# George Onekea Wins Annual Castle Swim

George Onekea, Jr., Hawaii's latest swimming star and Olympic Games prospect, won the annual 2,000-yard Castle Open Water Swim off Waikiki yesterday morning.

The Iolani School student was timed in 32 minutes 25.9 seconds. He bettered last year's winning time of 35 minutes 10.4 seconds set by Tommy Moore. The annual Thanksgiving Day swim is sponsored by the Outrigger Canoe Club.

Benjamin F. Harrison of the Marine Corps was second and Tom Zahn of Hui Nalu third. Eno Plumley, unattached was fourth.

In the competition among the Outrigger Canoe Club members, John T. Moore was first, Scotty Gaffney second, and David Young third. Moore was fifth in the open division.

In the women's 1,500 open race, Pat Trant of the University of Hawaii was first. She hails from Tyler, Texas. No time was available for this event.

Ivanelle Hoe, also of the University was second, Betty Louise Foyer, unattached, was third. The latter displayed great courage in finishing her race. Despite the fact that she was last, far behind the others, she continued the race. When she finished she was given a big hand.

John Parks of Punahou Swimming Club was the winner of the boys' under 18 event over 600 yards. His time was 8 minutes 18.2 seconds. Robert Milne of Punahou was second, and Don Miles of Hawaii Swimming Club third.

Woody Godbold was the winner among the Outrigger Club entries. Mike Givens was second and Bill Danford third.

Patricia Miles of Hawaii Swimming Club was the winner in the 600 yard race for girls 16 and under.

Ann Richmond was second and Linda Reynolds of Outrigger third. The latter won the OCC members' race, with Cynthia Hemmings second.

James Miles, brother of Patricia, triumphed in the boys' 12 and under event over 200 yards. He represented the Hawaii Swimming Club. He beat team-mates Eric Romanchak and Geoffrey Gallas who finished in that order. Jimmy's time was 2:56.4.

Bruce Ames led the Outrigger entries to the finish line. He was followed by Mike Lemes and Nat Norfleet.

In the girls' 12 and under division, also over 200 yards, Erika Palmer of HSC was the winner in 3 minutes 3 seconds. Faith Young and Haroldyne Nakaji tied for second. Lynn Baker was next.

HAVANA, Cuba, Nov. 24 (UP)—Father and son Charles and Jorge De Cardenas of Cuba, skippering Kurush V and Kurush IV, finished one-two in the final standings of the World Star Class yacht championships as Charles successfully defended the title he won last year at Cascais, Portugal.

Merope II, skippered by Agostino Straulino of Taranto, Italy, won today's race with Kurush IV finishing second and Kurush V finishing sixth. Shannon of Connecticut, skippered by E. W. Ethells, was third; Fanega of Cascais, Portugal, was fourth; Conch of Nassau, Bahamas, fifth; Vengeance of Huntington Bay, N. Y., skippered by William Gentslinger, seventh; Circus of Elk River, Md., skippered by Howard F. Lippincott, eighth; Boomerang of Cambridge, Md., skippered by John K. Todd, ninth; and Gam II of France 10th.

Waterwitch of Waikiki, Hawaii, skipper Charles H. Dole, finished 32nd with 35 points.
