# Outrigger Women crown undefeated Season with Liliuokalani win

Outrigger's women's distance crew verified their claim to be the best in the State by winning the prestigious Queen Liliuokalani Canoe Race, held in Kona on Saturday, September 3. The following day, though, was a day of disappointment for the Outrigger men's "A" crew as they dropped a hotly-contested companion race to the inspired and determined Hui Nalu Canoe Club.

Saturday's 11-mile grind from Keahou Bay to the City of Refuge was all Outrigger. Strong and smoothstroking, the six starting paddlers, racing in "Kakina," jumped out to an immediate lead, never to be challenged, even in the early going when the competition was trying fiercely to keep up with OCC's speeding ladies. When Outrigger made its first change some 20 minutes out from the starting line. "Kakina's" separation from the rest of the fleet became even more pronounced. And as the race wore on, OCC's precision and finesse further worked their toll on the opposition.

By the time Outrigger's nine rounded the final jut of land and headed towards the finish line at Honaunau, 28 other canoes were wallowing in our women's wake. Finishing in second place, five minutes behind OCC, was host club Kai Opua, and Kailua's entry captured the show position. For the record, Outrigger's finishing time of 1:36.10 was nearly two minutes slower than the record time they clocked in 1976. But conditions were a bit rougher this year and veteran Kona coast watchers say an adverse current took away any chance of posting a new record.

Coach Tom Conner was effusive in his praise of Outrigger's women. "The strength of this crew," said Conner, "rests with their incredible spirit and their attention to fine details. Their changes in and out of the canoe, for example, are flawless, giving the crew an advantage of two or three boat lengths over the opposition every time we rotate paddlers. They're far from being the largest or, for that matter, the strongest women's crew, either, but each paddler is versatile and adapts quickly to changing conditions during the race. They are one of the best crews I've ever coached."

Paddling on Outrigger's championship crew were Karen Jones, Tracy Phillips, Kisi Haine, Jill Andersen, Anne Nicol, Evie Black, Sharon Bintliff, Connie Maguire, and Michele St. John.


## Senior Men take a hard-fought second in Kona race

Outrigger's senior men, augmented by Colin Perry, Aaron Young, and John Finney, had high hopes of winning the Liliuokalani three years in a row by taking Sunday's 17-mile race from Honaunau to the KailuaKona pier. And indications were, during the first five miles of the race, that the OCC owned exclusive rights to first place. The starting crew paddlers jumped off at a phenomenally fast pace, quickly opening five boatlengths of clear water between "Kakina" and its closest pursuers out of the record field of 39 entries. As the OCC approached Kealakekua Point, only Imua, from Southern California, and Hui Nalu were in a position to challenge for the lead.

At this point, Hui Nalu, working an advantageous inshore course and making the most of a slower, driving stroke, began eating away at Outrigger's lead and, after a short head-to-head duel, moved out to a two boat length advantage. Despite the frequent juggling of crew combinations, steersman Mike Lemes' course adjustments, and a few choice words calculated to work a "head trip" on Hui Nalu's paddlers, OCC steadily lost ground, eventually finishing three minutes astern of Hui Nalu. Hui Nalu's winning time of 2:20.59 was some 13 minutes off the record for the distance, set last year by Outrigger.

In his race postmortem, paddler/coach Tom Conner had a hard time masking his disappointment. He pointed out to his paddlers that last year's Molokai race proved (cont. on page 2, col. 1)


that the Tahitians were vastly superior to most, if not all, Hawaiian crews and for the Outrigger to overcome that advantage, it would have to be winning consistently in local competition, by substantial margins and in fast times. He added that the interruption of Outrigger's winning ways takes on special significance when viewed in this context. With this year's Molokai-to-Oahu canoe race just six weeks away, much remains to be done in order to mount a winning effort.

But Connor's confidence is hardly shattered. "You may be sure that we'll be working doubly hard during our practices," he said. "Our objectives, leading up to our date with the Tahitians on October 16th, are to see that every paddler is at the peak of physical conditioning, to refine our paddling techniques and eliminate all of the small, annoying mistakes we made in the Kona race, and to prepare ourselves mentally for what promises to be the toughest canoe race the Outrigger has ever entered."

The Molokai-to-Oahu scorecard reads: Hawaii/OCC, one win; Tahiti, one victory. Outrigger would dearly love to win the rubber match.

Paddling in "Kakina," OCC's koa entry in the Queen Liliuokalani Race, were: Perry, Young, Einney, Conner, Mark Buck, Marshall Rosa, Brant Ackerman, Mike Lemes, and Tim Guard.

The crew of OCC's glass entry, which finished in 13th place overall, included Hugh Foster, Roger Cundall, Mike Clifford, Jay West, Hugh Murray, Jay Pynchon, Alan Rosehill, Willie Hawthorne, and Jim Peterson.

# Molokai - Oahu Race = promises challenges, and keen competition

On October 16, the canoe racing season will close with the most prestigious race of the year — the Molokai to Oahu Canoe Race. When the first rays of sunlight shine on Hale O Lono harbor, a fleet of forty canoes from all parts of the Pacific will start to race for Magic Island.

Competition will be keener this year than ever before. In addition to the exceptionally strong crews from Tahiti we've seen a marked improvement in our own as well as other Hawaiian crews. Depending on wind and sea conditions the '77 race could be the most exciting ever.

A great deal of controversy surrounds this year's event. Aloha Week Inc. is the race sponsor, and the rules that govern it are written and administered by a special Aloha Week Committee. It was with difficulty that the paddlers convinced the committee to start the race from Hale O Lono instead of Kaunakakai, thereby returning to the original concept of a channel race.

Controversy has raged over hull design. What is a Hawaiian outrigger canoe? Until this year no attempt had been made to draw up any more than a weight specification. Partly because of the stunning performance of the Tahitians in their own hull last year, several individuals and clubs, ourselves included, designed or constructed canoes which, while definitely not Tahitian, were significantly faster than present Hawaiian hulls. Basically these fiber glass boats are prototypes for future koa canoes, as fiber glass is both less expensive and easier to modify than koa. At present there is an active search for a suitable koa log for a new canoe for the Outrigger.

Change is always unsettling to some and the change in hull design is no exception. Our club has always upheld tradition, and at the same time, made major contributions to the improvement of all of our fields of athletic endeavor. The construction of the new canoe, Manu'Ula is no exception. It represents new and better equipment in the best tradition of athletic endeavor. As one of the principal custodians of the finest traditions of canoe racing, it is our duty to pursue every avenue for the fullest development of the sport.

The Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association is reacting to the effort to modify canoe design by drawing specifications which will tend to minimize the changes permitted to the present hull design and preserve the substantial investment which the clubs have made in koa canoes. This is understandable. It was for economic reasons that the Outrigger chose to make its new first hull of glass.

This is a time of transition just as the period after World War II was a time of transition. Then a weight standard was established, and the six-man racing canoe took on its present appearance. These times are difficult, but with a reasoned approach to the problems and a dedicated group of individuals, new ideas are given an opportunity to bloom. We emerge stronger and more able to cope with the problems of the future.

It appears that the Aloha Week Molokai/Oahu Race Committee has decided against permitting advanced canoe designs in this year's race. Even without the new hulls, the event will be a tremendous challenge for the participants. The Outrigger paddlers would appreciate your support, not only for their efforts on the race course on October 16 but also in their constant endeavor to bring new and more challenging dimensions to this sport.



## '77 Roughwater Swim was rough

Eight OCC members joined a field of 321 entrants in the September 5 8th Annual Waikiki Roughwater Swim from Sans Souci Beach to the Hilton Hawaiian Village, 2.375 miles away.

Good swimmers were slightly off their mark. This year's winning time of 51:48, by a Santa Monica, California 17-year-old, was five minutes off his winning time last year. Weaker swimmers found their times much slower than in '76, when there were very good sea conditions.

OCC won at least two trophies. (Final results and official times are not yet available but will be posted on the Bulletin Board.) Eve Anderson (1:34:26) was second in the women 35-44 group and Bonnie Eyre (1:39:49) was second in women 45 -54.

Bonnie was a late starter and fast finisher who began working out only after she saw the swim clinic chart in the women's locker room. She took part in all four of the August Swim Clinics.

The eight OCC contenders were: Ian Emberson, Gerry Senner, Cassie Senner — the only Junior Member — Jake Updegrove, Bonnie Eyre, Bruce Ames, Eve Anderson, and Jon Haig.

Escort canoes provided by the Club, a sponsor of the race, were steered by Kahea Chock and Peter Balding and crewed by Colin Chock, Don Nicol, Pam Larson and Jessie Nicol. Mahalo to the escorts. The women's surfing hui also stationed its members at each marker flag.

## OCC Maui Channel Team Adrift

At 9:45 A.M., September 3, Rick Davis, Captain of the Kanaloa, reported the transmission out 58 minutes after the start of the Maui Channel Swim, with OCC swimmers one hour off Lanai and approximately one-third of the way through the 9-mile race to Lahaina. At that point OCC was in second place, presssing hard for first.

The Captain, Swimming Chairperson and Team Captain Jimmy Dean made the sad decision to withdraw. Fred Heywood, our second swimmer had been in the water for over 30 minutes, so Captain Dean called to a nearby rival escort boat to get Heywood back to the distressed ship at 10:00 A.M. Frantic efforts at repair and equally frantic efforts to continue by sail were of no avail. The wind died and left the Kanaloa becalmed. Occasional bursts of wind carried her a short distance back toward Lahaina until at 2:00 P.M. a rescue vessel, the Hydronaut, came to tow the sunburned and thwarted team and crew into Lahaina Harbor.

OCC team members were Archie Hapai, Fred Heywood, Ian Emberson, Tom Davidson, Roger Cundall and Captain Jimmy Dean. Only Hapai, who led off from Lanai in a close race with the Waikiki Swim Club A Team, and Heywood, who swam his 30 minutes plus, were in the water at the time the Kanaloa broke down.

Four- to five-foot swells made the race rougher than the 1976 record-setting three hours, 17 minutes set by the Waikiki A's, who also won this year in three hours, 33 minutes.

Many OCC members were involved in organizing the swim. James Caldwell was the overall chairman of the entire event, and OCC members Lloyd Campbell and Jack Stanford captained escort boats for two mainland crews.
