## Kaimana Hila, Backdrop To Waikiki

As much a part of Hawaii as the Hula girl and the Lei is the stage-like, lava backdrop to Waikiki . . . Diamond Head.

For very few photographers, illustrators, and painters will return to the Mainland without a sampling of one of the world's most famous silhouettes, a dormant volcano with an estimated age of 15,000 years.

Diamond Head, Kaimana Hila, we call it today. Yet the age-old wrinkled mound of lava standing above W'aikiki has had numerous titles . . . and an interesting history.

Hawaiians called her Leahi Hill with a literal translation of "forehead of the ahi fish."

In days of yore it has been named Point Rose, the Conical Mountain, Diamond Hill. and Yellow Diamond Hill. But whatever, she remained a landpoint and welcome sight to sailors aboard whaling vessels to tourists aboard the Lurline.

The present title, Diamond Head was bestowed when visiting English sailors thought they had discovered mines of immense wealth. Their joy was short lived, however, when they learned what they had thought to be diamonds only worthless calcite crystals.

During this period, the great King Kamehameha placed a ban on the area until the true werth of the crystals was discovered.

The kapu was lifted but the name remained.
It was the same King Kamehamcha I that placed cattle, given him as a gift by the explorer Vancouver, in the crater floor to graze.

Years later, the Federal Government took interest in the crater land and its overgrown density of hacle-koa trees, keawe brush, and ilima. And with the inception of the First World War, Diamond Head turned from pasture land to a gun emplacement with a fantastic view of the Pacific.

A second great war developed Diamond Head into an even more mighty military bastion. Roads, tunnels and gun mounts were built, giving the old volcano an importance of a minor Gibraltar.

Several hundred men made their war time homes within the crater.
In 1950, the underground maze of tunnels was opened to the public for the first time since the government purchased Diamond Head in 1904.

Again closed by U.S. "kapu," Kaimana Hila serves as a training ground for Hawaii National Guard troops.

Changes underground, war, disçoveries, a host of names have not changed her . . . Diamond Head remains the sentinal of Waikiki!

Ernie is as busy as the proverbial cranberry merchant these days! Seldom see him at the club.

Yes, we mean club member Ernest Bovee, who has been president of Royal Hawaiian Liqueurs, less than a year and a half ago and now has so many mainland orders he is literally up to his ears' in banana peels, coffee beans, et cetera.

Ernies been developing a fascinating line of island flavors that would excite even a soporific tongue, namely banana, Kona coffee, passion fruit, and lichi liqueurs.

He believes his banana liqueur has the reputation of being the only one in the world made from fresh bananas only with no artificial flavoring or coloring added.

It's delicious over fresh fruit, as ice cream topping, and other desserts as well as mixed drinks. The other flavors boast the same versatility.

Here is one of the many creations you can serve as an exciting tongue tingler with the banana liqueur.

## PINEAPPLE AND BANANAS FLAMBE

6 large bananas
2 cups of cubed fresh or frozen pineapple
$1 / 4 \mathrm{lb}$. butter
$2 / 3$ cup brown sugar
A touch of cinnamon
1 qt . (hard) pineapple sherbet
3 oz. jiggers dark rum
1 oz. jigger Banana Liqueur

Quarter bananas lengthwise. Melt butter in a skillet, or in a chafing dish in the dining room. Add brown sugar and a dash of cinnamon. Then add pineapple and banana. Saute lightly stirring as little as possible. When almost done add liqueur and rum. When hot, flame and serve immediately.

## Presentaion . . .

In the meantime at each place, or a point of service, set in a glass dish or preferably in a scooped out pineapple half (cut lengthwise with foliage), a generous scoop of pineapple sherbet. Spoon the fruit mixture over the ice cream, immediately after flaming.

# MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

## ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE

We welcome you to the Outrigger Canoe Club. We want you to enjoy the fine facilities, bring your friends and join with us in our social gatherings. Naturally, for the enjoyment of all we have rules to go by. This is prepared to answer your questions and acquaint you with the services of your club.

CLUB HOURS: The Club is open every day EXCEPT MONDAY from 8:00 a.m. to 12 midnight. On Mondays only, the locker rooms are open ..om 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., snack Bar from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Hau Terrace from 12 noon till 8:00 p.m.

DINING ROOM: The dining room is open every day EXCEPT MONDAY. Luncheon: 11:45 to 2:30 p.m. Dinner: 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. On Sunday mornings only the Club is open for breakfast from $9.00 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. to 11:30 a.m.

BAR HOURS: The bar is open from 12 noon to 12 midnight Tuesday thru Sunday, and on Mondays the Hau Terrace bar is open from 12 noon to 8:00 p.m. Drinks are served in the bar, on the Hau Terrace and in the dining room.

ATTIRE: For dinner it is requested that gentlemen wear coats in the main dining room, those desiring to wear Aloha shirts may enjoy dinner served on the lanai adjoining the main dining room. Shorts and bathing suits are not permitted in the bar or dining room. For women dress is optional, coming under the limits of good taste.

SIGN IN: When you arrive at the Club, you are requested to sign the register, also to list those that are your guests. (Hawaii State law and By-law regulation).

GUESTS: Your friends are our friends, however, the member is held
responsible for the conduct of his guests while on club property. You may bring guests with you at any time, although a resident of Oahu should not be invited to accept guest privileges more than twice in any one month.

GUEST CARDS: For your friends residing outside of Oahu desiring to use the club facilities, Senior Members may purchase guest cards from the front desk that will enable your guests to use the club for two (2) weeks. Those desiring longer than two weeks guest privileges must take out a "weekly membership". Arrangements can be made at the front desk. Members are limited to ten (10) outstanding guest cards at a time.

YOUR FAMILY: Your membership in the Outrigger Canoe Club includes your spouse (who does not have voting privileges) and your children under 10 years of age, provided they are accompanied by a senior member when they use the club. Children over 10 years of age must apply for Junior Membership.

JUNIOR MEMBERS: Junior Members do not vote. Junior members are not allowed on the Hau Terrace due to liquor laws, otherwise they enjoy the same privileges of a senior member. They do have their own locker rooms (for junior boys) and are not allowed in the senior men's locker rooms. Their conduct on the club premises is governed the same as senior members and vandalism, undue boisterousness or other infractions of house and ground rules will result in disciplinary action being taken.

FORECAST: A monthly magazine of club events and news is sent to each member.

LOCKERS: Arrangements for lock-
ers and surfboard lockers may be made at the business office. You furnish your own swim suits and towels, mark them with your locker number, and after use you put them in the receptacle provided in the locker room, and they will be washed, dried and returned to your locker.

BEACH SERVICE: The beach service office on the beach in front of the club is available to members desiring to rent umbrellas, back rests, surfboards, or to purchase beach attire or accessories at the special Outrigger member rate.

DUES: Statements are sent out monthly. Delinquent accounts are posted in the lobby (after 45 days) and the delinquent members are not allowed to use the club while they are delinquent.

LIQUOR: Liquor must not be brought onto the club premises, neither may a member under the influence of liquor be allowed in the club.

MEMBERSHIP: Persons desiring membership in the Outrigger Canoe Club must be sponsored by at least two (2) Senior members in good standing. One of the sponsors may obtain an "application for membership" from the Club secretary who clears through the Admissions Committee. Prospective member's names are posted on the Club bulletin board for ten (10) days and published in the "Forecast" (as prescribed by the By-Laws). Also, one of the sponsors must accompany the prospective member to meet with a member of the Admissions Committee. The application is later acted upon by the Committee and the Board of Directors.

The Outrigger Canoe Club volleyball team had its year-long tournament record spoiled in unsucessfully defending its State title to the Central YMCA on the eve of departure to Dallas and the National Championship Tournament.

The Central team vanquished the OCC men in the third round of the tournament and then in the finals to earn the 1960 State title.

Although the victory gives the YMCA the right to represent Hawaii in the National Tournament, May 11 14 in Dallas, plans for the Outrigger's
participation have not been changed.
The ten man team departs on May 6 at 8:30 a.m. for Los Angeles and plans to arrive in Dallas the following day.

Central, bolstered by the presence of Mel Hewitt and Merv Lyons, who played earlier in the season for the University of Hawaii team, played the best brand of volleyball displayed all year in defeating the Outrigger for the first time in four meetings this year.

The Outrigger defeated Fort Shafter and Kuhio Grill with relative ease
before losing to Central 6-15, 15-4, and 11-14 in a thriller.

The OCC spikers defeated Hickam Air Force Base in the loser's bracket to gain a second meeting with Central.

In the finals, the consistant play of the Central team made the difference as they walked away with the title, 15-10, 15-12.

The final game was a thriller, as the OCC team, down 14-7, sustained a drive that carried them within two points of Central. The final point was scored as the clock ran out.

Outrigger and Central $Y$ will scriminage throughout the week at the YMCA before departure.

The OCC's ten man team will leave Honolulu on May 8 at 9:30 a.m. for Los Angeles, arriving in Dallas the following day. They are scheduled to return on May 16.
