## Surfing

### FRED HEMMINGS WINS WORLD SURFING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Fred Hemmings is the new winner of the World Surfing Championships which were held in Puerto Rico in early November. Fred was representing the Outrigger as a member of the Hawaiian team which included OCC veteran and current Makaha champion, Joey Cabell, and four other top local surfers. Both Fred's and Joey's trips were sponsored by the club . . . a worthy investment and an excellent return.

The World Contest was staged between November 4 and 8 at Dome Beach and Rincon Beach just forty minutes from San Juan. Fred reports that the conditions were very similar to Oahu's North shore. Although the surf was small during the preliminaries, the final day saw the waves breaking in long eight to twelve footwalls which were ideally suited for the Hawaiian contingent. While there were teams from twelve countries, the meet was mainly a match between the Australians with their rapidmoving, hot-dog style and the Hawaiians who maneuvered up and down the face of the waves. Big wave specialist George Downing was eliminated in the two to three foot surf in the preliminaries. Ben Aipa and Joey Cabell made it into the semifinals. Joey was performing beautifully until he broke his skeg outside on a big wave. Fred and young Reno Abilerra survived the rugged competition which began with a field of seventy-two and entered the finals along with four others . . . three Australians including the defending titlist Nat Young and former winner Midget Farley and one Californian, Mike Doyle. The finalists were scored on their best seven rides in the one hour event. When the gun sounded ending the competition, Fred was crowned the new World Champion.

Fred has been surfing for the Outrigger ever since 1959 when at the age of twelve, he placed third in the Makaha Junior (under 18) contest. Since then he has been victorious twice in the Makaha Junior contest, twice in the Makaha Senior Men's meet, once in the Peruvian Championship (where he has competed on four occasions), twice in the two years the OCC contest has been held, besides having placed well among the best in numerous other major meets in the surfing world.

The World Championship is the most important contest in surfing. Fred's victory, which he will have to defend in South Africa in 1970, is indeed an honor for the Outrigger Canoe Club and Hawaii, the home of surfing.

December . . . the big month in surfing . . . has arrived and the two major meets on the Hawaiian Surfing calendar are under way.

The Duke Kahanamoku Surfing Classic is staged between December 16 and 18 on the North Shore at whichever break happens to be the biggest and the best. Hopefully, this will be the year for Waimea Bay where the waves can reach twenty-five feet and the wipeouts are something never-to-be forgotten. Twenty-four of the world's best surfers, many veterans of November's World Championship meet in Puerto Rico, will be vieing for the coveted Duke Award. Previous winners are Jeff Hackman of Hawaii, Ricky Grigg of California, and Jock Sutherland of Hawaii. The Outrigger Canoe Club has taken an active role in the staging of the Duke contest by serving as host for the meet for the second straight year. Highlight of this year's event is Duke Kahanamoku Day on December 18 at the club which includes films of the 1967 Duke meet, a Sand Blast party, and presentation of the twentyfour contestants. The club is privileged to have four of its top surfers competing this year. They are Paul Strauch, Butch Van Artsdalen, Fred Hemmings, and Joey Cabell. Knowing that any one of the four could win, we wish them all the best of luck and are backing them one hundred percent.

The Makaha International Surfing Championships are being held during Christmas vacation. For the first time, an official OCC surfing team will be competing together at Makaha. The team includes ten junior and ten senior surfers all of whom are veterans of previous Makaha contests and any one of whom could be a finalist. 1967 Makaha champion, Joey Cabell will be the inspiration for the team with Fred Hemmings, Jr. serving as coach and John McMahon as team manager. Arrangements are being made for a special place for the OCC team to be able to gather and store their boards and gear at Makaha. OCC surfers always do well in the Makaha meet and we encourage the entire membership to go on out to Makaha to support your team and to enjoy the exciting competition. We'll see you there.

The annual Diamond Head Surfboard Paddling Races will be held at 10:00 a.m. on Christmas Day in front of the Moana Hotel. Defending champion, OCC's Mike Holmes, will be leading a group of OCC paddlers including Rick Steere, Aka Hemmings, and Tom Bean. The six mile race from the Moana Hotel, out around Diamond Head buoy, and back takes about one hour to complete. This race will add the finishing touch to a year which has seen OCC surfers once again dominate competition in the world of surfing.

Monday night, February 3rd, will be the 2nd Annual Outrigger Canoe Club Awards Banquet. You will remember the outstanding success of the Banquet last year, this year will be bigger and better. This year's selected few will receive their Winged O award for athletic excellence. ### BUFFANBLU SPIKERS CAPTURE ILH TITLE. **POST-SEASON TOURNEY**

The Punahou Volleyball team, displaying extraordinary polish and teamwork, rolled to three easy round-robin

victories to capture the ILH title.

Led by the setting of Jimmy Pietsch and deceptive spiking of Gar Clarke, Creighton Low, and Bob Schneider, the Buffanblu rolled over Farrington (15-7, 15-9) and Kamehameha (15-0, 15-9), to set up the championship match with Kaimuki on Wednesday, November 6.

Itching to taste that championship cake prepared by the Pep Club, the Puns really poured it on in the Bulldog match. As Jim lams and Mike Wilson provided the power of attacks and blocking, the other four excelled in court play and hustle. In fact, hardly a ball touched the floor on Punahou's side, as all six players scrambled and dived to an impressive 15-7, 15-9 victory. An equally impressive celebration followed at the Punahou pool. Wearing uniforms, cake, and ear-to-ear smiles, the team thoroughly enjoyed the Victory Dip.

The second team was equally deserving in plaudits, as they constantly fought the first team to long battles in scrimmages. This scrappy group included Doug Straehely, Buster Chapman, George McPheeters, Cully Chun, John Pingree, John King and John Mounts. And hats off, too, must go to the psychedelic team manager, Chuckie

Haneberg.

To prove their worth, this second team entered the Holy Nativity B Tournament on November 15-16 and

Key digs by Low, Clarke, and Schneider sparked another two-set victory for the Puns. This gave each team one loss, forcing the tournament into a one-game final.

With Captain Jimmy Pietsch setting and blocking superbly, the Puns flashed their polished championship form, rolling to a quick 13-4 lead. The last two points were hard to get, but when the "goin' got tough," the tough ILH champs got goin' and won going away, 15-8. Needless to say, the tournament rookies came away with more than just valuable experience. They came away as winners once again.
