Charter Member Christian Foster Jenkins honored by the Club

Regatta Season off to good start

The summer regatta season is off to a fine and enthusiastic start. The turnout for the preliminary meetings was large and brought many familiar faces as well as a number of new people. We count on those who have paddled over the years, but it is most gratifying to have new people turn out and this year promises to introduce many new members to the sport.

Training schedules have been posted on the Club bulletin boards and the various crews are settling into the routine of paddling and running. Head coach Fred Hemmings, Jr. is being assisted by the very capable Bill Burso, who has paddled for the past several seasons and has many miles of open ocean racing to his credit. Bill Cook is assisting with steering, both at the Ala Wai Canal training site and at special clinics being held for potential racing steersmen and women on Saturday mornings at the Club.

As this story goes to press (late in May), a special pre-season paddlers' get-together and shishke-bab fry is planned for Thursday evening, June 8th. Consulting chefs are George Downing and Henry Ayau. Most of the college age paddlers are expected home by then and the plan is for a great rally of paddlers to start the season off right.

One returning paddler, John Crocker, of last year's 18 boat, will return in superb shape for the season. John has been rowing in the University of Santa Clara freshman four boat and he and his crew have set a very impressive season total of wins. John and his crew have been invited to participate in the National Intercollegiate Championships in Syracuse, New York, on June 1 and 3.

Tennis Committee announces resumption of "ladder" tournaments

Chairman Jon P. Haig of the Tennis Committee reports as follows:

"We are reviving the ladder and have set up new placements or standings. (See) list next to Beach Shop on basement level. Positioning was taken from last official OCC doubles tournament. Copy of rules follows . . . Also doubles ladder to be initiated when enough sign-ups are received.

"We would like to get as many tennis players' and prospects' names, addresses and phone numbers (as pos-

sible). We are going to publish a Tennis Directory. Purpose: to serve as a tool for the tennis ladder and to get members acquainted through tennis.

"The next OCC tennis tournament, again mixed doubles, will be held the weekend of June 17/18. Sign-ups are now being accepted. Tennis Committee to pair entrants. Cost will be \$1 a player. Only (Club) members will be eligible. Merchandise prizes will be awarded. Deadline for entries will be one week before play.

"Long range planning is to get more tennis equipment into the Beach Shop, (such as) OCC monogrammed tennis shirts, shorts and jackets. Also (to develop) Club participation with other tennis clubs and organizations.

"Members of the Tennis Committee are: Jon Haig, chairman; Marjorie Phillips, Tom Lewis, Joy Crandelmire and Paul Whitney. Suggestions from other OCC members are invited."

Following are the rules established for ladder play:

RULES FOR LADDER TENNIS PLAY

1. Matches in singles and doubles ladder play are limited to the best two out of three sets.
2. In singles a challenger may challenge up to 3 positions above. In doubles the team directly above may be challenged. The winning challenger takes the position directly above the loser. Balls are provided by the challenger and retained by him. Thirty minutes constitutes a default.

3. To enter the ladder for the first time, club members can only challenge the bottom 5 ladder players. After the initial challenge they can only challenge 3 up.
4. A challenge match should be played within one week unless postponed due to rainy weather or illness. In the event of a postponement, it may extend for an additional week. Cases involving controversy should be referred in writing to the Tennis Committee for final decision.
5. In singles, players involved in a challenge match may not rechallenge until another match has been played by either player.
6. Club members should follow all tennis rules in regular play in order that they will be able to observe them in tournament play.
7. If challenged person does not have a telephone number listed or is unavailable when called, challengers may leave messages at OCC front desk.

1. The original singles ladder listing was taken from the last OCC Doubles Tournament competition.
2. In establishing a doubles ladder, members are requested to select their own partners. Enter teams with tennis committee at OCC front desk.

Outrigger at the Volleyball Nationals

The beginnings of the trip to the mainland actually got under way on April 17th with the highly successful Bouillabaisse party, at which 182 bottles of champagne contributed by Western Airlines, the "Champagne" Airline, were consumed by happy Outrigger members. The party was most successful as it provided needed funds for the trip.

All the logistics for the trip were arranged by team manager Wally Young who has years of experience in getting Outrigger teams to the mainland and back. The coaching was handled by Dennis Berg who in the course of the current season got more members interested in volleyball than anyone ever has before.

There were two teams sent to the Nationals, the AA and the Masters. In National tournament play, the Masters are referred to as the Seniors. The first group of players left Honolulu on Thursday, April 27th, arriving in Los Angeles on the 28th.

There were actually two sets of National Championships played on this trip. The first was the AAU Nationals, held at Costa Mesa College in Southern California, followed by the U.S.V.B.A. National Championships at the University of Utah in Salt Lake City.

The A.A.U. Nationals were a combination of "pool" play; two pools, 6 teams per pool, and a single elimination on the final day of the tournament. Our Senior (Master) division team commenced play at 4:00 p.m. the day of their arrival. Even with the long hours and time change, the Seniors did very well in their play. Their record for the games played was: (1) San Diego, OCC won two games straight; (2) Marines, OCC won two straight; (3) Balboa Bay Club, OCC lost two straight; (4) Los Angeles Sokol, OCC won two straight; (5) Long Beach, OCC lost two games straight. Outrigger won 6 and lost 4 in this pool and were the winners.

In the last day of play of the tournament playoffs, we won one and lost two to San Francisco Olympic Club,

which played the Balboa Bay Club in the finals. Outrigger took 3d and Balboa Bay Club was A.A.U. Champion.

The Seniors won a handsome bronze trophy, which is on display in the lobby trophy case.

In the AA play for the A.A.U. National Championship, the AA teams were comprised of 4 pools of five teams each. Outrigger's team started Friday morning, the 28th of April. The AA record for the games played was: (1) Long Beach, OCC won two games straight; (2) Balboa Bay Club, OCC lost two games straight; (3) New York West Side, OCC won two games straight; (4) Los Angeles Stars, OCC lost two games straight. Outrigger was eliminated from the finals and tied for 9th place overall in the tournament.

The games were played to sellout crowds at the excellent facilities of Costa Mesa College. While in the Los Angeles area, the family of player Tom Madison generously hosted the Outrigger AA team in their home on Balboa Island near Costa Mesa. The Masters were the guests for two nights of Gay Magee at her home in Long Beach. Gay is May Balding's sister. Gay and May also provided the cheering section for Outrigger, and were joined in Salt Lake City by Carol Sorrell, Ernie and Kaipo Young and Sharon and Tom Reiner.

Both teams once again boarded Western Airlines for their flight to Salt Lake City on Tuesday morning May 2nd for the U.S.V.B.A. Nationals. Both teams had carefully packed plenty of winter gear, the temperature prior to their arrival had been cold with 6" of snow only five days before. Upon their arrival it was 80 degrees plus, and beautiful spring weather was on hand even at the 4000' plus altitude.

The Tournament was held at the University of Utah's new athletic center, which is one of the most outstanding athletic facilities the writer has ever seen. It is a complex perhaps twice the size of the H.I.C. and probably holds in excess of 22,000 people.

There were five courts available for play and all were connected by an underground tunnel to the main amphitheater where the playoff matches were held.

The format for the U.S.V.B.A. Nationals was a regular double elimination play, rather than the pool system used at the A.A.U. The Outrigger Seniors began play on May 2nd and their record for the games played was: (1) Summit Y, OCC won two games straight; (2) Hobie Bakers, OCC won two games straight; (3) Balboa Bay Club, OCC won one and lost two.

The Seniors commenced play on Saturday May 6th in the losers bracket. They played four matches and their record for the series was: (1) Central Y of Honolulu, OCC won two games straight; (2) Hobie Bakers, OCC lost one, won two; (3) San Diego, OCC won two games straight.

Outrigger Seniors then appeared in the finals in the main amphitheater, to face Balboa Bay Club who had not played before that day. Outrigger lost two games before a crowd of perhaps 5000 people assembled for the playoffs. The Seniors took 2nd place and were presented beautiful individual medals.

The Outrigger AA team started play and their record for the series was: (1) Kenneth Allen of Chicago, OCC won two and lost one; (2) N.C.A.A. All Stars (the team that eliminated OCC in last year's Nationals), OCC won one and lost two.

In the losers bracket, the AA team scored the following: (1) Rubin's five, OCC won two games straight; (2) Dallas Y, OCC won two games straight; (3) Armed Forces All Stars, OCC won one, lost two.

In all, there was a total of 97 competing teams at Salt Lake City. The quality of play by all contestants was outstanding, this was especially noted by the United States Olympic Committee officials who were at the meets to make selections for the United States team to go to Munich, and the United States All Star team.

In the Senior's division, Tom Haine was selected first string All American. There could be no question in the mind of anyone who watched the tournament about the outstanding quality of Tom's play.
