Come and Get It

The Outrigger is practically a 'second home' to the Allan Ledford family as it is to many other members. At least one or more of the family of seven can be seen daily at the clubsurfing, swimming, volleyball or socializing.

Active days mean hearty appetites and Mrs. Ledford (Caroline) is always prepared for the familiar, "Mom, can Billy or Susie or Jane come home

with me for dinner tonight?

When the family moved here from Napa, California, in '56, Caroline brought her file of wonderful Italian recipes she had collected there.

Among her popular dishes that she uses for entertaining is an Italian paste called malfatti—used in place of ravioli in a section of Italy.

MALFATTI

Serves 10

4 cups cooked chard (cook, drain, and measure)

- 6 cups bread (use French, soak in water and squeeze dry—measure)
- 1/2 bunch parsley 2 cloves garlic
 - 4 medium onions
 - 1 cup Parmesan grated cheese


5 eggs

Salt and pepper

Put onions through meat grinder. Melt 1/4-1/2 cup olive oil in large frying pan. Add chopped parsley and garlic. Let simmer. Put chard and bread through grinder. Add to mixture in pan. Cook for about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and cool. Add unbeaten eggs and cheese and season.

If mixture is too moist, add more dry bread. Heat pot of salted water. Take a teaspoon of the mixture, roll very lightly into a small sausage shape on floured board and drop in boiling water. The malfatti will rise to the top when done. Remove with a strainer. Serve on a platter and cover with

good Italian spaghetti sauce. Sprinkle cheese on top. Caroline suggests this is a good dish for the 'do-it-yourself' party in the kitchen. Or it can be made ahead of time and heated with the sauce in the oven later.

testants swam the mile from the Castle home (later the Elks Club) to the Club. The wahines swam the half mile or so from Public Baths (about where the Aquarium is now) to the Club.

I didn't have time to find when the first meet was held because it isn't catalogued at the Library, which would have meant going through that many newspapers. However, I did find out that our own director, Mariechen Wehselau Jackson, won the gals race in 1922, 1923 and 1924. In 1923 Helen Moses Cassidy, her still good friend, was second and Janice Lovett third.

For the men, the 1924, '29 and '32 races were won by *Toots Minvielle*. At that time he was a resident of Molokai. For him to win these races was an amazing thing to me, because all I've ever heard about Molokai is that it has "no more water." In 1934 *Toots* came in second. The winner was Henry Sakamoto of 40 & 8. Olga Clark took the wahines' race in 1934 and Mildred Slaght was second.

So you see what happens when Barry merely mentions that they might get the Castle Swim going again? I get

carried away.




This was really a great day for the Outrigger at Kahului. Our crews took four first places; came second three times. Two times we were third and two times came in fourth.
