## OCC Sponsors AAU National Championships

Outrigger Canoe Club is sponsoring between 70 and 80 of the nation's top volleyball teams here from the mainland and Alaska to compete in the prestigious AAU National Volleyball Championships May 6, 7, and 8. (See detailed schedule of matches, this issue.)

The Club has the honor of bring both sponsor and a top competitor with four teams entered in the championships. The Outrigger "AA" team coached by Dave Shoji is defending champion in the event and seeded number one in the Open Division. The "AA"'s have won the AAU title two years in a row — in '76 at Louisville, Kentucky and in '75 at the Portland, Oregon championships. "AA" player Charlie Jenkins was named Most Valuable Player in the tourney two years in a row, an honor without precedent. In addition to Jenkins, the team is made up of Randy Shaw, Jim Iams, Ilmar Tarikas, Bill Johnson, Cliff Kapololu, Peter Ehrman, and Tom Davidson. Manager of all four OCC teams is Wally Young.

The "AA"'s are fresh from a victory in the Open Division of the Haili Invitational Tournament in Hilo where Charlie Jenkins captured his perennial Most Valuable Player title and teammates Shaw and Iams, in addition to Jenkins, were named to the All-Tournament Team. The "AA"'s have won every major tournament in the Islands this season.

The OCC "AA" Team No. 2 finished fourth in the Haili tourney, competing against close to 60 teams

in the Mens Open Division, and is expected to be a strong contender in the AAU's. Playing on the "AA" team No. 2 are Dave Shoji, Dennis Berg, Buster Chapman, Andy Homan, Doug Bechert, Mike Dorsey, Mike Holmes, and Robin Durand.

Veteran competitors in the AAU Nationals are members of the OCC Masters team—Tom Haine, Bill Baird, Peter Balding, Bob Kashare, Mike McMahon, Colin Chock, Fred Hiapo, Bill Heilbron, and Linzy Holz. Coached is Cris Crabb. The team finished ninth in the open division of the Haili Invitational. The Masters have both the AAU's and the USVBA Nationals. The USVBA's are to be held in Hilo the weekend on May 13 and both the Masters and the "AA"'s will compete.

An up and coming contender in the open Division of the AAU's is the OCC's new junior Olympic squad which placed 10th in the Haili Invitational. Players are: Kilo Baird, Peter Balding, Jr., Kaipo Young, Fred Hiapo, Jr. John Hedlund, Billy Bugbee, Colin Chock, Jr., Alan Lau, and Marc Haine. Coach is Tony Crabb.

AAU matches will be held at McKinley High, Kaimuki High, and Iolani School with finals Sunday,

May 8 starting at 3:00 P.M. in Klum Gym, University of Hawaii. Teams will compete in Mens, Womens, and Masters Divisions.

Special all-tournament tickets (excluding finals) as well as tickets to individual matches will be on sale at the front desk of the Club.

The Hawaii AAU is official host for the invitational tournament and OCC is the sponsor. Club members have been hard at work for the past year under the direction of General Tournament Chairman Ron Sorrell and Executive Director Bob Kashare. John Beaumont is handling equipment and Wally Young, awards. Myra Eilerts put together the official program. Bob Moore heads up the budget and Fred Hiapo is in charge of officials.

Former All-American Ron Sorrell says the OCC can take great pride in its volleyball successes. "Although the Club always places high in the national championships, it is not an easy task because unlike other clubs which can form All-Star teams and draw from the best in the state, the Outrigger Canoe Club is a private club and all its athletes must be full-fledged members in good standing."

## Our Reciprocal Clubs

### La Jolla Beach and Tennis Club

Located in a palm grove 15 miles north of San Diego and 105 miles south of Los Angeles, La Jolla Beach and Tennis Club is both social and recreational, offering elegant dining, pool, beach, ocean, tennis, pitch and putt golf and extensive overnight accommodations.

Perhaps of greatest interest to OCC members would be information about accommodations as few other reciprocal clubs offer them.

There are 72 fully furnished housekeeping units and 16 hotel rooms built next to the Pacific with sandy beach on one side and tropical lagoon on the other.

Housekeeping apartments can accommodate from two to six people and range in size from three bedrooms, living room, kitchen and two baths to single rooms with kitchen and bath. Housekeeping units are normally rented for a month, although also available for half a month and shorter periods. There are 16 hotel rooms with bath only, normally offered on a daily basis.

Rates vary according to length of stay, season and number of persons sharing a unit. Sample rates follow. For a large housekeeping unit which can hold six people, rates for persons staying 13 days or less range from \$67.00 to \$75.00 per day according to season, plus \$5.00 for each person over one. The same unit rented for 14 days or more goes for \$38 to \$75 per day (highest prices in summer) with no extra charge for additional persons.

A one-room, one-bath hotel room costs \$19 to \$21 per day according to season for a daily booking or \$11 to \$21 for stays of 14 days or over.

La Jolla's sports facilities and services include ten championship hard surfaced "Laykold" tennis courts, full-time tennis pro, tennis shop. The Club is home of two National Championship tennis tournaments and the Pacific Coast Men's Doubles Championship. There are: a nine-hole, all-grass pitch and putt course, clay croquet court. Olympic size swimming pool heated in winter, table tennis, volleyball, sauna/massage services, beauty parlor, lockers, beach cabanas.

Three championship golf courses are located within four miles of the Beach Club Apartments and deep sea or surf fishing and horseback riding can be arranged by Beach Club staff.

The club features patio and indoor dining plus two cocktail lounges.

There is no fee for guest cards.

Nearby points of interest include horse racing at Del Mar and Mount Palomar Observatory. La Jolla's average yearly daytime temperature is 70.2 degrees.
