



## Overflow Crowd attends 1979 Annual Meeting

When outgoing President William Eggers called the Club's 1979 Annual Meeting to order late Monday afternoon, February 26, the Club's parking facility was filled and extra chairs had been brought onto the lanai area surrounding the dining room to accommodate the overflow crowd. Long-time members believe it was the largest crowd to attend an Annual Meeting since the late 1950's, when the move from Waikiki was being hotly debated.

After being assured that there was a quorum present, President Eggers called upon the chairman of the Judges of Election Committee to announce the results of the balloting for seven new Directors to serve during the coming Club year. Four of

the newly elected Directors were seated, the other three being unavoidably absent.

Reports of outgoing Officers and committee chairmen were then presented and received with interest by the attentive crowd. (All reports which have reached the Editor's desk as we ready the March issue for publication are included in the following pages.)

At their organization meeting following adjournment of the Annual Meeting, our new Board of Directors elected the following Officers and Co-ordinating Directors to serve during the current Club year: President, Ronald Sorrell; Vice President, Operations, Paul McDaniel; Vice President, Activities,

Mark Buck; Treasurer, Bud Ackerman; Assistant Treasurer, Archibald Carswell; Secretary, William Baird; Assistant Secretary, Neal Ifversen; House, Robert Moore; Buildings and Grounds, Gordon Bradley; Long Range Planning, William Wilson; Admissions and Membership, Benjamin Cassiday; Athletics/"Winged O", Bill Capp; Entertainment / P.R. / Historical, Thomas Reiner; Labor/Management, Colin Chock; Food and Beverages, Charles Martin. # The President's Report

That quiet little beach club on the shores of Waikiki Beach, with its sleepy-eyed members lounging among the grass shacks, now lives only in our memories. The Club is now a 3.0 million business. We all yearn to enjoy those tranquil, sun-bleached days, but the crushing impact of the present and the future awakens us to the realities of our daily responsibilities here. With all the Club's activities and the high-spirited participation by our Club members in social and athletic events of their own, it is easy to lose sight of what this Club's main objectives are.

I think you will agree with me that the Club accommodates affiliated members now to a point of saturation. The premises, services and members' dispositions are stressed to the limit, but we need affiliated members to maintain our financial liquidity. During 1978 the Admissions Committee held the line by allowing attrition to dictate admission to membership, thus we have a substantial waiting list of applicants who have to wait in excess of one year for final consideration. Meanwhile, the affiliated guests pour in and out, day after day. Hopefully, 1979 will provide answers to developing a formula that will strike a fair balance for both member and visitor.

During my 1978 presidency, the Board and I concentrated on Club operations. This effort began in 1977 and bore fruit during the implementation of various management programs in 1978. During the four years prior to 1978 the Club suffered a loss totaling \$350,000. During 1978, with close attention paid to operations, the Club enjoyed a net income of \$252,629.

Although this is a nonprofit Club (that is, profit is not distributed to the members), the Club must be run at a profit just as any business must. This Club is committed to a major restaurant business whether you like it or not. Too few people administer and manage this critical profit center. If the Club is run efficiently and at a profit, the Club members reap the dividends of low dues, quality food and service, well-financed and managed athletic activities and entertaining social activities.

Management demonstrated it can respond to the Board's goals. The Board set operations goals for management and with a careful adjustment in menu prices (our prices are still 16.4 lower than the local restaurant industry) and belt-tightening in operations, I leave the Club in the black and with a comfortable financial pad.

In 1978 your Board accomplished the following:

- Retired the mortgage, which at the time had a balance of \$23,629.54. The monthly

payments toward this account are being redirected to the building fund;

- Paid \$20,000 for the repair of the sea groin;
- Paid a 1977 architect's fee of \$28,000;
- Completely renovated the Snack Bar at a cost of \$8,850;
- Resisted the State's effort to tax employe gratuities, which would have resulted in a 2 percent increase in your drinks and 3 percent on food, totaling a loss in revenue to the Club of approximately \$11,000 a year;
- The Board with management's assistance reduced overtime pay to employes by 90 percent;
- The Board appointed an employe compensation committee which prepared and reported an exemplary study on supervisors' salaries;
- Reduced unaccounted-for inventory, which totaled \$15,000 in 1977, to \$200 in 1978;
- Sponsored the largest group of canoe paddlers in the Club's history;
- Selected Mary Philpotts as the Club's consultant for interior decoration. New carpeting and draperies for the dining room and cocktail lounge have been selected. Carpeting was paid for prior to delivery at a cost of \$18,000;
- Reviewed the Club's entire insurance portfolio and made appropriate adjustments thereto;
- The Membership Handbook was revised as a result of the overwhelming contribution made by Colonel Berenzweig, whose "Rosetta stone" will improve Club members' relationships for years to come;
- Authorized installation of a new telephone system;
- Commissioned the preparation of a maintenance manual by the Buildings and Grounds Committee, and thru their devoted efforts, the Club will be able to predict replacement dates and costs so as to make appropriate budget estimates in the future;
- Appointed the first female Maitre d' in the State;
- Invoked a new parking policy which inflamed the temper of all members and

decreased the number of unauthorized parkers, which totalled over \$11,440 during the year;

- Changed the rules for Island NonResidents allowing them thirty days per year use of the Club;
- Thru the efforts of the Long Range Planning Committee, the Board initiated studies into garage expansion, Board Room renovation and the construction of a one-story addition over the kitchen and business office.

During 1978 your equity in this Club increased by a total of \$118,754, compared with a \$68,000 loss in 1977. Initiation fees for 1978 totaled \$133,875. Initiation fees were earmarked during 1978 and not used for operations. This is as it should be.

You will, I think, agree with me that 1978 was a very successful year for the Club. Your Board has made real progress in understanding and administering the Club's operations. The Club is recognized as the best private club in the State, the most attractive and the best buy in the nation. The Club's success is very dependent upon your contribution both in committees socially and athletically.

Let us now look toward the future. This Club will continue to be confronted with severe and continuing economic pressure due to inflationary increase in the cost of goods and the services. This will continue to challenge management and the Board of Directors to seek new ways and means of reducing controllable costs and expenses to the practical minimum.

Looking toward the future, I offer the following suggestions to the 1979 Board to assist them in their tasks ahead:

- A) Reorganize the Board of Directors by:
  1. Consolidating entertainment and public relations under one directorship;
  2. The Director's position opened by this could be designated Coordinating Director of Food and Beverages.
  3. Consolidating the House and Buildings and Grounds directorships.
  4. The freed director could be designated Coordinating Director of Labor-Management Relations.
  5. Consolidating athletics and "Winged O" under one director and free a director to coordinate specific construction operations or management problems under the President's direction.
- B) Develop a method of implementing the plastic membership card system.

- C) Establish a computerized accounts receivable, payroll and inventory system.
- D) Revise and update the Club's chit system.
- E) Establish an OCC Athletic Fund to which gifts, bequests, and tax deductible donations may be made.

I am very optimistic about this Club's future. The four-year trend line looked bleak until 1978. With continued enthusiastic dedication by our Club manager, his assistants, William Teruya our Chef, the hardworking supervisors and employes, 1979 can also yield positive results. The membership also must continue to donate spare time to committees, athletic activities and social events.

On behalf of the membership I extend their sincere appreciation and that of the Board's to all the Club's employes. We thank you for making our recreational time more enjoyable.

My personal aloha to the dedicated and tireless committee members and fellow directors with whom I've served over the last six years.

I am very proud to be associated with all of you and especially grateful for the privilege and honor of serving as your president.

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## The Treasurer's Report

The Outrigger Canoe Club, for the year 1978, enjoyed a record profit. The net income for this year, including initiation fees of \$133,800, was \$252,629, compared to \$83,580 in 1977. This is a 30% increase over last year. This increase was due to tighter controls on our cost ratios by your Board of Directors and management. These controls must continue to be maintained in the years ahead.

Total revenue for the Club in 1978 was \$3,000,000, an increase of \$443,497. It is important that the members, Board of Directors and management staff accept the fact that we are no longer a small-time business. We are now involved in the operation of a two million dollar restaurant under our roof. Our food sales volume was \$1,220,000 and our beverage sales totaled \$508,000, for a total food and beverage income of \$1,728,000. The bottom line of these two operations shows a net profit of \$88,550 versus a 1977 loss of \$14,800. This is a turn-around of \$103,000. In July of 1978 we were forced to increase our menu prices by an average of 8¾%. This was due primarily to inflation hitting our cost of

goods. The salary increases for our employes last year averaged 7.3%.

On the basis of profit per square foot, our little Beach Shop produced a profit of \$3,090 per square foot for the year 1978 on volume of \$170,000.

Our locker rooms showed a loss of \$31,500, up by \$4,800. Early in the year the aspects of these losses were discussed at great length by the Board of Directors, and it was their decision to continue to provide the various supplies and towels to its members free of charge.

As you know from experience, our Club occasionally becomes crowded with guests and affiliated members. However, keep in mind that these guests pay a service charge of 20% on all food and merchandise, so their total spending provided us with \$625,000 of income. Total guest service charges for the year was up 22¼% at \$119,000. We also received an additional \$36,000 in guest card fees, so for these temporary moments of inconvenience your Club received a total of \$155,000 in service charge income. The Board of Directors has instructed the Manager to monitor affiliated guest cards, and we have empowered him to reduce and set quotas during various peak seasons.

You might also be interested in learning I made a study of spending habits of all our membership categories: Regular, Senior, Intermediate, Associate, NonResident, guests etc. The first study was in March of 1978 and the second in August. The study showed that approximately 22% of our Regular members spent zero dollars at the Club, and that approximately 22% of them spent \$25 or less, which means 44% of our regular members spent less than \$25 during these periods of study. Meanwhile, the guest members average expenditure was \$25 to \$50. However, there are more big spenders, and understandably so, in the guest membership category. Approximately 25% of them spent more than \$200 during their visit to our Club.

In the administrative and general categories the total cost was \$953,000, up 11% over the previous years. This includes cost of goods, salaries, taxes, benefits and all other expenses. A recent study by the University of Hawaii Masters of Business Administration Department has given us some ideas to control these areas more closely.

Another area that has had increased costs is in our utilities. Hot water and power costs totaled \$83,835, up 9% over 1977. To keep costs down in this area we are using water restrictors to conserve water usage, and management is in control of other areas of conservation.

You will also be pleased to know we paid off our mortgage with the First Hawaiian Bank and the Bank of Hawaii. These funds are now being set aside in your building fund to maintain our fifteen-year-old building. We have on order new employe uniforms, new carpeting and a new telephone system which has just been installed, to mention a few items our mortgage dollars have gone into.

As many of you know, we had some of the Bankers' Convention parties here last year, as well as a large private party for the realtors. These two functions grossed \$58,000 and added \$23,000 to our bottom line.

Our building fund portfolio was increased by \$52,236 and now totals \$283,963, with an unweighted yield of approximately 10%. Your members' equity in the Club is now \$1,907,757, an increase of \$252,629 which is up 13.2%.

One other source of income is the parking charge of \$1 we all get stuck with from time to time. As you know, this policy was established in an attempt to reduce the number of unauthorized vehicles occupying critical space in the Club's garage. This annoying little charge produced income of \$11,440.

The major problems facing our Club and all other clubs continues to be in the cost of operations, wages, fringe benefits, related taxes, and in replacement and maintenance of the facilities. Your Board of Directors and management has learned a lot in these areas the past year and should be able to increase their efficiency in the current year.

Your Club has enjoyed a remarkable year financially, The Harris, Kerr, Forster firm's audit is available to any Club member in the manager's office.

My congratulations to Manager Norman Riede for a successful financial year and my sincerest mahalo to Charles Hee for patiently putting up with my never-ending questions. It has been a very educational and rewarding experience serving as your Treasurer.

## Club Captain's Report:

1978 was another great year for OCC athletic activities and achievements. As in the past, our goals are to gain maximum membership participation and to produce winning teams in our chosen sports.

A brief rundown of our 1978 activity starts with the OCC domination of most of the local volleyball tournaments followed by winning Hilo's Haile tournament and the State championships at the local level, and then going on to the national level where our Masters team (35 & over) took 3rd and our Open team took 2nd in the nation.

Our club sailors did well in local regattas. This year the OCC hosted three regattas that were very well received by the local sailors.

Our mountain ball team won the Surveyors League for the 5th time and is still looking for new worlds to conquer.

In surfing, the OCC continues to produce champions but the Club championships fell victim to poor summer surf and schedule conflicts. Distance paddle boarding is regaining popularity in local circles. This year the OCC sponsored an open event with well established criteria as to course, distance and equipment standards. In this inaugural event, OCC paddlers captured the first three places.

Our club swimming program is oriented toward open ocean distance swimming, and Club swimmers entered the Waikiki Roughwater Swim, the Castle Swim and the Maui Channel Swim.

Motorcycling is a newly recognized OCC sport with about 25 active riders terrorizing the mountain trails. In our first competitive effort, our OCC team took first place in the Mauna Kea 200 mile race on the Big Island.

Club golfers participated in three great tournaments this past year, two of them at military courses not normally available to civilian groups.

Running continues to gain popularity at an astounding rate. In the Honolulu 26 mile marathon more

than 70 club runners entered and finished.

Canoe racing for 1978 was once again a great success. More than 250 members took part in winning the Kamehameha Day and Macfarlane regattas, taking a second in the Oahu championships and first in the State championships. In distance racing, our crews took first in the Dad Center race, then went on to win 3 out of the 4 races at Kona's Liliuokalani canoe race. To most everyone's surprise, a crew from California walked away with the Molokai race this year. OCC took 4th & 5th place overall, placing 2nd in the Koa division and a 3rd in the fiberglass division.

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## IRON MAN TRIATHLON

After a one day postponement due to adverse sea and weather conditions, the second annual IRON MAN TRIATHLON was held on January 14, 1979. The grueling course consisted of; 2.4 mile ocean swim from Sans Souci, ending at the Hawaiian Village; then a 112 mile bike race, counter-clockwise around Oahu via Makapuu, Kahuku, Haleiwa, Wahiawa and Kunia, ending at Aloha Tower; then the 26.2 mile Honolulu Marathon course via Diamond Head to Hawaii Kai, returning and ending at Kapiolani Park Bandstand.

Capturing 3d place in the 14-man, one-woman field (and she took 5th place) was member Ian Emberson in an elapsed time of 12 hours, 23 minutes, 30 seconds. This bettered, by about an hour and a half, his time in the 1977 race, when he took 4th. Ian was first to finish in the swimming leg with a time of 1:02:35. His other times were 6:53 for the bicycle leg and 4:28 for the Marathon. Truly a remarkable feat for this superbly conditioned Club athlete, who in recent months took 2nd in the OCC Castle Swim and also competed in the Honolulu Marathon and OCC-sponsored 10,000 meter Waikiki Ocean Paddleboard Race. The winner in record time of 11:15:56 was Tom Warren of San Diego.

Escorting and directing Ian on a surfboard in the swimming leg was Dale Hope. Running with Ian during the last 7 miles of the marathon leg was Kimo Austin, who Ian credited for keeping up a brisk pace to the finish. Wayne Faulkner and Cline Mann furnished safety escort in the Club whaler during the swimming portion.

## Athletic Awards Banquet

The annual Awards Banquet sponsored by the "Winged O" was held in the Club's main dining room on Friday, Feb. 16, 1979.

The evening started with a surprised Bill Capp receiving the 1978 outstanding golfer award. Mountainball was next with its fine record of 12 wins, no losses. Special plaques went to Bill Head, outstanding pitcher and Danny West, outstanding player.

Forty-two running plaques were given out and Jerry Ober, Running Committee Chairman, announced that 60 OCC members finished the Honolulu Marathon. The best times registered were: Don Machado, 2:59:15, and Connie Maguire at 3:36. This makes Connie eligible for the Boston Marathon.

Castle Swim awards were next. 12 people received plaques; Donna Kahakui for Women's Overall, and Jimmy Dean, Champion Overall, setting a new record. For all you beach chair procrastinators, a special note: Lloyd Osborne and Eileen Soule received plaques for Men's 65-74 and women's 65-75. Also a new record was set in the national AAU Masters Swimming by Joan Osborne. Joan took 5 first places out of 5 events in her age group (60-64). In the 400 meter free style and 200 meter individual medley she established new national records of 7:22:42 and 3:59:10 in both of which she was the previous record holder. Lloyd, competing in the 65-69 age bracket, took two 2nd's, one 3rd, and 1 fifth, and National champion in the largest race, the 1500-meter freestyle.


Volleyball '78 was as exciting as in previous years. Again, OCC ran away with many honors. For the 16th time, OCC won the second largest AAU tournament, the Haile Invitational. This team also won the Hawaii State AAU Championship. Competition at U.S.V.B.A. in El Paso, Texas brought honorable mention to Jim Iams and John Zabriskie, as All-Americans. Thirteen plaques were awarded in volleyball. The highlight of this segment was the presentation to Wally Young of the "Winged O" blazer. Bob Kashare received special recognition for his hard work as tournament director for the 1977 AAU Volleyball Nationals held in Honolulu.

Sailing awards went to George McPheeters, Sid Snyder, Dale Hope and Mike Holmes. Sailor of the year was Don Machado. Surf board paddling, a new event, had two plaques; for Chuck Kelly (Men's Champion), and Gay Austin (Women's Champion).

Eugenia McMahan presented the John McMahan Award to Kisi Haine as outstanding junior surfer. Motorcycling awards went to

John Beaumont, Tom Conner, Steve Scott. Canoe Paddling continued to have the most participants, with 68 awards given out. All canoe paddling crews were State champions. Bob Fischer received a special award for his early contribution to canoe paddling, and his efforts to make it the sport it is today.

The "Winged O" Award was a real teaser. Ron Sorrell, master of ceremonies and one of the first to receive the "Winged O", read at length the criteria for the 1978 "Winged O" award without naming the award winner. It was a stunned Colin Chock who, to a standing ovation, received the 1978 "Winged O" Award. Colin, clad in his new "Winged O" blazer, proved to be a man of few words: "Thank you".

## Admissions and Membership

The Admissions and Membership Committee held 27 meetings during 12 months of its tenure. 70 new Regular members were admitted, 329 transferred from other classes, 46 activated their memberships and 15 were reinstated. Total: 487

We lost 406 members to death, resignation and transfer to other membership classifications. This leaves a balance of 1,384 Regular members. Quota for this membership classification set by the Board of Directors is 1,450

The NonResident membership classification remains closed as the Club has 933 or 133 over the quota set by the Board.

The Admissions Committee generated \$133,875 in initiation fees during 1978.

As in the past, the Committee's goal has been to admit new members who will perpetuate the Club's traditions and give freely of their time and talents toward making the Outrigger Canoe Club one of the finest private clubs in the world.

I would like to express my deep appreciation to a very hardworking committee which sincerely had the Club's best interest at heart. The Committee consisted of Coordinating Director C. E. Bud Ackerman; CoChairman Peter Balding, and members Stewart Brissette, Marjorie Howe, Kent Giles, Frederick Swartz and Kim Woolaway.

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## The M.B.A. Study

During the latter part of 1978, a two man team of U.H. Business Administration students working toward their M.B.A.'s made an intensive study of our Club's dining room and bar operations.

The study, initiated by Ronald Sorrell, treasurer of OCC Board of Directors, and approved by the Board, was made under the supervision of Dr. Joseph Miccio, retired president of the Curtis-Wright Corporation and a professor at U. of H. Dr. Miccio holds a PhD in Education with a concentration in business.

The student team, comprised of Jim Strachan and Steve Bern, focused on two major areas: An evaluation of the efficiency of the Club's food and beverage operations, and an appraisal of our purchasing, receiving, office procedure and internal control.

A comprehensive report of the study and accompanying recommendations were presented on February 7, 1979 to the Board of Directors, Long Range Planning Committee, House Committee, OCC Board of Directors nominees, and Club management. The conclusions and recommendations primarily addressed the functional operations of OCC.

The management Audit Study concluded that the food and beverage operations account for 82.7% of OCC revenue. With this high percentage, recommendations included: Formation of a new committee to give the food and beverage the emphasis it demands. The major function of the committee would be to establish goals and standards and to monitor personal and departmental performance. The study also strongly recommended that our management implement a plastic card system, pointing out the inefficiency of present system. Additionally, the plastic card system would eliminate 120 man hours weekly. The in-depth study is being considered for action.

# 1978 Swim Report

1978 was the biggest year of participation for our organized swim program. Despite poor press coverage, more people turned out for more activities.

1) Swim Clinics in August involved 14 people for distance swimming in the open ocean. Most of these swimmers were Roughwater entrants.

2) Waikiki Roughwater Swim, held annually on Labor Day, is co-sponsored by OCC. We had 3 canoe escorts and 18 swimmers. Five Club members came home with trophies.

3) The Maui Channel Swim Team placed third this year, captained by Ian Emberson. Jimmy Dean was chairman of the entire event, biggest ever, with 16 teams, eight from the mainland.

4) November Castle Swim was the biggest turn out with 35 swimmers and about as many escorts. Jimmy Dean took 1st place for the 4th year in a row.

5) Swim/fit charts are on the walls in both locker rooms. Mileage awards will be (were?) presented in February for swimming 100, 250 and 500 miles.

Thanks to all participants, the swim program now seems clearly established as a part of the Club's activities.

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## ANNUAL REPORT-GOLF COMMITTEE

The golf activity enjoyed a great season in 1978. Three tournaments were held, one each at three different locations: Olomana, the old standby; then two military courses: Hickam Air Force Base and Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station.

One hundred eighty-one persons participated: 150 men and 31 women. Sixteen players participated in all three tournaments: 14 men and two women.

The steadily improving quality of our golf program has been, in part, because of the fine groundwork laid by Bill Capp in past years.

This year, Bill racked up a fine record as a player. He won one tournament, placed second in another and won closest to the pin honors in a third. His average score for the three tournaments was a neat 84.

For these reasons, we honored Bill as the outstanding Outrigger Canoe Club Golfer for the Year 1978.

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


