CANOE RACING

The paddling program at the club did not get rolling until school was out for the summer so we were able to enter only five events in the Kam Day Regatta at Kailua Beach on June 13. The highlight of our effort that day was the performance of our 13-year-old crew. Caught in the terrific traffic jam they were unable to answer the initial call. However, they sprinted for the beach, piled into the *Leilani*, raced one-fourth mile to the starting line where all the other crews awaited the starter's gun, wheeled around just in time, and raced back to a first place finish.

At the annual Marine Corps K-Bay Karnival on June 20 at Kaneohe a better showing was made by our crews, who entered each of the eleven events; however, only the 14's were able to capture a first place.

The club sponsored the annual Walter J. Macfarlane regatta at the Moana Hotel beach on the 4th of July when tremendous surfing conditions suddenly replaced the calm which had prevailed the previous two weeks, and this situation allowed for open steersmen. Our hats are off to Aka Hemmings and Brant Ackerman who steered the 13's and 14's, respectively, against some of Hawaii's best steersmen. In the blue ribbon event our senior men's crew defended its championship and brought back the Macfarlane trophy for the second time since 1950. Members of the crew were coaches Nick Beck and Al Lemes, Bob Beck, Gary Blaich, Tim Guard and Richard Sylva. Capturing a first place also was the Junior men's crew of Jon Sutherland, Bill Mitchell, Tom Rietow, Fred Lowrey, Mike Lemes and Mike Holmes. The 18's were barely nosed out of first in their race.

The less said about the Oahu Championships at Kaneohe Bay on July 25, the better. Suffice to say, the crews did not garner a single victory, and a chagrined but determined lot resolved to work doubly hard during the last two weeks in order to make a respectable showing at the State Championships.

Hilo on August 7 was the site of the State Championships for the third consecutive year. With perfect weather prevailing our rejuvenated crews redeemed themselves by rising to an unprecedented three-way tie for the team championship along with Kailua Hawaiian Civic Club and defending champion Healani, each with 26 points. Waikiki Surf Club, which won the feature Senior Men's event, ended up in fourth place with 21 team points.

Scoring points in all but one event of the eleven event program, the club won two events, one of which was the 14's in record time. Members of this crew were Mike Driscoll, Tom Levine, Jim Boyd, Bob Schirman, Tom Burkland, and Brant Ackerman. The other victory was a complete surprise pulled off by our novice women crew of Sally Hodgins, Mapuana Rochlen, Chris Cherry, Sheila Ripley, Julie Haynie, and Cheri Chapman. Other crews who won points in the hard-earned team victory were:

13's, 2nd; novice men, 2nd; 16's, 3rd; 18's, 3rd; senior women, 3rd; freshmen, 4th; junior men, 4th; and senior men, 3rd.

The climax of the regatta came in the last event, the Senior Men two-mile race, where Healani's margin over the fast closing Outrigger crew was a scant foot. Another twelve inches and the Outrigger Canoe Club would have reigned alone as champion.

Accolades must go to coaches Albert Lemes and Nick Beck for the terrific job they did preparing our paddlers physically and mentally for the State Championships.

After a brief rest training will commence for the annual Molokai to Oahu race which kicks off Aloha Week on October 17.

Queen's Surf at Waikiki on the weekend of July 10 was the site of the annual Junior Surfing Championships sponsored by Surf Club Hawaii. Over 240 youngsters between the ages of 9 and 16 participated, with the Outrigger well represented by eighteen of its best young surfers, fifteen more than entered last year.

The Outrigger junior surfers were enthusiastic about being able to compete in a meet of their own and were well prepared for the surf, which at four to six feet, was the best they have ever had for the meet. The club was represented in each of the five groups which included boys 9-11, 12-14, and 15-16 and girls 12-14 and 15-16. While none of our juniors placed in the finals, all surfed very well with Gary Sheehan, Aka Hemmings and Gar Clarke surviving the first elimination.

Butch Hemmings did an admirable job of managing our junior surfing team. All look forward to future contests, particularly the Makaha Championships in December.

It was early in the morning, July 15, when the Kamalii crossed the Diamond Head finish line in the 24th biennial Trans-Pacific Yacht Race.

Despite the early hour, a hardy band of club members was on hand to welcome the 75-foot ketch, which was co-sponsored this year by the OCC and veteran yachtsman Ron Burla. The off-shore greeting was provided by Jerry Coran, who volunteered his boat for the reception, Cline Mann, Jim Muirhead, Larry Clapp, Randy Worthington and Scoops Suzuki, our usually intrepid photographer. The forces of nature won out over Scoops' camera.

The Kamalii crossed the line at 2:13 a.m., which gave her a first, of sorts. She was the first yacht to arrive that day. Her corrected time was 9 days:15 hours:5 minutes:56 seconds and her elapsed time was 10 days:17 hours:13 minutes:13 seconds.

After she dropped her spinnaker, she was towed in to the Ala Wai Yacht Harbor by Laurie Dowsett, an OCC spouse and Transpac towing chairman, and Tom Arnott.

Following the official amenities at dockside, an expanded group of club greeters, relatives and friends climbed on board to meet club member and owner-skipper Larry Doheny and his crew. Adding a colorful note to the pre-dawn festivities were Jams-clad Sally Hodgins, Daphne Ripple, Toni Castro and Margie Stevens, who presented the leis. The logistics of getting Anzai's mai tais on board was handled by Club Manager Peter Van Dorn, Bob Fischer and Shannon O'Neil. Messrs. Muirhead, Arnott and Worthington poured.
