Canoeing

As we swing into summer, some regattas are behind us and some of our Club crews are filling up with college members from mainland schools.

The season's most important regatta for our Club is the Annual Walter Macfarlane Day Regatta on July 4th. This event, the most exciting of the entire year, is held in the surfing area fronting the Moana Hotel. All Club members, and especially those who have never seen these unique races through Waikiki's famous surf, should plan to attend, then join in the festivities at the Club later in the day. (Watch the bulletin boards for starting times and other details.) This will be the only regatta held in the surf this year. The John Kaupiko Regatta on July 15th will be held in the Hawaii Kai Lagoon, and the Leeward Regatta on July 22nd will be near Pokai Bay.

(Results of the May 20 Keehi Lagoon Regatta are reported elsewhere in this issue of The Outrigger.)

Volleyball

The 1973 volleyball season is now well under way. As reported in our June issue, the Club's "AA" team jetted to Los Angeles in May to compete in the Southern California Region "B" Championships (incorrectly reported as Region "13," because that was the way the "B" looked in the original script). Southern Cal is full of red hot volleyball teams, and Outrigger played them all, right up to the semi-finals, where our lads first played the Long Beach Ski-Mart team - formerly the Sand and Sea Club - last year's National AAU champions. Outrigger won this match with scores of 11-9, 8-11 and 11-8. In the finals, Outrigger bowed to the Cattleman Club, formerly the Santa Monica team, 1971 title-holders, 9-11 and 6-11. (The name changes for the opponent clubs resulted from sponsorship changes.)

Our coaches are well pleased with the team's second place position in this tournament against truly bigtime competition. Following our team's return from the Southland, the squad was divided into two six-man teams for the Hawaii State Championships where the competition is on the light side. The two OCC teams walked off with the two top spots in this tournament.

Early in June, the Club's volley-ballers again flew to California, this time to compete in the Far Western Championships. Competing teams were the Regional Championship teams from Oregon, Washington, Utah, Northern and Southern California, and Hawaii. Outrigger reached the semi-finals, but there lost to the Balboa Bay Club, last year's National AAU runner-up, by scores of 10-15 and 8-15. Our team finished third in the tournament by beating the Olympic Club of San Francisco 15-11 and 15-9.

(Because the National AAU Championships in St. Paul, Minnesota and the U.S.V.B.A. Nationals are both played late in June, when The Outrigger is either being printed or just off the press, the results will have to be reported later. To hold this issue for those results would delay it for about two weeks—and then some other event would probably be missed!)

As this is being written, the Club's team is in Papeete, Tahiti, making the trip at the personal expense of the players, to compete in the South Pacific Sports Festival scheduled for June 8 through June 19. The team will be put through daily three-hour workouts while in Papeete, Coach Dennis Berg says.

Inside the Winged "O"

In April, 1965, a new and vitally important committee was formed under the title of O.C.C. Athletic Sponsors. Dedicated to the preservation of the OCC image as an institution devoted to the development of youth through healthful athletic activities and the perpetuation of the sports of Old and New Hawaii, the committee functioned with high purpose but not too much activity until early 1967, when Billy Brooks was selected as chairman.

Under Brooks' leadership, a new name and concept was formed. The committee became known as the Winged "O" Committee. On January 15, 1968, the first Winged "O's" were presented to Duke Kahanamoku, Mark Buck, Ron Sorrell, Albert Lemes, Cline Mann, Tom Haine, Tom Arnott and Wally Young.

To attain this coveted award requires outstanding, continuing contribution or achievement in promoting the OCC athletic programs. Over the ensuing years, Fred Hemmings, Jr., Jerry Ober, Dad Center, Johnny Hollinger, Peter Balding, Mike Holmes, Paul MacLaughlin, Karl Heyer and Billy Baird were added to the Winged "O" Committee.

As the committee has gained in size, its influence has become effective in many areas. One of its outstanding accomplishments has been to organize and design an awards system for the O.C.C. Another important area of concern has been to generate ideas and activities that permit the participation of the athletes

in fund raising. The very popular annual Bouillabaisse Party is one of the fund-raising events that has been very successful. And perhaps the biggest job of the year for the Winged "O's" is the annual Athletic Banquet held in August which recognizes literally hundreds of athletes proportionately to their participation. The presentation of the Winged "O" Award itself is also handled by this committee. Each year the research and debate involved in selecting a new Winged "O" is both painstaking and gratifying.

The Keehi Lagoon Water Carnival in Review

The Outrigger Canoe Club entered five crews in the Keehi Lagoon Water Carnival on May 20th, 1973, and finished in second place, total team points, for the three events entered, plus eighteen medals. Here's how our OCC crews fared in the various events:

- Event No. 1 5 miles koa canoes only: Outrigger placed second, close behind Healani; a fine showing in view of Healani's much longer training period. In the Outrigger's Leilani were canoeists Connor, Guard, Wilson, McLaughlin, Buck and Ackerman.
 - Event No. 3 5 miles open: Outrigger entered three canoes in this event, our 16's in the Aukai: Junior-Soph-Frosh in the Leilani, and Frosh Mix in the Ekahi. Our 16's gave the flashy Healani Juniors a fine battle for second place, but finally had to settle for third. The Junior-Soph-Frosh crew placed sixth and the Frosh, after an unfortunate swamping early in the race, came back strong to finish seventh after chasing and catching four other canoes. The Outrigger crews in this event were: Aukai — Mike Lempke; Dale Hope; Rod Muller; Kimo Austin; Marshall Rosa, and Keone Downing. Leilani — Tony Crabb; Henry Ayau; Tuck Siegfried; Alika Burso: Milton Beamer, and Bruce Ames. Ekahi — Robbie Muller; Mark Riggs; Karl Heyer; Walt Guild; Jimmy Bugby, and Fred Hemmings.

Event No. 5 — 3 men, 3 women: The Outrigger crew won this event the way Secretariat won the Belmont — many boatlengths out in front. In our winning crew were: Judy Mounts; Moira Scully; Christy Muller; Tom Connor; Brant Ackerman, with Kainoa Downing steering.
