Well, first of all it was predicted that the Republican ticket of Wm. McKinley and Elihu Root would emerge as victors on the presidential ticket. And issues other than political were big stuff, just like they were in the recent campaign. Henry Payne, for instance, said "Although I am a Western man I can see no reasons which admit of no argument for the vice presidential nomination going to an Eastern man."

Now let's see what else the Advertiser for January 1, 1900 had to say. As regards real estate, it was noted that "there is no particular activity in real estate circles, nor is any expected during the post-Holiday season. According to the best information obtainable, however, good property is in demand at good prices and the market is steady. The new Pacific Heights tract has opened "above the mosquito line" and it is anticipated that many pretentious homes will be built on the land.

"In the past year the demand upon the area of domicile, the crowding of streets, the strange faces everywhere, the passenger lists of steamer and sailing vessels . . . all these tell their own story. Honolulu is growing, Hawaii is growing and nothing seems like to stop an influx which is caused by an

## AWFUL GOOD WAFFLE

If there's one resolution you *shouldn't* break this bright year of '61, it's that promise to serve the family their favorite breakfast—waffles—often.

For years we have been tasting 'Pat' Hass's Belgium waffles every Christmas morning, and we're willing to bet if you don't like this recipe, you don't like waffles.

Outrigger members, Pat and Vern Hass, he is general manager and vice president of Libby McNeill & Libby, hold open house 'brunch' every Christmas. Waffles with maple syrup and bourbon are the feature attraction—and melt-in-your-mouth morsels they are. Pat learned to make these in Belgium when they lived there for 11 years.

Just in case you didn't clip the recipe which was featured in the Star-Bulletin food section in December, we repeat it here—remember the resolution!

### "GAUFRETTES" (tender waffles)

(Serves 4)

- 1 cup cake flour
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup milk (varies)

Beat eggs separately. Whites should be very stiff. Sift dry ingredients together. Add milk and egg yolks to dry ingredients. Add butter. Fold in egg whites.

Bake immediately in hot waffle iron. Serve with favorite topping or maple syrup with bourbon (add 1/4 cup bourbon to 1 quart syrup depending upon taste.) Happy New Year!

Linda Fisher, daughter of Mrs. 14th in observance of her 11th birth-Myra of the same name, hosted 12 of her young friends to dinner December day.



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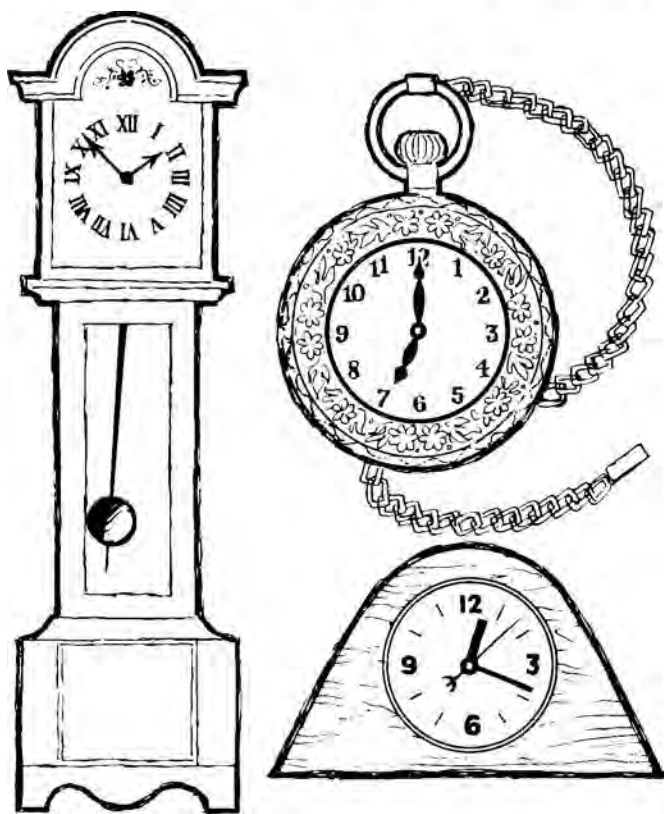
