Outrigger Canoe Club Paddlers win the Big One!

Sorry, Teiki Tamari, there's no tomorrow, no next week, no next month. Come back to Hawaii next October, however, if you want another shot at winning the Molokaito-Oahu canoe race.

Teiki Tamari is a Tahitian paddler and the official apologist for the Maire Nui entry in the annual 42mile Aloha Week marathon paddle. According to Tamari, the second place Tahitians were beset by problems from the outset of the fall classic from Hale O Lono on Molokai to Magic Island. That was the basis. he said, for challenging the Outrigger to a rematch, presumably a week or two after the official running of the October 16th event.

Obviously the Outrigger declined Teiki Tamari's challenge.

As OCC paddler Mark Buck put it: "You run what you bring, brother, and if you aren't ready on the day of the big race, you have a year to think about getting ready for the next one."

Outrigger's veteran-ladden crew obviously had it all together as the starter's flag dropped to signal the commencement of the 1977 Aloha Week classic. When 49 crews surged

towards Laau Point and the Molokai could bury them early in the race.' Channel itself. Outrigger's lead increased first to a hundred yards, then two hundred, finally a quarter mile of open water at the point. Already the outcome of the race had been determined, though five and one half hours of hard paddling were left and the Tahitians were not yet aware they had met their match.

In fact, some seven miles out from Hale O Lono, the Maire Nui team mounted a furious challenge, and by raising their stroke to 60 beats a minute, the onrushing Tahitians ate away at Outrigger's lead until only four or five boat lengths separated the two canoes. A re-run of a 1975 encounter with the very same Tahitian crew was uppermost in coach Tom Conner's mind.

"We paddled side-by-side with Maire Nui for over 20 miles in the 1975 race, "Conner reflected. "It was

away from the starting line at 7:00 mentally and physically exhausting, a.m., Outrigger's red-and-yellow and it was simply a matter of time Manu 'Ula (Red Bird) picked up a before one of us cracked. Luckily the small, feathering swell and Tahitians cracked first. At all costs I immediately gained a two boat wanted to avoid another long duel length advantage over its closest with them. I figured our best pursuers. And as the crews sprinted strategy, then, was to throw a few down Molokai's southeastern shore more coals on the fire to see if we

Conner's strategy proved to be flawless. By calling on his paddlers to up their pace to a virtual sprint, and by exhorting them to draw upon their reservoirs of "carbohydrate" energy, Conner led the charge that moved the Manu 'Ula into a clear lead, by a margin that grew by a hundred yards with each passing mile.

Now Maire Nui was in disarray. Relief paddlers tore holes in the boat's nylon splash cover as they hastily tried to board the canoe. Maire Nui's steersman, obviously unaccustomed to the rough, openocean conditions prevailing in the channel, was hard-pressed to keep his canoe from sliding erratically down the sides of the wind driven swells. But the greatest error of all occured when Maire Nui turned

towards the north in hopes of finding a favorable current inshore along the Koko Head cliffs. Instead, Maire Nui found itself caught in a strong current running towards Makapuu which only served to compound the lengthening disadvantage.

As the Outrigger made landfall off Black Point, a growing armada of pleasure boats joined up to escort the leader towards the finish line. By now OCC's lead had grown to nearly three miles. The margin was so convincing that the final few miles of the race had no more urgency than one of the innumerable Sunday workouts that had preceded the race. Bouved by the shouts and cheers from hundreds of wellwishers on the spectator boats, and then by an enormous roar of welcome from 8.000 people gathered at Magic Island, Manu 'Ula surged across the finish line at 12:55 p.m.

Maire Nui was a distant second, with two Hawaiian crews - Hui Nalu and Kailua Canoe Club - finishing third and fourth respectively.

For Brant Ackerman, OCC's super steersman, who gave an ironman performance throughout the race, the win was sweet revenge. "We waited and prepared all year long to redeem last year's loss," Ackerman said. "Everything our crew did this year focused on one goal: beating the Tahitians."

John Finney was the success story of the season. Paddling the summer season as a Novice "B", Finney went on to become one of the strongest members of OCC's premier distance crew. In Finney's opinion the Molokai race is a vast undertaking and winning is an overwhelming accomplishment enjoyed by a select few paddlers. "It's my first Molokai race and, naturally, my first win, and I just might quit while I'm ahead," Finney mused.

This year's race was the 16th time Mark Buck has crossed the Molokai Channel in a canoe. He's been in the winning boat five times. For Buck, though, winning the 1977 race was the most satisfying experience in all his years as a paddler. "Our crew this year was better trained and better disciplined than any other I've ever paddled with. I know we could not have achieved our win without those qualities, either," Buck said. "The Tahitians are awesome, so when you finally beat them, you really know you've reached the summit."

For Tom Conner, OCC's coach and builder of the Manu 'Ula, Outrigger's win was the culmination of competition against the Tahitians which began in 1975. "We 'surprised' Tahiti in 1975," Conner said, "and they simply annihilated us last year. This year's race was a third and decisive meeting. We wanted to prove we were worthy to be called champions."

Other members of the crew were Colin Perry, Ed Pickering, Jay West, John Finney was the success story

Marshall Rosa, and Tim Guard.

Get set for the Annual Castle Swim

Sunday, November 27, the OCC will hold its grand finale to the summer swim season, the annual Castle Swim. The open ocean distance swim of one and a half miles from the Royal Hawaiian Hotel to the Club is open to swimmers of all ages.

Starting time is 8:30 A.M. at the Club. The time is chosen by an oceanographer to take advantage of favorable tides, and if it is delayed, swimmers will have a harder time getting in to the Club channel. PLEASE be on time.

There are men's and women's divisions in seven different age groups: 10 years to 17; 18 - 24; 25 - 34; 35 - 44; 45 - 54; 55 - 64; and 65 - 74. Junior members especially are welcome. There are awards in each class as well as trophies for the overall winners.

The Castle Swim was originally sponsored by Harold Castle. It began at his home, site of the present Elks Club, and ended at the old OCC in Waikiki. In 1920 the race was won in 28 minutes, 31 seconds. Last year's winner, Jimmy Dean, won the event — now swum in the opposite direction — in 38 minutes, 58 seconds.

Transportation to the start, as well as paddle and canoe escorts are provided. Safety is paramount. Following the race, the Club provides a brunch on the Hau Terrace for swimmers and escorts.

Both canoe paddlers and surfboard paddlers are needed as escorts.

The club is open 365 days a year from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. and has a membership of 250. An introductory cards is required for guest privileges.

Overnight accommodations are available through Aspen Chateaux for singles, couples, and families if children are 15 or over Rates are seasonal

Athletic facilities include: two handball/racquetball courts, squash court, lap swimming pool, completely equipped conditioning and weight room, exercise room, steambath, sauna, and an extra large therapy pool, cold plunge pool, solar rooms, massage room, pro shop, and men's and women's locker rooms. There is a glass enclosed lounge for viewing play on the handball courts.

Handball, racquetball, and squash lessons can be taken from a resident pro. The club offers special conditioning and exercise classes and has a masseur. Ping pong and paddle tennis are also available.

Food is served at a snack bar open from $10\,00$ a m. to $9\!:\!00\,$ p.m.

As others see us. . .

HONOLULU Magazine, in its October issue, has taken an objective and detailed "...look at life in the (Honolulu) Private Clubs." In the lengthy article, filling nearly six pages of the 90-page issue, freelance writer Tom Horton thoroughly scrutinizes every aspect of what he calls Honolulu's "Big Four Private Clubs:": Pacific Club; Oahu Country Club; Waialae Country Club, and Outrigger Canoe Club. He starts a summarization of his observations by stating that "The best club buy in Hawaii and one of the best in the U.S. may be the Outrigger Canoe Club, which was founded 'for men and boys only' in 1908 by a man named Alexander Hume Ford."

Horton's flattering conclusions are based on comparisons with the other "Big Four" clubs. Outrigger's relatively reasonable initiation fee (the new \$2,000 -fee for the overthirty-fives had not gone into effect when he was researching his article); our reasonable monthly dues; our fine beach; our "prime" location across from Kapiolani Park; our easy parking; our "finely designed and maintained clubhouse"; our "good bar"; our "salubrious indoor and outdoor dining"; our "excellent water sports and volleyball teams...."; and "the best food served at any private club in Hawaii...." all add up in Horton's opinion to something very special in the way of a private club.

In conclusion, Horton quotes OCC's President Robert Anderson as follows: "This is a changed world now, with lots of changed, new people. There are fewer and fewer places where people can get away from the hectic life of downtown or wherever (so) we've got a continuing interest in what generally has the reputation of being a, quote, good club....We want to get good members and we are in a position where we can take a little more time and screen them (the applicants) more thoroughly." (Applause from the Admissions and Membership Committee!). Horton also notes that "Only at Outrigger can (women) join on their own and be voting members."

Wilford Godbold Dies

Wilford D. Godbold, former Outrigger Canoe Club president and Honolulu Circuit Court Judge, died October 5 at the age of 66.

In a recent citation to him on behalf of the Board of Directors and the OCC membership, Club President Robert A. Anderson, Jr. said, "Your distinguished service and guidance through seven years as President of the Outrigger Canoe Club stands above comparison. Your foresight and persistence in the introduction of the 'anchor to windward' proposal in 1956 to enter into lease negotiations with the Elks Lodge is, in the opinion of many, the single most significant event in the Club's history; and largely the reason for the Club's survival and success today.

Born in Alabama, Godbold came to Hawaii in 1919. He attended Punahou School and the University of Hawaii before getting a law degree from the University of Alabama Law School.

A District Court judge, City attorney and U.S. Commissioner for Oahu, he was appointed Honolulu Circuit judge by President Harry Truman in 1952. Over the years, he held a number of positions as a lawyer with the Territory of Hawaii as well as entering private law practice. He represented both the City and County of Honolulu on many official occasions. In addition, he was extremely active in civic and community affairs.

Godbold is survived by his wife Virginia Ehlert Godbold, a son, Wilford, Jr. of California, and a daughter, Evelyn Huffman of Colorado.

Memories of Gay Harris

Gay Harris, who died October 6. 1977, was a Life member of OCC, an Outrigger Canoe Club Manager, and for 67 years one of the Club's most devoted members.

Gay was born in Honolulu in 1901 and first joined the Club in 1910 as a Junior member. A Punahou graduate. he was a swimmer who competed in the 100-meter backstroke at the 1924 Paris Olympics. He was a contemporary of Duke and Sam Kahanamoku; Dad Center, coach of the American Olympic Swimming Team; David Kahanamoku: Mariechen Wehselau Jackson, and Aileen Riggin Soule. He was also a member of several OCC canoe racing crews over the years.

In addition to his athletic activities, Gay contributed much to Club life. When the Outrigger was in financial difficulties in the '20's and Buchanan Harris.

Tips for Runners

The Honolulu Marathon is 5 weeks away on December 11. Now is the time to set up a training schedule to follow for your mileage build up and tapering before the Marathon, so your training decisions are basically set.

If your goal is to finish the Marathon, recognize at what level you are currently running and to what level you can realistically build your weekly mileage.

Your mileage is increased through a series of step-ups from, say, 30 miles per week to a maximum of 60 miles by adding five miles to a week and holding that new mileage for 2 to 3 weeks as your body adapts to the new stress. Then add another five miles and repeat the process.

Set up your training schedule by making a chart for all the weeks before the Marathon and fill in your mileage goals for each week. Your Sunday runs should gradually be increased to a long run of 18 - 20 miles approximately three weeks before the Marathon. Remember, you are building up a solid base of endurance with long slow running toward a goal of finishing comfortably.

Be watchful for signs of stress, such as tiredness, leg soreness, depression, a tendency toward colds etc. Be willing to back off and take extra rest. Training for a marathon is a stress-adaptation-recovery build up that takes time. The result is very satisfying and personally rewarding.
