Many more good ones coming up!

The Long Range Planning Committee is continuously watching time trends, in order to chart a proper course for the Club in the future.

The Public Relations Committee, of which the Historical Committee is a part, has just completed putting together a marvelous book, "The Outrigger Canoe club of Honolulu," which we will publish and sell (special price to members). It is a history of the Outrigger from its inception in 1908, replete with pictures, and is actually a part of the history of Hawaii. There will be more information on this as the publishing progresses.

The Buildings and Grounds, and House Committees are working to improve our facilities in appearance and comfort. You may have noticed how much more beautiful the shrubbery and landscaping is. Storm drains were recently installed near the snack bar to prevent soiled water in that area from seeping onto the beach. Many more plans are in the hopper.

The Athletic Committee has a full schedule as the summer approaches: the Junior Athletic Summer Program, canoe races, volleyball tournaments, surfing, et al. I'm really very pleased with the way the committees are working, and the very apparent esprit de corps thruout.

It all adds up to the fact that the Outrigger Canoe Club is one of the busiest places in town.

### OUTRIGGER'S SUMMER ATHLETIC SEASON

The summer canoe racing season is upon us once again. This sport, which involves the participation of nearly 150 of our active members both young and old, is off to an excellent start. Outrigger's effort is being guided this year by **Mike Holmes** as head coach who has taken over the responsibilities from **Mark Buck**. Mark is devoting all of his efforts toward the success of our Senior Six this year. Mike is to be assisted by **Hal Burchard** and **Mike Lemes** with the coaching activities.

The turnout this year has been outstanding. In a year following complete victory, as we accomplished last season by winning all 5 regattas, complacency sometimes is the result. Not this year, we find many of our old regulars out and a lot of new blood. This really could be an outstanding year for the Outrigger. New training devices have been devised that are proving both an inspiration to the paddlers and coaches as well. The Ala Wai, in spite of itself, stinking mess that it is, glistens to our

fine red and white canoes each afternoon.

The season starts with the Kamehameha Day Regatta at Kailua Beach Park on Sunday, June 13th. The following race is the Pokai Bay Regatta at Pokai Beach Park on Sunday, June 20th. Our own club annual, the most fun regatta of the season, is the Macfarlane Day Regatta July 4th at Waikiki in front of the Moana hotel. All race times are 10:00 a.m.

### SURFING

Along with canoeing, surfing holds the attention of many of our members and most particularly the young set. The always hoped for summer south swell provides a summer of good surfing right in our own front yard. For this reason, the Surfing Committee centers their schedule of activities in the middle of the summer. This year, the Annual Club Surfing Championships are scheduled for July 23d, 24th, and 25th at Old Man's. Details regarding entry requirements, time, etc. will be posted in the lobby and be carried in subsequent editions of the "Outrigger."

In addition to the Club Meet, the Surfing Committee has selected two nights this summer to have a Beef Stew and Rice feed and the showing of specially selected surfing movies to the club's surfers. The scheduled nights for these always popular events are: Thursday, June 17th at sunset and Tuesday, July 13th again at sunset. The activity is set for the snack bar area. These programs are designed for those primarily interested in surfing, in general, the younger set.

The Surfing Committee also plans to select club surfers to represent the Outrigger Canoe Club in various surfing meets around the island. The message here is get into it, compete and have a lot of fun both for yourself and for the Outrigger Canoe Club.

### OCC HISTORY TO BE PUBLISHED

An official history of the Outrigger Canoe Club is scheduled for publication this September.

Publication of the hard-cover book, which tells the story of the Club from its inception in 1908 to the present in pictures and text, was approved by the Board of Directors at its monthly meeting, May 20.

The book represents nearly 5 years of research by various club members; for 2 years it has been the major project of the historical committee, chaired by Frank Sommerfeld.

Editorial supervision, photo selection and preparation of the manuscript has been the work of Harold Yost, longtime member and retired public relations director for Del Monte Corporation.

About 50 historic photographs depicting the atmosphere and documenting the growth of the Club during the early part of the century illustrate the narrative. In addition to those from the personal collections of members, many photos were selected from the Archives of Hawaii and the Bishop Museum. Many are the work of the respected Ray Jerome Baker.

The book will contain a special section in color to illustrate the Club as it is today with photographs by member Werner Stoy.

The narrative begins with the founding of the club by Alexander Hume Ford and a small group of water sports enthusiasts at the old Club site near the present Royal Hawaiian Hotel. The story of the Club's growth is interwoven with the growth of the community.

The book is expected to carry a retail price of about \$18. A special single-copy price for voting members will be offered on an assessment basis. Volume purchase discounts as well as cash and deferred payment pricing will be established also.

The handsomely designed volume will be available this fall in time for Christmas gift purchases by members.

### T. CLIFFORD MELIM

Club member 54 years  
 Deceased May 21, 1971

Hawaii's track record of 5.02 secs,  
 50-yard dash, 6.04, 60-yard dash with-  
 stood challenge for fifty years and  
 was never broken.
