Tahitian Challenge Likely in Molokai-Oahu Race

The final event of the canoe racing season, the October 17 Molokai to Oahu race, promises this year to hold a distinct challenge for the Outrigger, defending champions. The challenge is expected to come from Tahiti, which last year placed crews in 2nd, 4th, and 7th place and this year is believed to be sending eight or nine crews to compete in the inter-island race. In the 1975 race the number one Tahitian crew took an early lead in the 41-mile paddle from Hale O Lono to Waikiki, then after being passed, pushed the winning OCC crew all the way to the finish and a new record of 5 hours, 39 minutes, 7 seconds for that course.

Double Victory for OCC in Liliuokalani Race

On Labor Day weekend, 1976, the Outrigger Canoe Club performed a feat in canoe paddling that was nearly equal to the club's record-breaking performance in last year's Molokai-Oahu Canoe Race.

For the record, there were two races on this weekend: an eleven mile race for women on Saturday and an eighteen mile race for men on Sunday. As in last year's Molokai race, the Outrigger paddlers proved their determination and endurance by coming from behind and passing the early leaders of the race. While it only took the women twenty minutes to run down and pass the competition, the men's crew had a tougher time of it,

Under beautiful channel conditions with glassy seas and little current the Outrigger team almost walked off with first place in the Fifth Annual Maui Channel Swim, Saturday, September 4, an international event this year. The first three finishers all broke the prior channel crossing record of 3 hours and 45 minutes set by a San Francisco team two years ago.

Scoring were: First: Waikiki "A", 3 hours 17 minutes; Second: Outrigger, 3 hours 30 minutes; Third: Waikiki "B", 3 hours 37 minutes; Fourth: Los Angeles "A"; Fifth: Toronto Tridents.

The Outrigger Team was composed of James Dean, Ian Emberson, Dr. Harry Huffaker, Jim Caldwell and two World Class swimmers: Brent Berk (past winner of Waikiki Roughwater Swim and member of U.S. Olympic Team) and Fred Haywood (former NCAA Champion).

The start was something close to pandemonium as the eleven team starters stood in a crouch on the Lanai Island Beach, staring out across the Channel to see the island of Maui some 9 miles away. When the gun went off, the swimmers ran into water at full speed and hurried to swim out to their escort boats all gathered 300 yards off shore. Outrigger went into an immediate commanding lead in the first 30 minutes with Fred Haywood swimming. Brent Berk relieved Fred for 30 minutes and held the lead. Jimmy Dean relieved Brent for his 30 minutes. At that point the team had covered ap-

This year's course is 14 miles longer, with start at Kaunakakai and finish at Magic Island. According to Head Coach Brant Ackerman, "The longer flat water distance from the starting point to Laau Point favors the Tahitian style of paddling, and they could conceivably place very high."

Record holder for this year's 55-mile course is Waikiki Surf Club. This course, the longest ever, was paddled only once before, in 1973. Twelve paddlers will be used and unlimited substitutions allowed. Final selection of the Outrigger crew has not been completed, but it will be made from paddlers who competed in the last two long distance races.

Plans are under way to try to charter a cruise boat or catamaran to take an OCC cheering section over to Molokai to follow the crew during the race. WATCH THE BULLETIN BOARDS FOR MORE INFORMATION.

OCC's Koa Entry Wins Lanikai-to-Waikiki

It is often a difficult transition to make from summer's short-course canoe races to autumn's longdistance Marathons. But the Outrigger senior men, augmented by one paddler each from the freshman and sophomore crews, proved they were ready for the challenge by leading a flotilla of 32 koa and fiberglass canoes to the finish line in the ninth running of the Duke Kahanamoku Lanikai-to-Waikiki distance race on August 22. Outrigger's time of 2 hours and 59 minutes established a new course record and axed 20 minutes from the previous standard for the 26-mile grind.

The OCC men began the race impressively by roaring away from the starting line and establishing a four-boat-length lead by the time the frontrunners reached Lanikai Point. As expected, the always tough Waikiki Surf Club entry clung tenaciously to the Outrigger's stern, and they were closely followed in turn by Kailua and two surprisingly strong dark horse entries—Lahaina and the International Canoe Club (also known as the Perry Boys Smorgy Team).

But by the time the frontrunners reached Makapuu, the fleet was strung out over nearly a mile of ocean, and the final order of finish had become apparent. Surf Club was still the Outrigger's most persistent challenger, but the turn at the point ice-boxed whatever hopes WSC might have had of overtaking the fast-stroking leaders.

By hugging the cliffs at the seemingly foolhardy distance of no more than 10 to 15 yards, the OCC picked up the ocean's equivalent of a jet stream and raced from the point to Allen Davis' beach in less than ten minutes. Following closely behind, Surf Club and Kailua were less inclined to chance the risky inside route. Surf Club particularly paid dearly for its decisions, and by the time the leaders of the pack were safely around Makapuu headed for the finish line, OCC's lead had expanded to an insurmountable 400 vards.

Working with nearly an 800 yard

lead near the finish line, the Outrigger headed in the channel towards the Kaimana Beach confident that their pursuers were safely to the rear. However, they failed to take into account Surf Club's closing rush. By borrowing a page from the Fred Hemming's primer on steering, WSC helmsman Nappy Napoleon guided his canoe safely through the surf and coral heads off Diamond Head and stormed along the beach in pursuit of Outrigger. By the time OCC nosed across the finish line, their once comfortable lead had shrunk to no more than 100 yards.

taking nearly forty-five minutes to claim the lead.

At the start of the women's race the OCC crew drew lane 19, near the extreme outside of the fleet of 22 canoes. At the drop of the flag, Outrigger's smooth-stroking crew of Moira Scully, Maile Morgan, Connie Maguire, Anne Nicol, Kisi Haine and Evie Black maintained a steady pace which kept them within two boat lengths of the leaders who were sprinting at a furious pace to stay ahead of Outrigger. When the first change of paddlers occurred at the two mile point, Outrigger's lightweight speedsters Tracy Phillips, Michele St. John, and Karen Jones leapt into the KAKINA. The rest of the fleet then stared in disbelief as our wahines quickly sprinted out into a lead that would never be challenged. By the time the Outrigger girls crossed the finish line at Honaunau, the rest of the competition could barely be seen in the distance. The time for the event, 1 hour and 34 minutes, establishes a record for this new race course. Second and third place went to the Kailua Canoe

Club of Windward Oahu.

On Sunday the men's race started from Honaunau with a fleet of 33 canoes in attendance. Outrigger drew lane 6 for the koa canoe and lane 33 for the fiberglass entry. After a 45 minute delay which saw the starting line alter its shape many times, the flag finally fell. The fiberglass crew took good advantage of their position on the line and surged quickly ahead. They soon gave way to a more experienced Waikiki Surf crew which jumped to an early 6 boat-length lead. By the time the KAKINA crew got untracked they were faced with a considerable deficit. Not taking too kindly to their position at this point, the senior crew threw more coals on the burner and took off after Waikiki Surf like men possessed.

After considerable grunting and growling, the KAKINA drew even with Waikiki Surf and steersman Mike Lemes calmly barked out two words, "Helter-Skelter!" Seemingly awakened by this post-hypnotic suggestion, the white water quickly started to boil behind the Outrigger paddles. Not wishing to tamper with such mysticism, Waikiki Surf fell quickly behind.

Once the lead was gained, the rest of the race produced nothing dramatic except for the fact that Outrigger's time of 2 hours and seven minutes bettered their own 1975 record by 2 minutes. The fiberglass crew finished in 12th place in what is the largest canoe race to date. The Outrigger was fortunate to have the services of Bill Cook, Bob Fischer, and Club President Roy Kesner. Their assistance did much to lighten the burden on the coaches.

Congratulations to women's crew members Evie Black, Kisi Haine, Karen Jones, Connie Maguire, Maile Morgan, Anne Nicol, Maile Ostrem, Tracy Phillips, Michele St. John, and Moira Scully.

After the event, one of the 16s will become Club property, a giftie from NHCA. In all, 96 skippers will be out there chafing for the honors; 70 are pre-qualified, from positions in other recognized events; an additional 26 will gain entry during the first two days of qualifying races. Club skippers Hal Hutchings, Leith Anderson, Dale Hope, Ted Crane, possibly others will be in the qualifying races (at least). Mike Holmes is set to crew for Wayne Schafer, past Hobie 14 national champ and longtime California friend. Club privileges, by the way, are being extended to all participants either through member friends or by arrangement with the Club management. Members are cautioned, however, standing rates (\$20 per guest card) and rules apply... NHCA also has declared the Club races Sat., Oct. 23, a curtain-raiser for the Worlds with the 16s in that event potential candidates for the Nov. qualifying races, which leads into . . .

He has been editor of *The Outrigger* for five years—a substantial "term of office" for anyone, but particularly remarkable for someone who's been "in retirement" for the better part of two decades

Staffers, contributors and scores of other OCC members associated with the Club's publications over the years take a moment this month to acknowledge and recognize our editor's lively energy, his loyal, devoted (and patient) hand on the helm of *The Outrigger*.

It should be noted here, further, that Harold Yost—or "Yostie," as he is called affectionately by a few—is the author-writer-editor who distilled mountains of research, photographs, personal memorabilia and recollections (his own and other's) to produce the official Club history book, published in 1971.

The fabric of Yost's life and career is woven of copywriting in nearly every form, Hawaii and California, Waikiki and Berkeley, Hawaii's products—spiritual and agricultural—its corporations and the ad agencies representing them. And warm personal and Club associations, the OCC and the old Uluniu, once sandwiched between the old OCC and the Royal.

He came first to the Islands when this century was in its mid-teens and the only Waikiki landmarks were the Moana and OCC. He taught agriculture at Mid Pacific, became involved with Hawaii's produce, here and on the Mainland, at Cal-Pak and Del Monte. He has written reams of copy for the HVB—the Aloha Spirit.

He straddled Honolulu and Berkeley until, in the late 50s, Hawaii became home permanently

This month, Harold Yost joins the ranks of honored Senior OCC members.

Dedication is a constant in the character of our editor

When his recent appointment with the surgeon became a fact to be faced, he scheduled it to accommodate publication deadlines of *The Outrigger*. A minor medical complication interfered, however, and this issue goes to press without his guiding hand. Were that not the case, this article would not get into print. Dozen OCC Swimmers Enter 1976 Roughwater Swim

By far the largest contingent ever of OCC swimmers entered this year's Labor Day Waikiki Roughwater Swim on September 6, 1976.

The day's events began when a group went out in the Boston Whaler with Wayne Faulkner to survey the course. Finding several flags drifting and out of position, Fred Trask, chairman of the Roughwater Swim, and his staff, relocated and retied the flags with Outrigger assistance.

A dozen OCC members met at the OCC flag at the Kaimana Surf starting point. Participants were: Lon Priest, Jake Updegrove, Jon Haig, Aileen Soule, Kim Brooks, Fred Hemmings, Ian Emberson, Bruce Ames, Jim Caldwell, Harry Huffaker, Jim Foytich, and Gerry Senner.

A total of 292 swimmers entered the water at two separate starting times: 12:30 for Masters and 1:00 for age groups and Senior Division. AAU regulations prevented combination of the two classifications in one swim. Best overall time was 46:23, recorded by a Santa Monica, California competitor.

Confusion was rampant at the finish because finish times were handed to bleary-eyed, salt water-logged swimmers and then immediately taken away to be stapled to the identification number each swimmer had worn on his or her suit. The posting of times was slow and in some cases inaccurate so a complete tally of members' times will not be available until the next Outrigger appears.

We do have three trophies for our efforts, however. Harry Huffaker placed 2nd in the men's 35 to 44 age group with an official time of 58:04: 09. Aileen Soule placed second in the women's 55 and over category with an unofficial time of approximately 93 minutes. She also received the trophy for oldest female entry. Aileen was lauded by race officials for her former Olympic participation and fine physical condition. This was her first Roughwater Swim and she would not have entered if it had not been for the 1975 OCC Castle Swim and the 1976 OCC August Swim Clinic and the encouragement of the Swimming Committee.

This swim, which is truly open ocean, is more than two miles and is fraught with changing currents, wind and waves, other people kicking you, drifting flags, and sun glare. It is a real survival challenge. Speed

Log Your Swimming Miles

As a result of the favorable swim clinic response, swim charts are located in both the men's and women's locker rooms. Anyone may sign up to count their quarter miles on a responsible basis. It is not necessary to have been a participant in the August Swim Clinic. Swimmers of any ability may record their mileage by swimming a measured distance at Outrigger or a pool or any other area of their choice.
