

### AAU AND THE NATIONALS

The Outrigger Canoe Club's Volleyball Team made an excellent showing on their recent trip to the mainland to defend their National AAU Championship and play in the United States Volleyball Championships. Our trip started in Seattle, Washington where the AAU Championships were held at the University of Washington. This is a two-day tournament and its entries included the sixteen top teams in the U.S.A. The Outrigger went through the first day undefeated and then Sunday lost only one game on its way to the Championship, defeating Westside Community Center of Los Angeles in the final match. We not only defended our title, we won another National Championship. Members of the winning team were: Tom Haine, Paul MacLaughlin, George Sarantos, Dodge Parker, Pete Velasco, Colin Chock, John Stanley, John Alstrom, and Carl McGowan. Selected to the tourney's All-Star Team were: Tom Haine, Pete Velasco and John Stanley.

We next moved to Portland, Oregon and Portland State College for the U.S.V.B.A. Championship. We entered three teams in the two divisions and came home with second place in the Open Division and second place in the Senior Division (men 35 years and older). This was truly the finest Nationals of them all, with every team and team member doing his best to win a spot for the tryouts to pick

our Olympic Team.

In the Open Division the Outrigger Whites (same team that won the AAU) won all their matches quite easily and moved into the finals of the Winners' Bracket to meet again Westside Community Center. The Outrigger won the first game in a best 2 out of 3 series, but Westside made a key switch in personnel and strategy and won second and third games. Thus the White team dropped into the finals of the losers' bracket there to meet again another Westside Team called the Reds. In this match which was quite exciting, Outrigger won in three games. Now we are in the finals of the Tournament again to play Westside Blue Team. In this match Westside was really playing terrific volleyball, and the Outrigger team played great also but seemed somewhat tired and got a couple of bad calls from the referee which took some of the fight out of the team. The Outrigger lost to Westside 15-5, 15-5. Every member of the White Team played well and certainly deserves all the credit due them.

We also entered a Green Team in the Open Division and this team was composed of members of the Senior Team and three players from the Varsity. This team lost to L.A.Y.M.C.A. (4th seeded in tournament) in its first match, but gave the L.A. team all it could handle before losing 13-10, 15-10. They played Beach State College in their first match of the losers' bracket and defeated Long Beach 15-6, 15-8. Then they played the Dallas Y.M.C.A., a strong national contender, and lost to them, 14-11, 15-6, thus they were eliminated from the Open Division. Members of this team were: Pat Wyman, Ron Sorrell, Bill Baird, Bill Heilbron, Mike Holmes, Fred Noa, Dave Hendrickson, Dan Oredson, Mike McMahon and Cole McFarland. This team and every member played their hearts out.

In the Senior Division, the Outrigger Team moved through the tourney quite easily and into the finals of the Winners' Bracket to play Long Beach Y.M.C.A.'s team. The Outrigger Seniors were really playing terrific volleyball in this match and won in two straight games. Long Beach then won the finals of the losers' bracket and came back to play the Outrigger Seniors again in the final

match. In the finals the Long Beach team was "red hot" and won two straight games thus forcing a one-game play-off for the championship. In the final game Long Beach, paced by Jim Montague (just elected into volley-ball's Hall of Fame) and Dick Hammer (member of U.S. Olympic Team 1964), were too tough for Outrigger and won, thus capturing the Championship, and our Seniors were second. Members of the Senior Team and a real great team, were: Bill Baird, Ron Sorrell, Fred Noa, Pat Wyman, Dan Oredson, Bill Heilbron, Wally Young and the Iron Man of the tourney playing in both the Open and Senior, Tom Haine.

The Outrigger placed two men on the First String All-American Team, John Stanley and Pete Velasco, two on the Second Team, John Alstrom and Tom Haine in the Open

Division.

In the Senior Division—First String All-American were Tom Haine, Pat Wyman and Fred Noa. On the Second Team were Bill Baird and Ron Sorrell.

A truly outstanding record and performance by all the

players and they are to be congratulated.

Selected for tryouts for the U.S. Men's Olympic Team to be held in August were: Tom Haine, Pete Velasco, Jon Stanley and John Alstrom. The coach of Outrigger team, John Lowell, Tasse been selected as the manager of the

U.S. Olympic Team.

Selected as an alternate for the tryouts was another Outrigger member, **Tony Crabbe**, who played for Church College of Hawaii, and they came in second place in the Collegiate Division and were the "Cinderella Team" of the Nationals. Tony did an outstanding job for that team and deserves much credit for their success.

All in all, a great year for the Outrigger in volleyball, and certainly appreciated are all those who gave us support, and we hope to capture both National titles in 1969

John Stanley has left Honolulu for six weeks of training with the Air Force in Texas. John will then go to Lake Tahoe to train with the U.S. Olympic Volleyball team.

## California Honolulu Catamaran Race 1968

Only a few days more and the 3rd Biennial Multihull Trans-Pacific race will start off Point Fermin Buoy at San Pedro, California, at noon, July 4. It appears now that the following eight boats will make the 2,225-mile race:

Imi Loa, 43-ft. catamaran, Dr. Vic Stern and Freeman Odlum; sole finisher in '64 and 3rd to finish in '66; Glass Slipper, 50-ft. catamaran, Jay Johnson and Chuck Gardner; winner on corrected time in '66; Auriga, 38-ft. trimaran, Dr. Robert Cameron; Lani Kai, 46-ft. catamaran, Dr. Martin Crumrine; Manu Iwa, 50-ft. catamaran, Lance Reventlow; Polynesian Concept, 36-ft. catamaran, Buddy Ebsen; Sea Smoke, 58-ft. catamaran, James Arness; Illusion, 43-ft. catamaran, Gordon Cann.

Of the eight entries, six boats are racing in this race for the first time. One of the newcomers is **Sea Smoke**, owned by TV star James Arness, first to finish in the Ensenada yacht race earlier this year.

The race is under the sponsorship of Ocean Racing Catamaran Association, Outrigger Canoe Club, Seal Beach Yacht Club and Waikiki Yacht Club. Outrigger has been a sponsor beginning with the first race in 1964. The executive committee on the Honolulu end is headed by OCC's Cline Mann, assisted by Peter Dillingham, Dan Feltham and Dan Wallace of both OCC and WYC, and Buck Ashford of Kaneohe Yacht Club.

Depending upon weather, surf and beach conditions, boats finishing between 7:00 a.m. and 9:30 p.m. will be brought into the Outrigger lagoon, there to be greeted suitably by club members and friends and moored overnight. On Thursday, July 18, the crews and their friends and families will be entertained at a no-host cocktail party at Waikiki Yacht Club. The next night, Friday, July 19, will be a trophy awards party at Outrigger Canoe Club. The OCC Entertainment Committee, assisted by Manager Peter Van Dorn, is in charge of this one, and it should be loads of fun, just like the parties for the **Kamalii** in '65 and '67. On the program will be catamaran skipper Buddy Ebsen, veteran entertainer and star of TV's "Beverly Hill-billies."

The Honolulu committee appeals for assistance from the members in the categories listed below. Those who want to join in the fun of working on this race are asked to leave their names, addresses and phone numbers with the club manager.

As in previous years a large chart at the entrance into the club will show the daily position of each yacht so that members can follow the course of the race and be ready to receive the racers as they finish, beginning about July 13.

If everybody pitches in, this biennial event will be a sporting and social affair not soon forgotten.

#### Information Center

Lou Schilling is in charge and needs a host of helpers, both male and female, for a multitude of tasks. The information center will be adjacent to Miller Marine Sales at the Ala Wai Yacht Harbor. It will be manned about six hours a day until the yachts approach Oahu. The last few days it will be manned 24 hours.

### Towing and Mooring

Dan Feltham is in overall charge, assisted by Wally Young and Tom Reiner. Volunteers are needed from the club membership to man committee boats and handle lines and stern anchors at Outrigger.

#### Hosting

At this printing there is no chairman. We want, however, at least two sponsors for each yacht to take care of the greeting duties and the other numerous courtesies normally extended to the crews and their families.

The 1968 Outrigger canoe paddling season got off to a great start for our club at the Annual Kamehameha Day Regatta held at Kailua Beach Park, Sunday, June 9th.

Outrigger placed second in the regatta. This is up from fourth place in the same regatta last year. Traditionally, Outrigger gets off to a slow start in the early regattas of the season. This is due to the fact that most of the paddlers in the older age groups have not yet returned from their mainland colleges. This year, however, coach Mark Buck, most ably assisted by Mike Lemes, has worked with superb success to get the most out of their available crews.

The Outrigger posted three first places, the 14 and under crew with Skipper Barnes, Mark Teele, Richard Blackburn, Dale Hope, Johnny King, and steered by Keone Downing in his first year with Outrigger Canoe Club. The Boy's 18 crew took our next first place win over a single entry, Healani. The 18's are Marty Wilson, Johnny Mounts. Tommy Arnott (in his first canoe race ever), David Alexander, Mike Driscoll and Brant Ackerman. The 18's ran a perfect race and took and kept the lead throughout the one mile race. Our last win for the day, and also a record, was by the Freshman crew. The Freshmen ran their one-mile event in the time of 8-54-5 in very windy, choppy seas. The Freshman crew: Jody D'Enbeau, Tom Connor, Tony Crabbe, Bill Eggers, Tom Bean and Butch Ledford. These were the winning crews; they were backed up by some fine paddling on behalf of the Boys 13 who, because of an unfortunate mistake of finishing out of their lane, lost what was a solid second place. The 13's will no doubt make up that place as the season progresses. Our Novice men put in another excellent performance in their first outing, taking a second place in an excellent race. Our Boy's 16 crew took a fourth place in what was really a photo finish of the second, third and fourth place canoes.

Our Freshmen girls really put in a splendid performance with a second place finish. The girls paddled with great ability and will no doubt improve that one spot with a bit more training. Our Novice girls took a fourth in their first outing but that placing is not an indication of their ability; a little more practice will have them on top. Our Junior and Senior crews both came home with third place. Both were victims of rather unusual lanes and, for this writer, a rather casual and inconsistent interpretation of the rules by the Racing Association. Our Junior men drew lane one, closest to the shore, a lane that appeared to be somewhat longer than the others by the performance of those who paddled in it from the various clubs. When in the Senior event the officials allowed Healani to turn short of their flag they virtually assured Healani of its final second place. Why weren't the other crews who used this lane allowed that advantage? One would think that after many, many years of setting lanes that the task could be undertaken in a more accurate and durable form.

Most active paddler of the day award must go to Jody D'Enbeau who came to the races at 8 in the morning, stayed through all the events until noon, then back over the Pali to the University to not only graduate but also to receive his commission in the Army in full dress uniform, then a quick trip back to the races to set the pace for the record breaking Freshman crew. Jody's wife Nancy put club and paddling before ceremony and stayed with her Freshman women's crew to paddle to their second place. It was Nancy's debut in canoe paddling and a very active day for the D'Enbeau family.

This was in all respects a great opener for the Outrigger Canoe Club and what we all hope will be the beginning of a fine season.

Remember your club sponsors and puts on the Annual Macfarlane Day Regatta July 4 at Waikiki. This is but a short walk from the Outrigger Canoe Club. This is one of the finest spectator races of the season. It is particularly thrilling if the surf is big. Be sure to go to your club's race on the 4th of July.


### CANOEING "K-BAY DAY" RESULTS








The FORECAST regrets to hard-working Tennis Committee **Peter Balding** for this late issue. The results of the tournament will appear in the July issue.

### Travel

The Grasshopper/Outrigger Charter Flight is now only a memory. It is a happy memory for those who were able to make this splendid trip. It was indeed a happy group that assembled at Brussels National Airport on May 30th for the return flight to Honolulu. The International Departure Lounge looked for a moment like the Hau Terrace there were so many Outrigger members about along with many familiar faces of the Grasshopper group.

The variety of experiences had by the charter members was due in fact that no required tour or itinerary was imposed upon the members of the flight. Some people visited relatives, others good friends and temporarily displaced Outrigger members. Many bought or rented automobiles and just went as they pleased. This spring in Europe was for the most part bright and sunny alive with color and notably absent of hordes of tourists. A delightful spring except perhaps for those who had the misfortune to become involved in DeGaulle's dilemma.

Judging from the great pleasure most members enjoyed on this trip there are sure to be more groups in the

future to a variety of destinations.

While on the subject of international travel, the subject of the once proposed travel restrictions comes up again. The taxes are all dead issues at this time. The public and the airline industry, both domestic and foreign, all made it quite clear that this restrictive policy was grossly unpopular and very unfair to the many carriers of all nations who fly to and from United States ports. The foreign carriers were indeed hit the hardest by adverse publicity, they became victims of U.S. policy while at the same time purchasing a vast number of goods and services in the U.S. Mr. Eric Emberson, Honolulu representative of BOAC, supplies typical information that might be similar of many of the foreign carriers. The statistics are quoted here-they are very enlightening.

"Each week, BOAC spends nearly \$1 million in the U.S.A. on running costs-payroll, rent, advertising, hotel bills, air catering, etc. Hundreds of American industries benefit from this expenditure. These bills, which rise

every year, do not include capital spending.

"In ten years, BOAC has spent nearly \$200 million on Boeing 707s and spares, and on its New York cargo terminal.

"In the next five years, BOAC will spend over \$400 million in the U.S.A. on capital equipment—Boeing 747s, IGM computers and on its passenger terminal at J. F. Kennedy Airport.
"BOAC has also paid down \$600,000 for U.S. SST de-

livery positions.

"American travel agents earn over \$5 million every

year in commissions from BOAC.

"Britain is America's biggest source of overseas visitors. In 1967, over 250,000 Britons came to the U.S.A.—twice as many as from any other European country, and as many as from Germany and France combined.

"America has a favorable balance of trade with Britain. On the last available figures, the balance was over \$500

million in favor of the U.S.

"In 1968, BOAC plans to spend nearly \$1 million in Britain alone on promoting travel to the U.S.A. Hundreds of thousands of dollars more are being spent in other parts of the world."

Charter flight or regularly scheduled flight, Europe is a bit more open this year due to all the speculation of this past spring. It's a good year to go.
