300 ATTEND ANNUAL MEETING

The Sheraton Meeting House was abuzz with activity Friday, the 24th of February when some 300 regular members gathered for the Annual Meeting and to welcome the seven newly elected directors. It was good to see that so many of you are keenly interested in your club's present and future activities.

President Ward Russell, in his annual report, once again reviewed for those who were not present at the special membership meeting January 24th events that have taken place concerning the possibility of our accepting offers and proposals from interests desiring to see us remain at our present club site. However, by meeting time no firm proposals had been made by OCC or received by us. It's a big decision to make and will take lots of meetings and lots of figuring before the answer is before us.

In this respect an Advanced Planning committee has been formed whose particular concern will be the new club site. Tom Singlehurst is chairman and will be assisted by Bill Curlette, Dan Dorman and U. J. (Buzz) Rainalter. The lease on our present site expires October 30, 1963.

Ward also reminded those present of the new membership drive of which Lou Bingham is chairman. During this drive the initiation fee for regular members is \$250, but on June 30th the \$300 normal initiation fee will be restored. So get your friends in now folks. The membership presently is made up of 996 regualr members, 168 juniors, 186 non-resident and 36 military.

Treasurer Herbert Taylor presented his annual report and in essence it pointed out the need for more patronage of OCC by the membership and guests. (Ed. Note: If only the club could be "jumping" like it was after the Annual meeting! Wasn't that a happy sight to see!)



COMMITTEES REPORT AT ANNUAL MEETING

The Sheraton group also expressed the hope that OCC would be able to accommodate the Uluniu group if at all possible. The Bishop Estate says that if Sheraton does not renew its lease on the property with them that they (Bishop) will offer the space to OCC in the hope that the club will find it economically feasible to accept their offer.

Following reports from the officers and committee chairmen the resolution seeking authorization of the employment of an architect or architects for the preparation of plans for a new club (Diamond Head) site was discussed and then put to a vote by the membership. It was unanimously passed.




