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Kamehameha Day Regatta

Coach Walter Guild and his paddlers met the competition head-on throughout the day and although not victorious—OCC tied for fourth with Kailua Canoe Club—Outrigger crews in each group had their own personal victories.

"It's going to be a good season," said head coach Guild as he ran off the names of the crew that did exceptionally well on Sunday. The Freshman Men, the Junior Women and the Senior Men crossed the finish line in first place.

The Freshman men did exceptionally well with a three-boat-length victory; the crew is composed of Keone Downing, Mark Rigg, Walter Guild, Mark Haine, Karl Heyer and Kaiona Downing. It was this returning OHCRA,

State and all-State Championship crew that led the way.

The OCC Senior men looked in terrific shape as they, too, crossed the finish line ahead of the pack. This crack crew consisted of Keahi Fardin, Bob Riley, Tim Kelly, John Finney, Donny Mailer and Tom Conner.

Coach Guild believes that as the season progresses, the power of Outrigger will be felt in each successive race. All crews are training hard and the will-to-win should surface with each race. Crews like the Senior Masters, who placed second in the regatta, Freshman Women and the Boys 18 all have that potential to come across the finish line first. According to Guild, "If we can all work on correcting our mistakes, we will finish in the money."

Coach Guild went on to state, "A change of philosophy has taken place in that we look for a long-range pay-off

vs. an immediate pay-off. We don't want to do what we did last year—win early and lose the big ones like the Oahu Championships and the State Championships. Instead, we plan to emphasize the basics of paddling technique and physical conditioning as the foundation for winning the State title." Guild believes that Outrigger has all the potential to win the big ones.

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What About Your Family Tree?

John Musclebound lifted weights for three years prior to permitting himself to father a child-he wanted to insure the birth of a strong son.

Nani Plutarch, a young tourist guide of only average intelligence, read Plato's Republic aloud throughout her pregnancy in an attempt to give her unborn child an intellectual head start.

A mother is convinced that her child has a red birthmark on the forehead because she had a craving for strawberries throughout her pregnancy.

These and other myths are not uncommon even in today's world of the Carl Sagans as the war between nature and nurture, heredity versus environment continues to be waged on the reproductive front. Genetics is the science that analyzes the transmission of hereditary factors from one generation to the next. Although this science is extremely complex, its laws remain consistent throughout all levels of the biological phylum, from fruitflies to your family and mine.

In the midst of the scientific explosion of recombinant DNA, the argument of nature versus nurture seems ludicrous . . . and it always has, for both your genetic endowment and the environment influencing its expression are critical to you, the end product. From the same parents have come giants and dwarfs, idiots and geniuses, single births and triple births, blonds and brunettes, etc., etc., etc. Brothers and sisters sometimes resemble each other or their parents; sometimes they do not clearly resemble anyone in the family (what?). For those of you interested in an update on the latest fashion in "gene," read on.

Traits are passed on from generation to generation by a tiny protein structure called a *gene*. Within the nucleus of every cell in our bodies are *chromosomes*, composed of long strands of genes, the agents of heredity. These strands are actually highly concentrated packages of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid). The coils contain the blueprints for the body's production of proteins, which can produce DNA when necessary, engineer the body's chemistry and

provide an individual with his or her characteristic shape, size, internal functions and external appearance. Even though each cell contains a complete set of blueprints, not all cells have the same function; some are assigned to be blood, liver, lung, kidney or skin. Given a different direction during development, a skin cell could just as easily have become part of the heart.

Genetically speaking, then, there are only two kinds of cells in the human body: (1) germ cells, which are the sex-determining cells destined for the next generation (egg or sperm), and (2) somatic or body cells, which form all the other body tissues. In each germ cell are 23 single chromosomes; in each somatic cell are 23 pairs of chromosomes or 46 total. Well, what does all this have to do with the price of gold or future investments? Actually very little, unless you consider your future children or grandchildren truly an investment

Many cultures past and present place a great value on the family tree of a potential spouse and future parent, looking not only at their societal position but at health, physique and intelligence. A combination of myths, fear and shame continue to fill many a family closet with the skeletons of mother nature's mistakes. Family members who are retarded or in mental institutions are not discussed, and this is most unfortunate, for many times they do not have the hereditary problem feared by other family members. If they do, however, this is vital information that needs to be accurate, clear and shared.

Our technology today enables us to diagnose many hereditary diseases that in recent years were unknown entities. This aspect of genetics is called genetic counselling. With accurate diagnoses, families are able to understand the methods of transmission of hereditary disorders and act responsibly toward their prevention.

A word or two about genetic engineering. This is the science of taking genes and reshaping them so that they produce a different sort of offspring. So far, genetic engineering has been practiced only with tiny organisms such as bacteria and viruses. Some progress is being made toward the treatment of hereditary diseases with genetic engineering. The limits of human genetic change are not clearly known, but the ethical considerations are mind-boggling and hotly debated.

After this somewhat lengthy dissertation, what advice would I have for the parents of tomorrow? That they seriously consider looking at, rather than in, each other's genes.

and USTA-rules. Within an hour time limit, the victor(s) will be yielded in a best of 3-set fashion.


