## Paddlers Open the 1991 OHCRA Regatta Season at Nanakuli

If it's Sunday and it's June, then it must be time for the 1991 Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association Regatta season.

Outrigger will begin defense of its seven straight state championships on Sunday, June 2 at the Clem Paiaina Regatta at Nanakuli Beach at 8:30 a.m.

Other races for June are the Kamehameha Day Regatta at Kailua Beach on June 9, the Leeward Regatta at Nanakuli Beach on June 16 and the Waimanalo Regatta on June 23.

"We expect to field crews in all 30 events," said Head Coach Tom Mc-Tigue.

Theme of the '91 regatta season for OCC is "Don't Give Up an Inch."

"Last year, our goal was to get people involved in paddling, especially kids, and to have fun. The priorities for this year are the same--to continue broad participation, have fun and to win the state championship, the Macfarlane Regatta on the 4th of July and the Molokai races," McTigue added.

"The turnout this year has been very enthusiastic. We have lots of returnees from last year, as well as novices and faces we haven't seen for a few years.

"One other thing. We have a new Club van to take paddlers to the Ala Wai to practice and to use on Sundays for regattas. Please help us keep it clean and in good condition," McTigue said.
