

HAWAII'S STARS TO COMPETE ON TRACK

Outrigger Picked by Experts to Win; Records May Go

THE University of Hawaii's annual Rainbow relays will be held on Kam's field, starting at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon, with the cream of local talent competing in the various field and track events. Of course, the relays will be the big feature and these promise to be keenly fought, as Outrigger and Palama will dispute the right of the Rainbows to win their own meet. Outrigger is picked by the experts to win, and there are plenty of experts doing business in this man's city.

FAIR WEATHER SURE

These relays were originally scheduled for last Saturday but were rained out and it is hoped that fair weather will prevail this afternoon. Rain never halts a college track meet on the mainland, but down here the weather is so uniformly pleasant that a rainy day is a rarity and so the betting is at odds that Old Sol, that well known orb, will be out this afternoon in full glory.

Otto Klum, Dean athletic director, is making no predictions. He takes a keen interest in the doings of the track squad but lets Spud Harrison do the coaching and also the worrying. The Deans are good, but whether good enough to overcome Outrigger and Palama remains to be seen.

DEANS STRONG HERE

In the half-mile and quarter-mile relays, the fighting Deans stand a good chance of breaking the records. The team comprising of Wakatake, Ching, Giles and Farden tied the island record for the 440. Outrigger Canoe club also has a strong relay team in McGuire, Crozier, Melim and Penhallow.

Fernandez of the University strained a tendon but may recover in time to appear in the meet. He will run anchor on the mile-relay with Mountcastle, Wakatake, Wakatake and Giles or Ching.

Palama has a strong distance team, while the University, Army and Outrigger follow. The Pals may bust standing records if they are pressed at all.
