President's Memo

Now that we are in the midst of the summer rush, the question of general Club security automatically comes into focus.

The theme of openness is carried throughout the physical design of our Club—sweeping vistas from every angle, the sensation of having the outside inside, and a general feeling of being unhindered is consonant with the life-style of beach-loving people. Our Club is beautiful and I wouldn't want it any other way. But with premises such as ours, good security is difficult to maintain and very, very expensive. With the Club open seven days a week from 8 a.m. to 12 midnight, to properly man any single checkpoint would require a day shift, a night shift, and a relief shift. The expense of hiring special security personnel for this purpose would be prohibitive.

We are, of course, not "throwing in the towel" at this prospect. Various security measures are being considered. The Building and Grounds and House Committees are studying the feasibility of fencing along the Elks Club side and the Colony Surf side, with perhaps an automatic barricade at the entrance to the parking area which could be activated only with a coded plastic membership card. Along with the fencing on the Colony Surf side, the surfboard lockers would be modified to make them more nearly theft-proof.

Electronic equipment is also being investigated.

In order to have good and realistic security, any of these corrective measures must be implemented by the unequivocal support of the membership at large—a team effort. Self policing by the general membership would go a long way in solving this problem which concerns us all. Anytime a member sees someone he or she feels has no business on the premises, he should personally enquire as to the status of the stranger and report any intruders to administrative personnel.

MANAGER'S COLUMN

Although this notice was sent out with your latest statement, I feel that it is of enough importance to warrant repeating here.

"Dear Member:

According to the New Tax Reform Act, commencing July 1, 1971, a Federal income tax-exempt Club such as the Outrigger Canoe Club must keep the necessary records to show what portion of our income is from 'related business,' and which part is from 'unrelated business.'

The Club will have to pay income tax on the net profit derived from the 'unrelated business income.'

In order for us to keep the required records, it will be necessary for Management to obtain certain information from the member-host or member-sponsor of any group function consisting of more than eight persons. *This is a matter of protecting the Club's tax-exempt status and will in no way affect the members' normal use of the Club's facilities.*

When you are hosting such a function, please assist your Club Management in obtaining the required information. It's in your own and the Club's best interests.

They were steered by Fred Hemmings Jr. Right behind them, with Freddy steering once again, came the 12 B's with another win. Freddy once again climbed into the steersman's seat and took the Wahines Novice B to a victory, three straight. Again, Freddy took the Boys 13 out for their event and brought them back in 2nd place.

All races for the younger crews are usually set for a one quarter mile straight away. In this race, almost all of the events were lengthened, the quarter miles becoming halves for the younger crews. Our young crews certainly showed that they were more than up to that extra quarter mile. The Wahines Novice A went out, and for a half mile came home winners. The Boy's 14 and under, with Mike Lemes steering, brought home another win for the Outrigger. They too went a half mile. The Men Novice did not fare quite so well at the hands of the surf and took fourth place. The Boys 18 once again showed their power in a race that was almost a repeat of the previous week. Again they came in 2nd behind Healani, but ahead of Hui Nalu and Waikiki Surf. The Freshmen Wahines came in for a fine 3rd place. The Junior Men held on to their 3rd place showing, a vast improvement over the start of the season. The Senior Men had to go three and a half miles in this race against the regular two and a half. Our Seniors were more than a match for the distance and had a lead into the final quarter mile, only to have Waikiki Surf Club and Hui Nalu catch a small wave and finish one and two ahead of them in a true photo finish. In the course of the race, the Outrigger Senior crew demonstrated some of the finest canoe turning ever seen at Waikiki. The crew would enter the turn a length or two behind and come out a length or two ahead. It was a beautiful display of the art of canoe racing.

Several events in this regatta were just designed for fun, one of them a relay. This was Outrigger's meat. Good crews and good old ingenuity combined to give us a big win in this three leg event. Each leg was a half mile. Our lead canoe was paddled by Doug Straehley, Bill Burso, Nina Rodrigues, Steph. Sofos and Monte Costa, steered by Keone Downing. The second round was handled by Niki Foytich, Dave Rochlen, Cindy Mahoney, Stretz Henrickson and Yama Chillingworth, and

steered by Cecily Quinn. The third and last lap was done by Bob Moore, Christy Wilson, Judy Mounts, Hugh Foster, Wendy Wilsey and steered by Brant Ackerman.

The Regatta was won by Outrigger. It was close and was not decided until the last race, but more than that the Club really got together. There was a spirit that caught on and united the club as a single unit with a single purpose: to win.

BILL ERWIN

Long-time Outrigger Club member Bill Erwin died in Honolulu on June 29, 1971.

A memorial service over the ashes was held on July 7 at the Outrigger Canoe Club. The Reverend Abraham Akaka conducted the service and consecrated the ashes to the sea. His friends and baseball teammates Colin Chock and Henry Ayau made the arrangements for the service.

Mr. Erwin was born Fay Dalbert William Erwin in California in 1908. He

began painting on black velvet in 1952, employing techniques developed by the late Edward Leeteg of Tahiti. His paintings are treasured in galleries and homes all over the world.

The portrait of Duke Kahanamoku which hangs in the lobby is one of his earlier efforts. In Honolulu, his work hangs in the Davis Gallery and in Don the Beachcomber's.

He is survived by his wife, Lucille, and his daughter, Mrs. Fay Field.
