Diminutive Stars Grab Most Honors In Annual Track and Field Event

Cerny Sets Two New Distance Records; 'Toots' Harrison Springs Surprise in Long Runs

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Little fellows became big heroes at Alexander field Saturday afternoon when the final track meet of Honolulu's 1927 season was staged—the annual A. A. U. championships.

The big chaps didn't have a look-in while the diminutive athletes were in action.

Melim, Crozier, Cerny, Cruse, Lemes and Harrison were some of the lads who occupied the limelight during the afternoon—and every one of them can be described as being short.

To F. C. Cerny, star army distance man, goes the lion's share of the laurels. Cerny entered two events, the one- and two-mile runs, and established a new record in each. After trotting the one mile in 4 minutes 40 seconds Cerny came back a few minutes later and ran a sensational two miles, clipping more than half a minute off the old mark. And he was not even pressed.

The Outrigger team won the meet, as predicted, getting 69 points. Scores of other teams were as follows: University 59½, Palama 49½, Army 11, Unattached 4, Y. M. C. A. 3.

While Cerny was the winner in the two mile run, it was left to "Toots" Harrison, barefoot football star, to spring the surprise of the meet when he ran rings around Henry Medeiros, St. Louis college distance man, in the two mile run and also in the half mile event.

Harrison grabbed second place in both of these events, passing Medeiros on the home stretch of the two mile run.

In the half mile event Harrison finished strong to take second place. Medeiros, who was figured to give Kaholwai a run for first in this event, did not even place, both Lindsay of the Outrigger and Cheatham of the University finishing ahead of him.

Makes Record

Cruse, University of Hawaii "find," who failed to appear for the javelin trials at the Rainbow Relay Carnival, not only won that event Saturday, but hung up a new record when he tossed the spear 179 feet 4¼ inches. The old mark of 170 feet ½ inch was made last year by Jim Cruickshank.

Cruse is a short, husky chap who has a great deal of power in his shoulders and a natural ability in handling the javelin. With more practice he should make an even better record.

Five records fell during the meet Saturday. They were:

One Mile Run—Won by Cerny (A) in 4 minutes 40 seconds. Old record of 4 minutes 43 2-5 seconds held by B. Hooper.

Two Mile Run—Won by Cerny (A) in 10 minutes 14 2-5 seconds. Old record of 10 minutes 46 1-5 seconds held by P. Nather.

One Mile Relay—Won by Outrigger team in 3 minutes 32 1-5 seconds. Old record of 3 minutes 33 seconds held by University.

Half Mile Relay—Won by Outrigger team in 1 minute 31 4-5 seconds. Old record of 1 minute 32 seconds held by University.

Javelin Throw—Won by Cruse (U) with throw of 179 feet 4¼ inches. Old record of 170 feet ½ inch held by J. Cruickshank.

With Farden and Mountcastle unable to run at their best, the University was unable to place its best team into the relay events and as a result the Outrigger aggregation ran off with first place, especially in the one mile relay, without serious trouble.

Myatt Is Winner

J. Myatt of the University of Hawaii came close to a record in the one mile walk when he covered the distance in 8 minutes 3 2-5 seconds. He defeated Bill Meinecke, veteran Palama athlete, by quite a distance and finished with a strong sprint. Helbush, walking unattached, came close to noosing Meinecke out for second place.

"Jinky" Crozier, running for the Outrigger club, was one of the big attractions of the meet. He performed in the 440 yard run, winning that event in close to record time without apparent effort. He also ran a quarter mile as a member of the Outrigger club's one mile relay team. He ran in the 100 yard dash and also in the half mile relay.

Correia of Palama defeated Gartley of Outrigger in the pole vault with a leap of 12 feet. This was Correia's best performance of the season.

One of the big surprises of the meet came in the big jump when Luis of Palama won with a leap of 5 feet 9 inches. Anderson of Outrigger was second and Gannon of Outrigger, who was expected to win the event, finished third.

Lemes of the University won the broad jump with a leap of 29 feet 8¼ inches. On his last leap Lemes

lost his balance and fell on his arm, injuring it.

In the 100 yard dash Crozier gave Melim a close run for first honors, forcing the Punahou star to his fastest time of the season to win. Melim was clocked in 10 flat.

Melim carried away first places in the 220 and 100 yard dashes and also in the 220 yard low hurdles.

J. Whittle of Palama won the 120 yard high hurdles in 16 3-5 seconds. Complete results of the meet follow:
