State Regatta

The State Championship Canoe Races held at Nawiliwili, Kauai on Saturday, August 5th should go down in the history of the Outrigger Canoe Club as perhaps one of the most glorious in the history of canoe racing for our Club. This was a day of almost total victory for the individual crews in their events. It was a total victory on behalf of sportsmanship of the Outrigger Canoe Club and most particularly by our coach Mark Buck. The Outrigger Canoe Club won 8 events out of 12 offered to give us a team total of 45 points as compared to 29 for the next closest club, Waikiki Surf. The race was carried out under the most bitter of circumstances. Due to a false start in the Novice event, our crew was virtually left out of the competition, a broken paddle being the reason. Outrigger filed a protest which was accepted by the racing officials. A rerun of the race was scheduled and our crew paddled it alone. The rest of the clubs, in the poorest display of sportsmanship, refused to paddle against us because they did not like the decision of the judges. With this they said they would pull out of the regatta like little children who couldn't have their way. Our coach Mark Buck in a most magnanimous decision offered to withdraw the protest over the Novice race in order that we might have a regatta and most particularly to provide the races all the paddlers had come to Kauai to participate in. Even then the attitude toward Outrigger by officials of the other clubs was disgusting and they did not have the decency to announce that coach Buck had withdrawn his Novice crew for the sake of canoe racing and the running of this regatta. If there was any doubt in the minds of the other clubs about who was going to win the regatta, it was very short lived. Our tremendous crews went on to take 5 more first places and one second and one third, to sweep the competition out of the harbor one right after the other. We came prepared to run and win in fair competition and that is just what we did in spite of the apparent vendetta against Outrigger Canoe Club and the officials who ran the race.

The results of the various events were most impressive. Starting right off with the 13 year old boys' crew who won an impressive race, the 14 year olds went out and won their 5th race of the season to give them a clean

sweep for the 1967 race series. These two races were followed by the Novice girls who did a nice job of it with a second place position. The Novice Men's race of course became the most notorious of the day's events and on our part was run twice. Congratulations to our Novice crew who were forced into embarrassment by the unsportsmanlike action of the other competing clubs. Following hours of disagreement, our 16 year old boys' crew went out and provided a beautiful first place win. In what might be described as an upset, our Freshman Women's crew went out and took a first place and did so by boat lengths. These girls are to be especially congratulated as only three regattas back, they were a 7th place crew. To come that far up in such a short time is a testimony to the girls' ability and training by Mark and Cynthia Harbin. Following the Freshmen came the Junior Women, they too brought us a first place with a fine performance. The Junior Men repeated their performance of the Oahu Championships and moved to a fine victory that left no doubt in anyone's mind about their ability. The Senior Men again placed third in their event, losing to two veteran crews, Healani and Waikiki Surf Club. Our crews resumed their winning ways with the 18 year boys crew who took a first place in a hard fought race. To end the day's events, our Freshman crew went out and produced a fine finish with a well earned first place in a hard fought race. It has indeed been a canoe racing season of which every member, whether he knows he belongs to a canoe club or not, can be most proud. Mark Buck in his first year as coach has produced the strongest held of competitors this club has seen for years. The spirit of the crews and the attendance at the races by members and parents has been encouraging and every paddler is proud of his or her achievement for the club. The paddlers, one and all, express their gratitude to President Tom Arnott and the Board of Directors for providing the official backing needed and for providing the means to keep our equipment at its very best condition. I believe the results of the State Championship Races are the very best way of thanks to the directors from the crews. There can be nothing more gratifying than to support a group of winners.

Volleyball

Tom Haine and Pete Velasco of Hawaii's AAU championship Outrigger Canoe Club team played key roles as the United States won the men's volleyball gold medal in the recently completed Pan American Games at Winnipeg, Manitoba.

In winning the Pan American Games the U.S. also qualified for the 1968 Olympic Games, capping a tremendous comeback in international competition.

John Lowell, Outrigger coach and head coach of the U.S. squad, said that both Haine and Velasco are two of the top players in the country today following their performances in taking the Pan American title.

Haine was the big reason the U.S. won its two toughest games against Cuba and Brazil, according to Lowell.

"Tom dominated with his backcourt play and his spiking," said Lowell. "He won those two games and played the best volleyball of his career."

Unfortunately, Velasco was sidelined by a sprained ankle until the final two matches. "He (Velasco) played a beautiful game in that final key match against Brazil," said Lowell.

Lowell, who switched from the American style to European in preparation for the U.S. for the Pan Am event, was elated by the progress and improvement shown in winning the gold medal.

Lowell first employed the European technique in coaching the Outrigger team and enjoying instant success winning the National AAU championship earlier this year.
