LAST WEEK'S illustrious doings by the track and field athletes should be inspiring enough for the cinder pathers to crash a few heretofore unapproachable marks in the Hawaiian A.A.U. meet Saturday afternoon at Alexander field. Last Saturday in the Rainbow relay carnival, the teams and individuals toppled seven records and the men who figured prominently in their doom ought to be there with plenty of stuff to establish some new marks.

There is one mark that has the assaults of all the big boys for ten years, and that is the hammer throw record at 128 feet 5 inches hung up by R. H. Ludlum in 1917. The holder need not be worried over the prospect of its going by the boards. This mark is liable to stand for some time.

Three records of nine years duration, are still in evidence and have withstood every assault. The 220 yards low hurdles record made by John Watt is one of these. His time is 25 4-5 seconds. Then there are L. Ware's mark of 50 2-5 seconds for the quarter mile gallop and W. Robinson's 2 minutes 2 seconds for the half mile run. All these times were made in 1918.

So keen is competition this season that at least three records may be shattered. W. Robinson's record is one, if Medeiros of the Outrigger Canoe Club and Kahoiki of Palama could repeat some of their brilliance flashed at the interscholastic meet. It was then that the Kam school ace beat the St. Louis boy to set a new prep record and incidentally a Hawaiian mark, at 2 minutes 4-5 seconds.

Castanha will again figure in probably another new achievement in the mile run. The record is just 4 minutes 43 2-5 seconds made by Burt Hooper. Should Castanha be in his 1926 shape and get hot competition from his rivals, Hooper will be minus a record. While this is the A. A. U. mark, Castanha's prep mark is a second or so faster.

We look upon little Frank Cerny, the Army distance stepper to shove Nather's two mile record into the oblivion. Cerny has been running in astounding style and the 1926 Nather mark of 10 minutes 46 1-5 seconds, will be short-lived. Cerny needs no competition to break marks as he usually grabs the lead from the start and holds it till the end.

Raymond Melim of the Outrigger club, Ching and Eddie Fernandez of the University may press each other for a new mark in the 220 yard low hurdles. Melim has equaled Watt's time of 25 4-5 seconds last week and cut 1-5 of a second from that in the Cornell Relay meet. Myatt of the Roaring Rainbows and Bill Meinecke of Palama will battle it out in the mile walk and if the pace is not hot enough Myatt may break Jimmy Smith's time.

Victor Lidga of the A. A. U. track committee has checked over the above records and found them correct in every respect.

Taylor Would Halt Maloney-Sharkey Mix

(UNITED PRESS BY NAVE RADIO) NEW YORK, April 14.—Walter Taylor, Cleveland boxing promoter who was recently barred for life as a promoter in Ohio by the Ohio state athletic commission, today filed suit in the federal court here seeking to restrain the Jim Maloney-Jack Sharkey fight scheduled for May 19.

The scheduled fight is one of Tex Rickard's heavyweight elimination series and is expected to determine the logical challenger for Gene Tunney's heavyweight crown.

Taylor declares that Maloney is under contract to fight Johnny Risko on May 1 and that unless the Maloney-Risko fight takes place he will prevent the Maloney-Sharkey bout.

According to Taylor, Maloney has refused to keep his contract to meet Risko.
