

# Surfing Makaha

The Outrigger Canoe Club has traditionally finished well in the final standings at the Makaha International Surfing Championships held during the Christmas holidays. This year Outrigger veteran Joey Cabell displayed his dazzling new style in the tricky 6 to 8 foot surf to win the championships crown. Joey, winner in 1963, edged out two-time champion Fred Hemmings, who placed second in the field of 185 entrants. As champion, Joey will represent the Outrigger and Hawaii in the Peruvian World Contest to be held in Lima, Peru, in late February.

This year's contest witnessed a significant development in the overall progress of surfing at the club by the fact that no fewer than 22 members, the largest team ever, entered the competition. Sally Jo Beam, Gayle Reiner, and Robin Smith vied in the wahines event. Steve Williams, Randy Cassidy, John Boyd, Gary Sheehan, Jim Boyd, Rusty Starr, and Doug Bechert were all in the junior men's event. John Mounts and Tomi Winkler succeeded into the semifinals, while Brant Ackerman demonstrated his calibre as a future winner by placing fourth overall in the juniors. Rick Steere, Mark Hemmings, Mike Holmes, and Paul Strauch all advanced to the quarter finals of the senior men's event by winning their heats. Only Joey Cabell and Fred Hemmings survived to finish 1-2 in the finals of the men's blue ribbon event.

Congratulations to the champion and the finalists and hats off to all the others who proved their stuff by rising to the challenge of the Makaha Championships.

The Duke Kahanamoku Invitational Surfing Contest, in which 24 of the world's greatest surfers gathered to match their skills and determination with the peripatetic combers of famous Sunset Beach, was the occasion for another forward step by the Outrigger in the world of surfing. The contest saw Fred Hemmings, last year's third place winner, performing excellently, Butch Van Artsdalen catching the most spectacular wave of the day, and Paul Strauch demonstrating his consistent, smooth style to garner third prize overall.

Besides providing the meet with some of the club's top riders, the Outrigger ascended to acting as host for the event. Guest privileges for the contestants and assistance in staging the competition were topped off by a sand blast party at the club on Saturday, December 16th. The sand blast, preceded by films of the 1965 and 1966 Duke Meets, was a rousing success enjoyed by over 300 people. The party was televised and is to be included in the hour special "Duke Kahanamoku's World of Surfing."

Both the Outrigger Canoe Club and the Duke Contest benefitted by the club's participation. Mahalo to the Outrigger Board of Directors and to Kimo McVay of Duke Kahanamoku's for their decision.

The Hawaiian Surfing Association has named **Steve Williams, Brant Ackerman** and **Rusty Starr** in their ratings for 1967.



This sequence of pictures of **Joey Cabell** at Haleiwa illustrates the new direction of surfing. In the first picture he has dropped in and is making his bottom turn by putting all of his body weight into it to increase his speed. With this speed he projects himself not only down the line but also to the top of the wave [picture 2], turning down to make another bottom turn [picture 3] to reincrease his speed. This speed enables him to rise and ride under the lip of the breaking wave [picture 4, you can see the wake which the board created on the wave], then outside the top of the wave, turning, then dropping with the wave [picture 5] and following through with another bottom turn [picture 6].

With surfboards becoming smaller and faster, surfers are able to ride small waves with big wave feeling. This sequence is only one of many combinations that can be performed on a wave by today's progressive surfers.





## The Speed Surfing of

It is evident that trend changes in the sport of surfing are being replaced with a steady progression toward a new objective, namely speed. This objective is far more challenging than that of previous trends of non-functional surfing tricks which are almost obsolete.

Now, surfing maneuvers are becoming intentional, from dropping in the wave to pulling out of it. The reason is that surfboards are being designed and created for the purpose of speed and maneuverability. Consequently the surfer is able to cover much more surface, so he must cross the curl line and make numerous anticipated motions to remain in the critical part of the wave, which is the fastest, steepest, and most exciting.

### **Swimming**

**Aileen Riggin Soule**, former Olympic Games standout, was recently inducted into the Swimming Hall of Fame at Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

Established three years ago, the Hall of Fame now has a select membership of 69.

Earlier Hall of Fame members from Hawaii include Duke Kahanamoku, coach Soichi Sakamoto and Bill Smith.

Aileen entered the Olympics in 1920 as a swimmer and diver at Antwerp, Belgium, and in the 1924 games at Paris. She won the Olympic springboard championships in 1920, the first time this event was ever held. Aileen also placed fifth in the high diving event to pace the U.S. in that event. In the 1924 games in Paris Aileen was second in the springboard three-meter diving and also placed third in the women's 100-meter backstroke.

Selections to the Hall of Fame are made on a world-wide basis on a vote of 1,130 swimming coaches in the United States.

There were far more athletes who performed for the club than could be honored individually at the time.

All participating athletes and those who devoted their valuable time toward the Outrigger Canoe Club's outstanding 1967 athletic program received a certificate of participation from President **Tom Arnott. Bill Brooks** of the host Athletic Sponsors Committee was master of ceremonies and organizer of the evening.

We now look forward to the 1968 athletic year and hope to improve upon our 1967 successes.

There are still a few seats available for the May 1st departure from Honolulu to Amsterdam with return from Brussels the 31st of May. This flight represents the greatest European travel bargain ever for Hawaii. At this writing, there are NO government restrictions on travel of any kind. If by some remote chance congress should pass any kind of travel tax the proposals would still make this trip an unheard of bargain as compared to regular fare flights. With the current thinking in Washington, this might be the last opportunity to Europe at a price like this for some time to come. Better go while you can.

Here are the plans of several Outrigger members. The Russell Starrs are headed for London, then to Ireland with plans to drive to castles and tour the countryside on their own. 
