muscle as it accumulated eight first places to capture the team title at the Leeward Kai Regatta in Nanakuli on Sunday, June 21. On this hot, almost windless day, the weather and ocean conditions were perfect for a regatta.

Canoe-racing chairman Jeff Kissel summed it up at the end of the day's racing. "The Outrigger Club won this regatta in the best of canoe-racing tradition that instills in all of us the will to win. And to think that the Novice A men have not yet peaked. This is going to be a great season indeed!"

Head Coach Walt Guild was equally proud of his paddlers, saying, "Our coaching staff has worked hard in preparing the paddlers to do what this club does best—win canoe races." Walt emphasized that this race shows the competition that our younger division has the determination to make steady improvement towards our goal of winning the Oahu and State Championships.

Walt believes that the most improved crews during this regatta were those of the Senior Women and the Junior Men. Members of the 1st place Senior Women crew are Anita Minteer, Tiare Finney, Ann Nicol, Tracy Phillips, Connie Young and Ann Hogan. These superstars are coached by Aaron Young. All the customdesigned equipment by World Class Gym Equipment, Inc. was customized for the room by Lass and Norm Crum, due to the various height limits imposed by the nature of the parking garage.

In this room, Lass feels that the upper division men and women canoe-racing crews can gain additional overall intensive training and body strength. He is not alone in his estimate that this particular room will enjoy the most use, probably only second to that of the Hau Terrace.

During July, the room was undergoing an evaluation period. New rules and hours will be announced soon.

After clinching the Men's "A" Regional Championships at Kamehameha Schools, the OCC junior men's volleyball team left Hawaii in search of what seemed to be "The Triple Crown." First stop was Estancia High School in California, site of the West Coast Prep Championships. Although they represented Outrigger, the team played as Punahou High School, so one of the eight players could not play, since he attends Iolani.

Playing their newly patented brand of "inspired" volleyball, the junior team won their pool and went on to top the 15-team tournament by beating Estancia in the semi-finals and Los Angeles city champs, Chatsworth High, in the finals 15-5, 15-9. During the 2-day tournament, OCC compiled an enviable 14-0 game record, and gained valuable momentum for their final destination—Junior Nationals at Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska.

At Creighton, it seemed the word was out that "Outrigger was the team to beat," and Fountain Valley, Calif. was sure they would do just that. Not only did the tall Californians boast of assured victory, they also engaged in verbal harassment. This only fueled Outrigger's desire to win, and the "boys from Hawaii" let the scoreboard do the talking. Out of eight matches played, including one against a senior men's team, the juniors dropped only one set to Fountain Valley, and returned the following day to apply the "Aloha" touch to the finals.

The final match saw Outrigger playing the finest volleyball of the 10-day trip, combining reckless defense with powerful putaways—shutting out Fountain Valley 15-4, 15-11. Their style of play was surely the crowd-pleaser of both tournaments.

Returning home as national champions was naturally a momentous occasion for the OCC juniors. Each player seemed to have grasped a new concept of "team volleyball" and its application to competitive team success. Despite All-Tournament and MVP selections, each player realized that without his teammates and the support of the Outrigger Canoe Club, the Triple Crown would not have been possible.
