The Boston Marathon

Garbage bag manufacturers would have smiled had they viewed the start of the 85th annual Boston Marathon. Clad in the most fashionable of athletic attire were runners covered with garbage bags, clear plastic jump suits, baggy old sweat suits and a colorful array of other running gear and clothing. Athletic socks used as mittens warmed hands and fingers that were tinged with a slight numbness brought on by the invigorating 47° temperature of Hopkinton. Mass., takeoff point of the Marathon.

One might have been slightly confused observing this spectacle if he had expected the traditional "On your mark. Get set. Go!," for as the 6,845 official runners lined up in sections marked off by their qualifying times, a carnival side-show of hot dog stands, balloons and souvenir vendors bordered the mass of bodies.

At the boom of the cannon, multitudes of world-class runners bolted at a lightning sub-5:00 pace along the historical Colonial pathway toward Prudential Center in the heart of Boston. Leading the field were Rodgers, Virgin, Seko, Catalano, Roe and Benoit. The course provided many challenges as the seemingly endless rolling hills culminated at the crest of Heartbreak Hill, a series of four hills providing a true mental test of strength at this 17.5-mile point of the race.

Thousands of spectators lined the streets to encourage the runners with their cheers and aids of water, oranges, ice and beer. As the crowd pushed inward to get a closer look, they created areas which would allow only one or two runners at a time to squeeze through.

The failure of the course officials to provide 15 and 20-mile split times made pacing difficult. Adding to the calculation problem was the frustration involved with the controlled pace and delayed crossing of the starting line due to the many participants.

The pathway of the approaching finish line proceeded downward as the mind tried to convince the straining leg muscles to push forward just six . . . five . . . four more miles. Echoing shouts of "Sprint, you're almost there" teased as the 20-mile mark came into view.

Finally, the finish line became visible as screams of "Go Hawaii!" once

again enabled the body to take those last few steps which signaled a 2:41.26 (unadjusted time). Hugh Murray had achieved his goal, a new personal record. A feeling of euphoria became mixed with humility as hundreds of shiny, silver space blankets reflected the realization that so many had finished within the 32 minutes following Seko's record-breaking time of 2:09.26, and Allison Roe's spectacular 2:26.46.

As the Outrigger Canoe Club emblem was covered with the mylar blanket, thoughts of Hawaii came into mind along with an inner appreciation of the noble and efficient Cline Mann's aid station and support crew.

This year also saw several less-major projects, yet no-less important such as the cosmetic improvements to the ladies room off the Hau Terrace; the renovation of the surf and kayak racks —thanks to Paul Bates; the new railings from the beach to the Colony Surf; and the continuing efforts of George Brangier for keeping our club in good-looking greenery.

It should be noted also that there was a new spirit of cooperation between the Building and Grounds Committee and the House Committee. At each meeting a member of the other committee attended. And it should be further noted that all members of B & G, including Doug Luiz and Jay Harden, helped make this a "vintage" year.

No highly reputed wine-producing chateau is ever possible without a competent vineyard superintendent. And so it is, also, at the Outrigger Canoe Club. The success of Buildings and Grounds was due in no small measure to the time and efforts and complete cooperation of our General Manager Ray Ludwig. Our warmest "mahalo" to him.

As always, the events will be held at "Old Man's" with divisions as follows:


