

TWO RECORDS ARE SMASHED, ONE BY McGUIRE, PUNAHOU

University Places Second in Its Own Meet; Outrigger Is Third; Myatt Lowers Former Record in Half-Mile Walk; Pals' Score Is 30

SPORTING a balanced front throughout an afternoon of super-spectacles, Palama carried off all the glory that goes with a prize track meet in the annual Rainbow Relay carnival at Kanehameha field yesterday. The Pals unveiled scoring power that placed them in the lead from the very start of the afternoon of thrills. Palama scored 30 points. University of Hawaii was second with 68, Outrigger third with 50 and Army fourth with 32. Kaakna, running unattached, registered 4 points. Two records were broken.

TRUE TO PREDICTION

On the eve of the meet, Palama was conceded sufficient strength to net them victory. With the crews of the islands on their squad, the Parker tutored squad flew into places in event after event. But for a spectacular performance of Frank Cerney of the Army, Palama would have had the ticker ringing out hundreds.

Two records fell by the wayside during the afternoon when "Buster" McGuire wearing the Surf riders' emblem stepped over the 220 hurdles in 23 1/3 seconds to better the old mark by 2/3 of a second. Pressed all the way by H. W. Ching, Deans' skipper, McGuire flew into the home stretch with such grace and velocity that the gods of Olympus would have positively drafted the Blue and Blue flash had he put on the show for them.

MYATT DOES IT

Jack Myatt of the University lowered the other mark in the afternoon attraction, when he promenade the half mile in 3 minutes 50 1/3 seconds, scratching his own mark for the distance by 3 seconds.

CERNEY SPECTACULAR

Frank Cerney, performing for Uncle Sam, gave what may be termed the most brilliant exhibition of running that has ever been witnessed in these fair islands.

Taking the stick from Hodgeson twenty-five yards behind Harrison of Palama, the diminutive Army flier strided the full four laps to breast the tape some fifteen yards ahead of the Settlement headliner. The Army flyer then came back in the very next event on the program and took off on another mile jaunt, this time, some four yards behind Gomez, Black and Gold distance ace who sported the Palama colors. Cerney again came into the home stretch a good twenty yards ahead of his rival, thereby closing a day that will long monopolize the prize pedestal in these parts. The ovation accorded this popular athlete after this race was probably the biggest ever given a track star.

WINS JAVELIN

Philip Westgate stepped into the limelight in the Javelin throw and grabbed for himself all the laurels that go with such a superb performance as this youngster put on. Westgate's form was easily the best of the afternoon. Moreover, this collegiate performed for the first time in the event. By his showing, Westgate can be depended upon to flash something unforeseen in this event in future meets. In the discus throw, DeMello from Palama heaved the platter 114 feet 11 1/2 inches for first place. DeMello also put the iron ball into first place territory in the shot put.

KAHOIWAI-WAKATAKE

The one mile relay brought every fan in the field to their feet when Kahoiwai, school boy artist, and Wakatake, Varsity flash, took the sticks from Farden and Kufferath. Kufferath's performance might be considered very closely in connection with the outcome of this event, as this chap ran as pretty a race as any fan would care to witness. The Mick's quarter-mile gave Kahoiwai the decorated stick about a yard ahead of Farden and the derby was on. Kahoiwai sprinted the entire distance with Wakatake on his heels all the way. The Warrior boy was just too good and Wakatake could not stand the pace, Kahoiwai finishing some ten yards in the lead.

As for the rest of the meet, it was just one afternoon of hard fought events. Outrigger did not show as was expected, most of the stars
