

Motorcycle Trail Riding at OCC

Action for the Club's 25 active motor-cycle trail riders generally gets started with Doss Tannehill, Motorcycle Committee Chairman, making a few phone calls. The gang meets at Kenny's restaurant on Pali Highway at 7:00 a.m. for breakfast and then off to Helemano, Mililani or Kahuku for a day of riding.

A day's riding is just that. Rain or shine, we're on the trails from 4 to 6 hours and then finish off the day in the parking lot over a few beers. We generally ride over 40 to 60 miles of trails and dirt roads. Trails are very narrow (one bike wide) and go through the hills, valleys and streams. The object is to see who can get through the trail the fastest, who can climb the hill the best or who can ride through the stream or river without drowning or braking his motorcycle.

All of this practice prepares us for the three or four races held each year. These races are called "Hare & Hound" or Enduros. Hare & Hound races are individual events and usually have about 100 entrants. The riders line up in the starting area and the start is signaled by a smoke bomb. When the rides see the smoke, they start engines and take off for the smoke and the beginning of the trail. The trail is marked by colored ribbon, hung every hundred yards or so. You go as fast as the terrain will allow and as fast as you can spot the ribbons.

To prove that all trails are covered,

each trail is marked with a package of numbered checks strategically located along that trail. Each rider takes one and goes on. Usually there are 40 checks (trails) in a race, so the first rider getting to the finish line with all of the checks is the winner. A race usually takes 4 hours or more to complete.

The "Primo" events of the year are the Big Island's Mauna Kea 200, and the Kauai Hare & Hound.



The Mauna Kea 200 is a 200-plus-mile, two-day event that takes place in the volcano country of the Big Island. The first day, the riders cover the lower slopes, riding through the swamps, Lehua forests and generally miserable lava country. That night, the bikes are impounded and the rider can make repairs with only the tools or parts with which he started the day. *No* outside help. Riders bunk down in the Mauna Kea State Park cabins that

night.

Next day, the course takes us to the high country with part of the trail going through Kilauea crater at the 13,000-foot level, then around the outside of the crater and back to the State Park for dinner, stories and awards.

In 1979 an OCC team of Tom Connor, Steve Scott and John Beaumont won the team trophy for this event. We'll be trying again this year.

Recently, here on Oahu, two Hare & Hound races were held. One in the Helemano area covered about 65 miles in the rain and only 15 of the 75 starters finished the entire course. OCC riders were Doss and Mark Tannehill, Brant Ackerman, John Hennessey, Peter Halford, Mark Buck, Greg Gillette, Gerrit Osborne, Doug Sheehan, Hank Lass, Bob Riley and John Beaumont. Placing in the events were Osborne, 1st in the Open Class, Beaumont, 3rd Open, and Beaumont and Hennessey 1st and 4th in the over-40 age group.

The other event was held in the Kahuku hills on a dry day, the winner coming in just over 4 hours. Most of the above riders were in this event also, with Beaumont taking 4th in the Open Class.

Coming events are the Mauna Kea 200 on May 23-24 and the Kauai Hare & Hound on Labor Day weekend in September. Anyone interested in riding with the group, just contact any of the riders and we'll get you started.

Judges of Election Committee Report

It is my privilege to report the results of the 1981 election of Directors which ended with the closing of the ballot box at 6 p.m. on Sunday, February 22.

Robert Guild, Ben Cassiday, Fred Trotter, William Wilson and Tom Reiner were newly elected or reelected to serve two-year terms as Directors of the Outrigger Canoe Club.

In accordance with our by-laws, these persons will join the seven Directors currently in office and at the organizational meeting following the annual meeting, elect a new President and slate of officers to serve through the year ending in February 1982.

A total of 947 ballots were cast in the current election. Of these, 57 were not counted, 7 because of delinquency in Club accounts and 50 which were mismarked. This left a total of 890 valid ballots as compared with 959 in last year's election and 978 in 1979.

Ballots were mailed to 1,780 Club members entitled to vote. These are Senior, Regular, Life and Intermediate members. The order in which the candidates' names appeared on official ballot was determined by lot.

I would like to thank the following members who served on the Election Committee with me: Bob Costa, Jay Harden, William Barnhart, Frank Walton, John Lacy, Philip Seneff, Ron Haworth, James Nordyke.

Golf Plans

In the planning stage are three more golf tournaments for 1981, one to be held Tuesday, June 2, the others in August and November, according to word from Frank Walton, Golf Committee chairman.

The June tournament will be held at the Navy/Marine Golf Course, with lunch at 12 and a Shotgun start at 1 p.m. A tentative agreement has been reached to hold the November tournament at Waialae Country Club.

Run/Swim Biathlon

Press deadlines prevented an earlier report on the February 22 Biathlon in which a number of OCC members participated. The annual event, sponsored jointly by the Waikiki Swim Club, Mid-Pacific Road Runners and the City Parks & Recreation Dept., is called the Run/Swim Biathlon. The course is a 2.7-mile run once around Ala Moana Park and Magic Island, followed immediately by a shoe strip and plunge into the protected ocean fronting Ala Moana Beach.

Swimmers have a straight 800-meter (½ mile) swim as soon as they recover the use of their legs. (The running leg and the swimming leg use different muscles, and it takes a while to readjust—the older the swimmer, the longer it takes!)

OCC swim ace Jim Dean came in second over-all with a time of 26 minutes 54 seconds. He was only 31 seconds behind the winning WSC swimmer, who finished in 26:23. Ian Emberson was fourth over-all in 28:27.

Other OCC participants were Pat Caldwell, Joe Teipel, Felipe Pomar, Robbie Taylor, Leighton Taylor (who was behind his 14-year-old son by 3 seconds), Tom Henke, Eve Anderson and Grant Senner.

Grant, age 9, has completed two Honolulu marathons but had never before swum the distance of the Biathlon. He was escorted by his mother, Gerry DeBenedetti, and sister, Cassie Senner. Although he beat them both in the run

portion, they caught up with him in the water and encouraged him on. His ambition is to complete the Nautilus Triathlon in 1991, so he is in training now!
