Outrigger "AA" Fifth in Nationals; Masters Team Second

The Nationals were held this year in Reno, Nevada, where over 1000 of the nation's best players and 500 fans gathered to play and watch exciting "power" volleyball.

The Chart House Team, which in reality is the U.S "A" team, took top honors. The Outrigger team, coached by Dennis Berg, coming off a sensational AAU 1st place win the previous week, stopped Gene Selznick's Hatch Covers and Malibu Palisades but lost to the National All stars (who finished second) and Chuck's Steak House. Chuck's was led by OCC member Randy Shaw. Competition among the top four or five teams is of such high quality that no one would be surprised if the order of finish were reversed.

The Masters team came out like a ball of fire, rolling through the winners bracket undefeated. They chose to relax on Saturday and wait until a challenger would emerge from the losers bracket. Captain Jacks of Long



Beach, captained by Dick Hammer, who was playing with a broken nose, was ready for the 5:30 P.M. game. Defense was the key as the younger Captain Jacks caught us without the zip of the previous day and "dug" out nearly every hard "spike," winning two straight and then the big one for the championship. This is the fifth straight year that we have finished second in the Masters Division. Coached by Fred Noa, the team of Mike McMahon, Bill Baird, Peter Balding, Colin Chock, Mark Lawson, Tom Haine, Bill Heilbron, and Dave Hendrickson certainly produced in the usual Outrigger championship manner.

Outrigger ties with Lanikai for Fourth at Makaha

One of the most beautiful beaches in all Hawaii is Makaha, and it was here that the second regatta of the canoe racing season was held on June 8th.

The Kailua team, victor of the previous week's races on their home course, made it two straight by amassing 57 points to Healan's 45. Hui Nalu was third with 35, while the OCC and Lanikai tied for fourth with 27 points.

Outrigger, a perennial slow starter, is, nonetheless, showing signs of improvement in just a week's time. The Junior Men jumped from 8th to 3rd place. The Junior Women remained 3rd but nearly overtook favored Healan who snapped Kailua's two-year-old winning streak.

There was only one "huli" of the day, but it occurred when our great Boys 18 crew was well on its way to victory. A small swell caught the "ama", and it was all over.

This regatta, only the second of seven outings, was important in establishing four OCC crews as "powers." First place for the second straight week went to the Boys 14, the Girls 15, the Girls 17 (who blistered the one-half mile course in 4:59.2, a record sure to stand for a long time) and the mighty Senior Men who demoralized their opposition with a solid three lengths victory.

Outrigger Club Impressive in Windward Regatta —Senior Men Victorious

June 1st saw a crowd of nearly 6000 canoe racing fans pack Kailua Beach Park for the initial regatta of the 1975 season. The day started out cloudy and windy with racing conditons not the best, but by noon the skies cleared and the sun broke through for another perfect day in Hawaii nei.

Host Kailua surprised everyone by amassing 70 points to defending champion Healani's 62. The OCC was third with 33 and Lanikai fourth with 27. Kailua's rebuilt canoe, Kalanikila, which has been lengthened from 38½' to 40' by George and Tay Perry, rode high in the water and their crews were in mid-season form.

The Women's "A" Novice with Suzanne Chuckovich, Anne Nicol, Beth Worrall, Pua Smith, Sheryl Haxton, and Leslie Martin took a third to start the OCC scoring. Our rising stars, the Boys 14, with Pua Rochlen steering a crew of Twain Newhart, Winston Gamble, Fred Noa, Jr., Jay Zuckerkorn and Pat Ayau, took home our first of five gold medals. The Girls 15 with Tracy Phillips steering a fine crew of Robyn Rodby, Jodi Langley, Lisa Livingston, Diane Guild, and Kisi Haine, paddled to a convincing victory.

Men's Novice "A" took a fourth before the Girls 17 crew of Jill Andersen, Mary Fox, Alison Martin, Leslie Muirhead, Pii Schneider, and "Muffer" Scully sprinted home to victory in the one-half mile race, despite a slow start and a bad turn.

Adding an additional 7½ pounds of weight to the ama prior to the Boys 16 event and a change in the turning technique seemed to help all the crews except the men's Novice "B", which "hulied", and the slightly rotund Sophomore Men "dream crew", which started out like lightning, but finished like a whale racing across the Sahara.

The Boys 18 crew, which will be tough to beat all season, came home with our fourth gold medal of the day. Kainoa Downing steered a crew of Walter Guild, Mark Rigg, Karl Heyer IV, Rick Lemke, and Robbie Muller. Junior Women surprised by taking

third place against strong competition. Monte Costa steered the crew of Kristy Muller, Nanci Ballentyne, Michele St. John, Stephany Sofos, and Laurie Stratford.

The crowd waited with justified anticipation for the best race of the day, the grueling 2½ mile Senior Men's. It was no disappointment, as the Outrigger's Kakina battled favored Waikiki Surf Club, Healani, and Kailua all the way in a perfectly controlled race. It looks as if our Senior Men are in top condition as Mark Buck, Brant Ackerman, Tom Conner, Mike Lemes, Paul MacLaughlin, and Marshall Rosa came through with a close but beautiful victory.
