## Kailua shades Outrigger by one point (.3 sec.) to win State Championship at Hilo

You can't come much closer than .3 second from winning a state championship, but that was the difference at Hilo as the Kailua Canoe Club won the State Championship, thanks to a great effort by their Senior Men. They beat Waikiki Surf Club by that .3 second to finish second to the record-breaking men of the Outrigger in the 2-mile finale of a great day of racing on Hilo Bay.

The early races found Healani, the defending champion, off to a good start with Kailua and Hui Nalu also pressing for leadership. The first Outrigger point came in the Novice B Women's and the Novice A Women's as each garnered a 4th. The Boys 14 and Girls 15 came through as hoped for with record-shattering 1st places. Novice B Men in a scene straight out of "Jaws" looked great until some unseen demon of the deep suddenly flipped them. The Boys 16 took a 3rd behind Makaha and tough Kawaihae, the Big Island champions. So at the end of ten races we were third with 14 points to Kailua's 21 and Healani's 25.

The skies now cleared, and the strong Outrigger crews came alive. The Girls 17 and Boys 18 captured first place, shattering the existing record, and head coach Mark Buck began to "get that feeling."

The Sophomore Men and Women managed a third despite the classy red and white "bean bag bathing briefs" worn by the men and their "Super-Soph" T-shirts. The Freshman Men disappointed by finishing out of the scoring, but we still had a chance if we could take the final two races.

A brand-new Senior Womens crew took to the water as the coaches pulled their strategic move of the day. Steering was Heidi Hemmings, and the crew consisted of Moira Scully, Anne Nicol, Julie and Maile Morgan, and Gay McGee. All they did was set a new state record, beating the old mark by over a minute and a half — fantastic!

Now with 4000 paddlers and thousands of fans on their feet screaming, Mike Lemes brought the Outrigger Senior Men home first with a flawless record-breaking performance. But, auwe, there was Kailua on the outside lane, edging Surf Club for second place and the overall championship. Healani was third and Hui Nalu fourth in the closest State Championship ever.

Congratulations to coaches Mark Buck, Paul McLaughlin, Brant Ackerman, Milton Beamer, Tom Conner, and Walter Guild on a great job. The spirit and drive is there to go all the way next year.

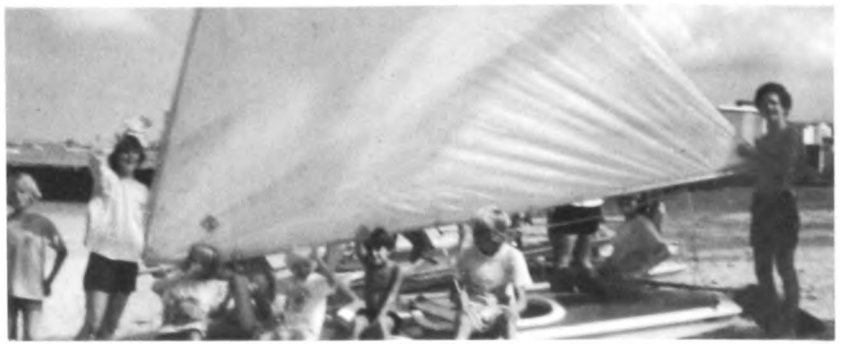

Praise must also go to regulars Roger Cundall, Dave Pierson, and Colin Chock, who were unable to play in the championship game. Levi Stanley, now squashing enemy ball-carriers with the Hawaiians, Mike McCormack, "Mr. Real Estate," and that dashing dentist, Fred Chuckovich, whose line drives found many an outfield cavity (Ow!), Jay "Flying Beaver" Pease and Mike "The Big Fisherman" Buck all were instrumental in retaining the trophy for another year.

## “Winged O” Profiles: George David “Dad” Center

No history of the Outrigger Canoe Club would be complete without inclusion of the name of George David “Dad” Center. He was one of the men who made the Club what it is today. He was a leader and a teacher. But to many of the boys and girls who later matured into Olympic champions, business leaders, and Club stalwarts, he was affectionately “Dad.”

Coach, Club Captain, Director and friend of the youth of our Club, he encouraged physical fitness, team effort, sportsmanship and loyalty in all.

“Dad” Center coached Outrigger swimming teams as early as 1912, when Duke Kahanamoku went to the Olympics to return to Hawaii a world champion. Others like Sam, David, and Sargent Kahanamoku, Gay Harris, and Mariechen Wehselau Jackson, followed in Duke’s footsteps. Although his interest was primarily in swimming, outrigger canoeing was

his personal love, and many a day he spent taking youngsters, tourists and all who could wield a paddle out to the surf in his koa canoe, “Miss Vedol.”

George David Center was born in Kipahulu, Maui in 1886, one of the children of a sugar plantation manager, and grew up on Maui and in Honolulu. Always active in athletics, he participated in all sports, but was most active in swimming, surfing, and canoeing. Dad paddled for the old Myrtle Boat Club in the early days, but joined the Outrigger Canoe Club in 1908, and from then on served the Club unselfishly and without monetary compensation until he died in 1962.

Dad coached and ran on the Outrigger Track Team as early as 1919; organized (with Dr. Paul Withington) and played on our football team; coached the U.S. Olympic Swimming Team in 1920, was coach of the Outrigger Swimming Team and took a team to Japan in the early 1920’s.

As Club Captain for many years, Dad was in complete charge of all athletic activities and was actually the “guiding spirit” that encouraged our young members to participate in the athletic program that has been the purpose of the Club and is perpetuated to this day.

To all of us who had the honor and the pleasure of knowing him, Dad Center is remembered as a shining example of what the Outrigger Canoe Club stands for. A quiet, modest man, “Dad” had the quality of leadership that inspired all of his charges to do their utmost, not only for the Outrigger Canoe Club and themselves, but for “Dad” Center; and for them, the greatest reward for winning was not the medal, the acclaim of the crowd, but a “well done” from the grand “old man” himself.

The Outrigger Canoe Club didn’t “just happen”. Much blood, sweat and tears went into making the Club what it is today, and dedicated men of Dad Center’s ilk have played important roles in the success of our Club.

The Order of the “Winged O” is honored to have George David Center as a member.

## More About Duke

The Editor has been informed by Mrs. Nadine Kahanamoku, Duke’s widow, that the biographical sketch or profile of Duke which appeared in our August issue contained two erroneous statements. It was Duke’s father, not Duke himself, who was named Duke in honor of a visiting English duke, the Duke of Edinburgh. When Duke came along a generation later, he was named after his father. The other error had to do with Duke’s election to the office of Sheriff of Honolulu. Mrs. Kahanamoku says he was first elected to that office in 1935 and was never defeated in an election thereafter.

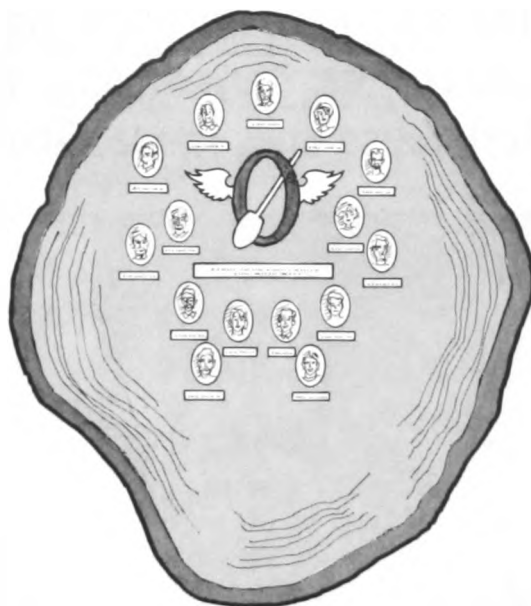
We very much regret that these errors occurred. However, neither one had any bearing on the subject of the sketch, which was Duke’s athletic career, and both might well have been omitted from this necessarily brief profile. The ideas we were trying to convey to readers who were not personally acquainted with Duke during his lifetime were, first, that he was a champion in his chosen sports, one of the true Athletic Greats of his era; and second, that in spite of the public acclaim and adulation he received during the years of his athletic triumphs, he remained a modest, unassuming, friendly Hawaiian gentleman, always courteous and considerate of others. If we succeeded in that effort, perhaps the errors of fact, which in no way detracted from his greatness, can be forgiven.

## New Parking Regulations Announced by Board

Due to the Heavy parking on weekends and holidays at the Club, the Directors have found it necessary to institute rigid new parking regulations.

Effective October 1st, the following parking regulations will be enforced between the hours of 10:00 A.M. and 3:00 P.M. on Saturdays, Sundays, holidays, and at other announced times as required:

1. Cars without decals will not be allowed in the garage.
2. Decals must be permanently fixed to a car's left front and right rear bumpers. They can no longer be carried in a member's wallet or glove compartment and shown to the parking attendant.
3. Guest members and guests of members will no longer be allowed to park during these hours.
4. All overnight parking will cease effective October 1st.

In addition it is hoped, and the Board strongly urges that all Club members and their guests will cooperate by car pooling whenever possible.

almost three minutes behind our gals. . . . Great work!

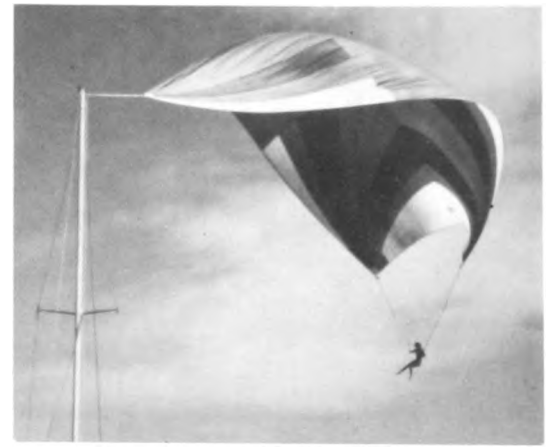

## Menu Prices Up . . . Still "Bargains"

Most private clubs face a difficult problem in running a dining room operation at a profit. The Outrigger Canoe Club is no exception.

We are as subject to the problems of inflation as any other business. Rising prices from our food suppliers, higher salaries (with their accompanying fringe benefits and taxes), increased maintenance costs, and other factors have caused our food operation to lose over \$13,000 during the first six months of this year. Naturally we do not wish to operate

at a deficit. Our goal is to break even.
