## Our Club turns 65 this Month!

Another milestone in the history of the Outrigger is passed this month when the Club commemorates its 65th Anniversary. Club committeemen have a spate of special activities planned to mark the occasion.

Alexander Hume Ford and his small band of cronies and water buffs founded OCC in a thatched Waikiki beach hut May 8, 1908. A few (very few) members who remember the occasion are still around.

At its monthly meeting last March 22, the Board passed a resolution officially establishing May 1973 as "65th Anniversary Month." Club wags already are calling it "retirement month" and some say they are planning to "retire" from the day-to-day pressures of business to flake-out on the beach for the month.

Seriously, the entertainment, public relations and historical committee-members are considering a number of rites, rituals and reminiscences to acknowledge the event. Among those more or less firm at press time:

Bob Moore's entertainment committee has declared the annual June luau — now scheduled June 9, 1973

Tommie Thomas is putting together a re-creation of a traditional early-day sporting competition. Members, young and old, will be urged to participate in the event; date to be announced.

Archivist Kehau Stowell and a special exhibits committee are planning to festoon the Club during May with an assortment of memorabilia — old photos, trophies, documents and other items which should be interesting to present-day members.

Chef Teruya is being urged to develop a special Anniversary Salad (or Entree, or whatever) for May menus.

Anzai is being pressured to create "The 65" — a liquid bomb, specially priced and designed to insure that imbibers remember May. Or, perhaps "The SS" (for social security), a creation which guarantees that mid-way through the second drink the celebrant passes into retirement.

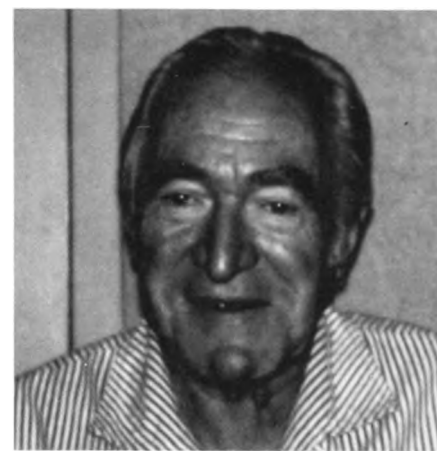

"Improvements to the cocktail lounge are under consideration.

"As the clubhouse continues to age, constant repairs are necessary, such as new drapes in the dining room, new covers for the cushions on the lobby furniture and a continuing program of repainting where necessary."

# Club Captain Holmes takes a critical look at current Club athletics

Having competed in many of the Outrigger sports over the years, I became aware of the fact that none of the committees or their selected coaches really had any concrete objectives to strive for and that due to the committee structure of the Club the objectives changed from year to year. Since there have been no consistent objectives set forth that committees, coaches and athletes can understand, I have attempted to define them in the hope that the performance, attitudes and morale of the Outrigger athletes will improve in the coming year. We have more potential ability than any other club in the Islands, but our performances really haven't come up to our abilities in the various sports.

We have the team sports of canoe racing, volleyball, softball and mountainball. We have individual sports of tennis, golf, sailing and surfing. In each of these sports the Club's objectives are to win the State championship at the local level. If the teams involved or individuals involved are realistically considered competitive in national competition then the attempt is usually made to win the National championship.

These objectives are very general in scope. The more specific objectives of developing winning attitudes rather than the prima-donna syndrome; of teaching a younger athlete how to perform to the best of his ability; of instructing an athlete that hard work toward certain goals can be rewarding, are functions of the various coaches. Unfortunately, in some of our team sports the coaches take their win-loss record as an ego trip and never develop the individuals involved. Some of our coaches cater to the "all stars", who by virtue of their natural ability can make a starting position on a team or crew with a 50% training effort. The net result in the long run is lack of teamwork and morale. Even worse is the fact that a younger athlete interested in the sport will recognize that any hard work that he puts in will not necessarily be rewarded by participation. Luckily, many of them are intelligent enough

not to waste their time in that particular sport.

Our sports should be much more youth-oriented. There are no limits to what our younger athletes can learn or achieve if parents and coaches are willing to put in well-spent time with them. An example: in the last Waikiki Rough Water Swim, 14 year old Kainoa Downing finished ahead of all other OCC swimmers (some who like to swim from island to island) yet Kainoa finished behind two 12 year old boys and an 11 year old girl.

In sailing, Jay Anderson (15 year old) in a recent Hobie Cat race finished well ahead of Ted Crane and myself. With another year of sailing he may be able to do it consistently, although I hope not.

It's about time that many of our older athletes got out of the game and into developing the youth of our Club. When that happens, we can all observe with pride as the records start to fall.

If each committee, each coach and teach participant can 1) keep learning and experimenting; 2) perform to the best of their ability, then the fun will follow at the player level and we'll see an outstanding year in Club sports.

## '73 Peruvian Surfing Contest

Yearly our Club sends a representative to the Peruvian International Surfing Contest. The individual is chosen partly on his surfing ability and partly as a personal envoy for Outrigger goodwill and sportmanship.

This year we were well represented on both accounts by Donnie Mailer, who added the bonus of bringing home a well deserved and hard fought 3rd place finish.

Donnie left early in March and spent a month in the gracious hospitality of Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Gonzales and their two sons, Dennis, Jr. and Fernando, who naturally are avid surfers.

The first week was spent sampling the night life and surfing some of the local spots: Punta Rocas, La Islaya and Pico Alto, with waves ranging from 4 to 15 feet, all surf within Donnie's range. Later, after the contest, the three boys took a side trip north to the famous Chicama Point. There they surfed five-foot waves along the 1-kilometer point with a single ride lasting over two minutes.

Donnie expressed great admiration for the Gonzales family who took him into their home and gave him an opportunity to really live the "Peruvian life." Donnie also greatly enjoyed the chance to visit the Inca ruins in Cusco and Manchupichu.

The contest itself was held at Punta Rocas in six-foot surf lasting right up to dark. The Punta breaks well from four to twelve feet, both rights and lefts, in cool 65 degrees water. First place was taken by Peruvian Gordo Barrada; second by Pancho Awarparri, and third by Donnie Mailer. Dennis and Fernando Gonzales also surfed well.

## New Membership Cards well received

The new permanent plastic Club Membership cards which were mailed to all members in March have brought forth few questions or comments from our membership and the new system of processing chits will probably be in operation when you read this. We re-run the following announcement from an earlier issue of The Outrigger for the benefit of any members who may have missed the earlier announcement about the new cards.

Your NEW Club membership card which was mailed with your February statement is different from any Club membership card you have ever had.

For one thing, it is a **permanent** card—not for just one year. Also, it is made of durable plastic and designed especially to work into the Club's electrical data processing system, handled by NCR.

From now on, every chit you sign at the Club will be processed thru a register which will code your account and record the department purchase. To that extent your card will serve as your Club credit card.

There is an important difference between your new membership card and most mercantile credit cards: **You do not have to have your card with you when you sign a chit!** Instead, the Club will have a duplicate of your card permanently on file. The duplicate card will be used to activate the the register when a dining room, bar or other Club chit signed by you is turned in.

Thus you will continue to sign chits for Club purchases as you do now, but with this difference: your chits must be signed to correspond with an identifying signature which will be filed with the duplicate card.

### CASTLE SWIM TO START AT 9 A. M. FROM ELKS' CLUB

#### Five Other Races Listed On Program Sponsored By the Outrigger Club

The annual Thanksgiving Day Castle swim, sponsored by the Outrigger Canoe club, is the big sports attraction on the program for tomorrow morning and is attracting an unusual amount of interest.

When the first race starts at 9 a. m. there will be a record number of swimmers entered. The first event is the Castle swim, from the Elks' club to the Outrigger Canoe club. The trophy offered for the winner of this event is donated by Harold Castle. Last year the race was won by Gay Harris in 28 minutes, 31 2-5 seconds. A. E. Minvielle, Jr., was second and H. Wood third.

The next race is the woman's public baths' swim, won last year by Mariechen Wehselau. This race is from the Public Baths to the Outrigger club, the winner to receive The Star-Bulletin trophy, offered for annual competition. Miss Wehselau's time last year was 22 minutes 42 2-5 seconds. Janice Lovett was second and Leilehua Judd third.

The race for boys under 18 years of age, also from the Public Baths to the Outrigger club, was won last year by Hans Bahr in 22 minutes 54 seconds. The Dawkins-Benny cup goes to the winner of this event.

The other race from the Public Baths to the Outrigger club is for men over 30 years of age. This was won last year by Robert Askew, in 29 minutes 1 1-5 seconds. A. S. Bauman was second.
