BEACH DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORTS

Keith Wallace, chairman of the Beach Development sub-committee reports that at a recent meeting of his committee with our new club's architects it was decided that the pier for promenade and surfboard storage purposes should be deferred at this time. One reason for this decision is that when future planned beach improvements are completed by the State or City and County the pier would be useless.

The Beach Development sub-committee also recommended to the Board of Directors that the architects proceed with plans for minor dredging of coral and other obstructions outside of the future sand line.

The above decisions were reached only after months of work and many meetings by the committees and others in studying the overall situation which made it possible to arrive at these conclusions.

Your Beach Development sub-committee has many problems to solve before we're "at home" at our new site, and each day brings more problems . . . and more work.

That's what OCC member Joe Cabell earned when he paddled the $9\frac{1}{4}$ miles from Kahalepaulua Beach on Lanai to Lahaina, Maui in the go-like-a-swift time of one hour, 57 minutes, 38.1 seconds on Saturday, June 17th. Next year he is sure he can knock off that $1/10$ th of a second.

The *first* first that Joey won was for the best time made for the race and his *second* first was for placing first in the stock board class. Stock boards usually weigh 35 pounds.

Other OCC paddlers who brought home first places were Club Coach Rabbit Kekai, open board (specially built to any specifications with working rudders); and Fred Hemmings, Jr., Malibu board (maximum of 11 feet). Rick Steere was second and Paul MacLaughlin third in the stock board class and Beach Service's Nappy

Napoleon placed second in the open board class.

Leaving us recently, but we hope not for long were Pauline Sackheim who has returned to Maine and Jody D'Enbeau who's now back in San Francisco.

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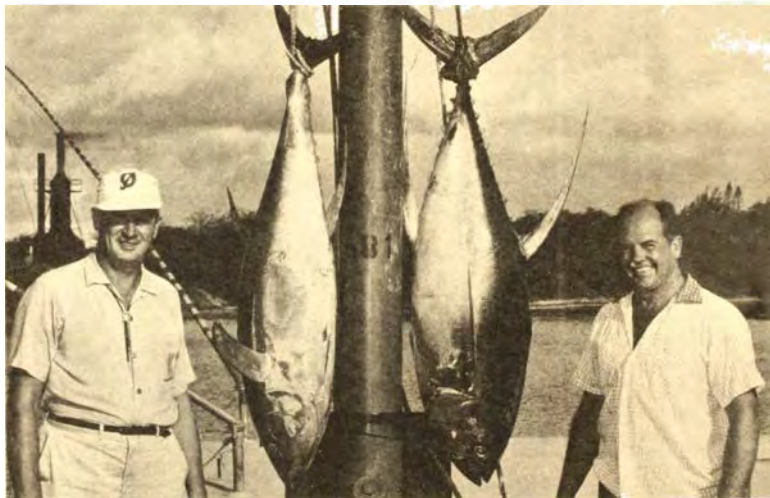

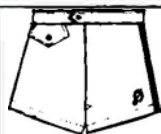
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GOOD LUCK, "PURSUIT"
