

# SOUTH AMERICAN ACE WILL COMPETE FOR CASTLE CUP

Dad Center Announces Events For Tenth Annual  
Closed Compet—Mariechen Wehselau in Half  
Mile Swim For Women

**A**LBERTO ZORILLO, crack South American swimmer and the boy who will represent Buenos Aires in the coming Olympic games, has joined the Outrigger Canoe club, following the lead set by Walter Laufer of Cincinnati. Zorilla will compete in the annual mile and one half swim scheduled for Thanksgiving Day with Laufer, Buster Crabbe and others. He is also being coached by George (Dad) Center and will continue to train daily during the days and weeks that intervene before the time set to shove off for Amsterdam and the Olympiad.

"We are glad to have Zorilla with us," Center told the writer. "He is a fine, strong, swimmer. Has a fault or two that needs correcting, but he is training faithfully and I look for him to give 'Buster' Crabbe and the others, a real battle in the Outrigger club's Thanksgiving Day event."

According to Center, Zorilla, who is a native of Buenos Aires and who represented South America in the last Olympiad, will be eligible to compete next year for his own country, despite the fact that before he came to Hawaii he was a member of the New York Athletic Club, and who since arriving here, has joined the Outrigger club.

"Zorilla took the sensible view point," added Center. "He knew that in Honolulu he could get into real condition by swimming every day this winter, and that by returning to the Coast or the east he would have to do his work indoors. We are glad to have him with us. Zorilla is a gentleman and very popular with our boys down here."

As for the Outrigger Thanksgiving Day swim, entries are coming in slowly. The Blue Ribbon event of course is the mile and one quarter swim to finish at a canoe anchored off the Outrigger club house. Contestants are to start at a point near the Elks club house and will swim outside the reef. To date only five have entered. They are Buster and Bud Crabbe, Tommy Ellis, Walter Laufer, and Sam Kahanamoku. The winner of this event is awarded the Harold Castle cup, and it has been an annual competition since 1917—that's 10 years ago.

Buster Crabbe, of course is favored to win, for he won it last year, while two years ago Gay Harris came home first. Records are sure to be broken with such a fast field facing the starter's gun.

There will be five other events for this closed swim and the next in importance is the half mile swim for women. Thus far only three have entered, Mariechen Wehselau, Hawaii's champion, Cecily Cunha, a former member of the Outrigger club, and eligible, and Beatrice Newport. There is a cup prize offered for the winner of this event. Miss Wehselau is picked to win. The girls are to start from the Public Baths and will swim to the anchored canoe.

The third event will be a swim for boys under 18. This is also from the public baths to the anchored canoe. A cup will go to the winner of this race. Cecil Benny is the donor.

The race for men over 30 will also be from the public baths to the anchored canoe.

For novice girls Alexander Hume Ford, director of the Pan-Pacific union, has offered a cup. They will swim following the race for men over 30. The race is from Cunha's surf to the canoe anchored off the Outrigger club.

After the girls' novice event, boys under 16 will swim the same route.

## Slattery Is Ordered To Box Lomski Or Lose Out

NEW LONDON, Nov. 6—Within thirty days Jimmy Slattery must fight Leo Lomski or forfeit his light-heavyweight boxing championship, Thomas E. Donahue, president of the National Boxing association, announced here today.

The announcement represents one more effort in the endeavors of the National Boxing association to make its word law in the matter of titles and title holders and matches in competition for them.

At the recent meeting of the National Boxing commission in Toledo, Slattery was duly recognized as the champion in his division, regardless of what the New York commission or any other body might have to say about it.

But today Donahue, who is chairman of the Connecticut commission, decided that after all there is no point in having titles unless once in a while they are put up for competition. And as far as the National association is concerned, Lomski is the logical contender for Slattery's crown and the champion must give Leo a crack at it.
